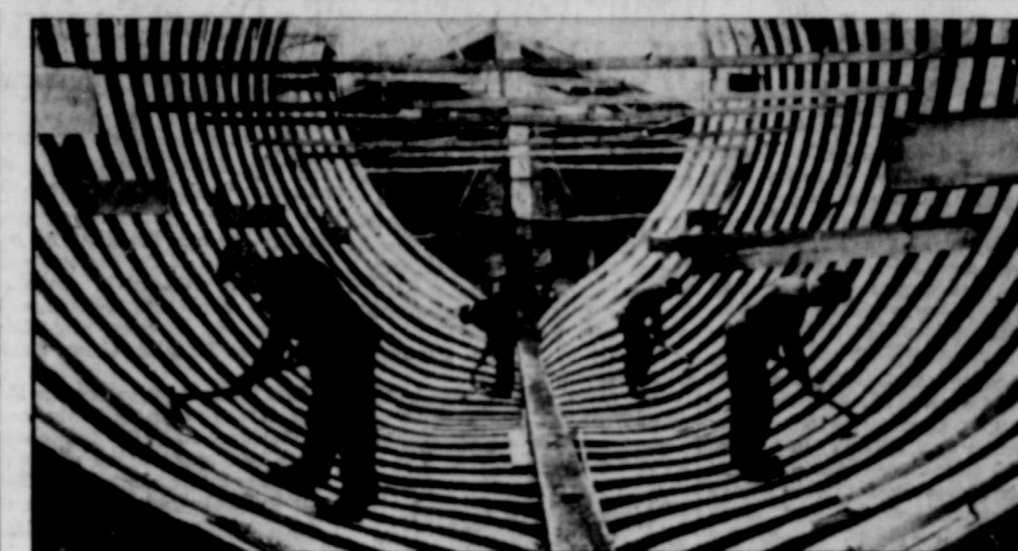

Walter T. McKay, state director of Farmers Home Administration, announced here today that FHA county committees are being authorized to accept applications for drought feed aid through March 16, 1956, for supplies of feed grain to carry basic livestock through April 15, 1956.

This applies to all presently designated counties McKay stated and represents an extension of the program where it is now in effect in 87 Texas counties. This extension includes Eastland County, according to Homer P. Cole local FHA county supervisor.

Four Jury Trials Set for 91st District Court

Four cases have been set for jury trials when the 91st District Court convenes March 26, J. M. Nuesale, district attorney, said here today.

First case is the State vs. Albert Lee Weed, of Cisco, for second offense DWI, a felony. Others are State vs. Rupert Wayne Jennings, of Big Spring, for misdemeanor DWI and the State vs. Clinton Earl Adams, of Abilene for misdemeanor DWI. Fourth case set is the State vs. Lola Harris, of Ranger, for the possession of intoxicating liquor for the purpose of sale in a dry area.

The Grand Jury for the February term of the 91st District Court will convene Monday. At least two indictments are expected against Howard Saals for burglary and for theft over \$50 from S. L. Lopez. Saals recently waived extradition from Missouri and voluntarily returned to Texas with Deputy Sheriff Johnny Boyd to face these charges.

The case of The State of Texas vs. William C. Lewis, of Rising Star, which was tried by a jury in the District Court on September 15 and in which the defendant was assessed a punishment of a fine of \$500, 30 days in jail and all court costs for the sale of beer in a dry area, was confirmed by the State Court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday.

Dixie Drive-In Plans Free Movie Tuesday

The Dixie Drive-In Theatre on U. S. Highway 80 between Ranger and Eastland will have its annual free theatre party Tuesday night, I. B. Walker, owner, has announced.

Walker said that the free show each year is a token of appreciation for patronage. The week of feature attraction will be Hell's Island, starring John Wayne and Mary Murphy.

Public School Week Observance Slated

New Employer Tax Laws Go Into Effect

The Texas Employment Commission reminded here this week that an employer with as many as four employees will pay a three percent tax on wages up to \$3,000 to each employee, R. V. Galloway, manager of the Chamber of Commerce here, said today.

The Texas Legislature and Congress have recently adopted similar amendments for the purpose of enabling new employers to reduce their tax rates. Had the legislature not enacted these amendments, smaller employers would have been required to pay the full three percent payroll tax each year.

Under the Texas experience rating plan, a covered employer may be eligible for a substantially reduced tax rate after approximately 1 1/2 years.

The first state tax will be due the Texas Employment Commission during April and the federal tax will be due the district director of Internal Revenue at the end of 1956.

There are certain exemptions from this tax such as agriculture, labor, domestic service, charitable employment, etc.

Last Saturday the court met with all members in attendance and ordered that the persons who had closed a county road leading to the shoreline of Lake Leon be notified that the road should be opened immediately.

Three land owners, T. A. Utley, Walter Duncan and O. T. Hazard, however, have not complied with the order.

erator takes over when it arrives. Unless, of course, the resuscitator gets there before trouble does. That was the case in Ohio. Firemen took a resuscitator when they roared out to the rescue of two children marooned on a ram. The children stood there in helpless fright, in dazzling, rushing water not quite strong enough to wash them over the edge. It seemed all too likely that the resuscitator would come in handy.

But the children were still there, and a fireman brought them safely ashore. Then his foot slipped, he hit his head and fell unconscious into the water. He was an excellent example of a drowning victim when found and fished out. His mates unshipped the resuscitator, set it up on a log—the thing works in any position—and revived him briskly. The cast had changed a little, with one of the rescuers becoming the victim, but resuscitator, as predicted, had come in handy.

owner, but not affected by the hearing for closing county roads, said that if one of the roads were open or the same measure should be taken in the case where one road was closed.

It was suggested that a fence running to the water's edge, with a cattle guard near the shoreline be constructed, but Uley differed saying that the land "would still be open to the public."

He said that there were three roads on his property leading to the lake when the county road was open and that other land owners did not have that many entrances. It was pointed out however, that none of the other two existing roads were public thoroughfares.

Commissioner Tip Arther said that the only thing he would do now is to throw the road open and not make anymore reservations with Uley as "he just throws them out the window."

Uley replied, "I just want jurisdiction over my land."

Arther said, "You want jurisdiction over your land but you

don't want us to have jurisdiction over our land. I just can't see your point, other land owners are not having troubles with their fences."

Duncan, another of the land owners, said that his son had purchased the land from where his dispute with the Water Board stemmed and that the property included the road.

Hazard said that he had never given a deed to his land for the road and felt that the land should go back to him when not used for the prescribed purpose.

Nuesale asked, "Do you think the road is not used?"
Hazard replied emphatically, "Yes, Sir."

Commissioner Carter explained that the county did not have deeds for many of the county roads but any road designated as such and recognized by the state was open to the public.

Each of the three declared that they would not remove the fences when asked for their intention by Nuesale.

However, Judge Hart set the second hearing Monday.
