\$80,000 Blaze Races Through Ford Motor Company Here Sunday

Seventeen New Cars Destroyed By Fire

An \$80,000 fire of undetermined origin swept through the Bagwell-Roberson Motor Co. at Ranger shortly after midnight Sunday night, completely destroying the building and 19 cars, 17 of which were new.

The fire was reported at 12:08 a.m. Monday morning by Carl Page who lives near the scene of the blaze at 460 W. Main Street.

Firemen reported however, that the building was burning fiercely when they arrived. Shortly after the firemen arrived five or six gasoline drums began exploding, spreading the fire over the entire building and through the composition roof.

The building, about 150 by 200 feet, belonged to Morris Leville, of Ranger.

Firemen battled the blaze with all their equipment for about two hours and sprinkled the smolder-

ing ruins until about 5:15 Monday morning. Most attention was spotted on the mechanical shop during the first stages of the fire but as the exploding gasoline drums spread the fire, the firemen attempted to save the parts and supply and office furniture at the front of the building.

However, when windows in front of the building were broken by water pressure the flame spread quickly to that portion of the building.

One new car was rolled out in front of the building. However, it showed considerable smoke damage.

Don Butler, police officer on duty at the time of the fire, said that he had driven by the motor company "about 15 or 20 minutes before the fire but had not seen any smoke or a blaze. The cause of the fire has not been determined.

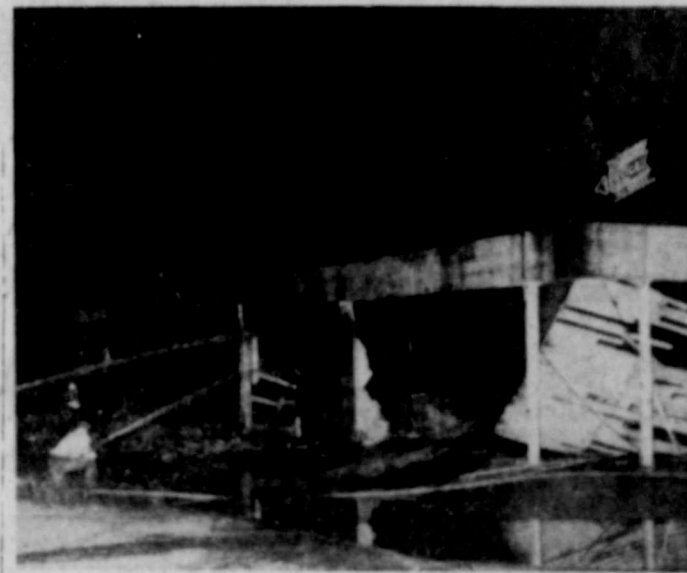
Fire Chief Charlie Isbell said that \$30,000 of the loss on the equipment and fixtures were covered by insurance and that the building carried \$12,500 in insurance.

Two Arrested In Rifling of Car

County authorities announced today that C. B. Sims and Lois Pope, both of Gorman, have been jailed after the rifling of theft-over \$50 in Judge Jim Boggs' Justice Court. Sheriff Williams' department and Constable E. L. Dennis worked on the case.

In Baird Crash

Two Former Ranger Men Seriously Hurt

Two former Ranger men were seriously injured and a woman was killed in a two-car crash at the west edge of Baird at about 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

Miss Lorena Gunn, 73, of Baird, died before an ambulance could reach the scene of the accident and her sister, Miss Myrtle Gunn, 66, driver of the 1941 Ford sedan in which the two women were riding was in critical condition at Callahan County hospital following the accident.

Curtis Ray Sharp, 25, and William Russell Edwards, 25, both formerly of Ranger, now living in Baird, who were in a 1955 Plymouth coach which collided with the Ford, were both seriously injured.

Miss Myrtle Gunn is suffering from severe head injuries and shock.

Sharp, who has a possible fractured hip and broken leg, as well as severe cuts about the face and body, was transferred to Hendrick Memorial Hospital at Abilene Saturday night.

Edwards was confined to the Callahan County Hospital with severe cuts and bruises about the body.

The accident occurred at the intersection of a dirt street and U. S. Highway 80. The Gunn sisters were reported to be going to church and the two men were coming into Baird from the west on their way home from work on an oil rig.

Both women were thrown from their car when the Plymouth struck about the center of their vehicle. Miss Lorena Gunn's body was taken to Melton Funeral Home at Breckenridge.

One Accident Victim Released From Hospital

Three survivors of a two car accident Saturday night in which one woman was killed, was improving today in two hospitals while one of the victims had been released.

Miss Myrtle Gunn, 66, driver of the car in which her sister was killed was reported "on the mending list" at Callahan County Hospital.

William Russell Edwards, 25, formerly of Ranger, who was in the second car which collided with the Gunn auto was discharged from Callahan County Hospital Monday after treatment for lacerations of the head.

Curtis Ray Sharp, 25, also formerly of Ranger, who was also in the other car was reported "doing satisfactorily" at Hendrick Memorial Hospital at Abilene where he was taken for treatment. Sharp is suffering from a dislocated left hip, fractured right leg and multiple lacerations.

Miss Myrtle Gunn has a broken jaw, a broken rib and a broken pelvis bone.

Funeral services for Miss Lorena Gunn, 74, were held at Baird Monday afternoon.

License Plate Sales Still Lag Slightly Here

The sale of license plates are progressing slightly ahead of last year but are still lagging behind the normal pace. C. E. May, deputy tax collector said today.

May said that at this time last year, he had sold 402 passenger licenses and that this year 420 had been sold. He said that 1,116 passenger licenses were sold here last year and that if that many were sold again this year, the sales were only about one-third complete.

He urged that those who have not purchased their 1956 plates yet to do so at once and avoid next week's rush. He reminded that probably there will be some lines to form at times next week, as has happened in the past.

May sells passenger plates, and commercial and small trailer plates. He said that unlike the practice many years ago, the plates cost the same here as in Eastland.

William Prescott Allen, the Laredo Times publisher, who drew considerable disfavor among the courts and public as well, this week took advantage of his predicament again when he publicly announced a campaign for a state-wide cleanup campaign. This is "if enough people will write me their suggestions for cleaning up corruption in Texas."

So Allen has entered the popularity poll with Senator Price Daniels and former governor, W. Lee O'Daniel. They all want the public to pledge their support, beg for their leadership and guarantee that their efforts will not be fruitless.

Most amusing on Allen's folder, announcing his crusade against corruption, was his picture peering through steel bars from the cell where he was placed in Fort Worth for contempt of court, after it was determined that he had little of the evidence he crowed about in an editorial in the Times prior to the grand jury indictment in Tarrant County.

He called this his campaign picture.

"I'm not a candidate for any public office in Texas — merely touring the state advocating the turning out of every corrupt official — the corrupt senators and representatives who were mixed up in the insurance and veterans land scandals and in the leasing of school lands, where more than a billion dollars was and is being stolen.

The new 1956 edition of the official highway travel map is now available, says D. C. Greer, state highway engineer at Austin. The map has many new features and contains a wealth of information.

In addition to the highways and the mileages between various points, the travel map shows state parks with recreational facilities, historical state parks, roadside parks, altitudes, and the highway travel information bureau. The newest map also sketches Lake Leo.

The Austin office of the Highway Department, the 25 district office, and the seven Travel Information Bureaus near the state's borders all have maps available for distribution. Special map cards for requesting a map may be obtained at the tax collector's office when license plates are purchased.

"The Singing Seminarians" from Brite College of the Bible, Texas Christian University, will be making their only appearance in West Texas this year on Thursday night, March 22 in the Sanctuary of the First Christian Church of Eastland. The concert, which is open to the public, will be held at 8 p.m.

The pastor of the church, Roy M. Turner, is a member of the first tenor section of the Singing Seminarians.

A slow movement toward the safety inspection of passenger vehicles has caused concern. Officials feel that a reason for the delay of some motorists in having their automobiles inspected this year seems to be a misunderstanding about new license plates and safety inspection stickers being issued together.

Deadline for the purchase of 1956 license plates is April 1, and the inspection deadline is April 15.

The concern naturally is not serious here as it would be in some of the larger cities where last minute checks could cause motorists to wait for hours.

Not All Fruit Dead In Agent's Opinion

County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper still hasn't given up on the peach crop.

Despite freezing temperatures on three or four occasions in March, with a low of 24 in one instance, it is his opinion there is still some fruit left in the county.

"On every tree — with the exception of certain varieties — there are a number of reserve buds and only a portion of them had been killed prior to the very light freeze of Thursday night — with a low of 32 — and I don't think it was sufficient to kill them, although I haven't had a chance to check carefully since Thursday," said the agent.

attack by delivering bombs to enemy territory.

The deterrent effect of a ready strategic bomber force is the best insurance we have against attack. But if nuclear retaliatory units are not ready, the lives of millions of Americans might be forfeited. The fate of our nation could be decided in a day.

Unfortunately the Strategic Air Command is woefully short of certain highly skilled mechanics and technicians. The shortage of skilled aircraft maintenance men is serious.

In the first place, it takes a man

with a pretty high I.Q. to be accepted for training in certain of these technical branches. It costs well over \$20,000 per man to even train them.

By the end of the four-year enlistment period, the Government will have spent approximately \$22,500 in training a mechanic. The training requires about 2 1/2 years, and at the end of his enlistment period, he will have given 18 months' service. Only 20 per cent re-enlist.

It costs in the neighborhood of \$616,000 to qualify one B-52 pilot to handle the 600 to 700-mile an hour jet bomber, and most of them are well past 30 years of age.

While we talk of the lack of funds to build more modern air-

craft, the "Achilles' heel" is the shortage of this highly trained personnel. Bombers waiting on the ground are of no use. Bombers of the Strategic Air Command have got to be over the docks, manufacturing and military centers of the enemy with bomb-bays full, if they are to do us any good.

In a short time we will be seeing a lot of these boys in the area in and around Abilene. It might help us to realize that many of them are the most expertly trained men in the world, and that they carry the fate of our nation in their ability to properly perform their duties.

It is better to look ahead and prepare than to look back and regret.

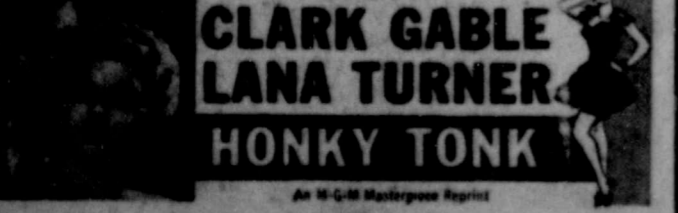

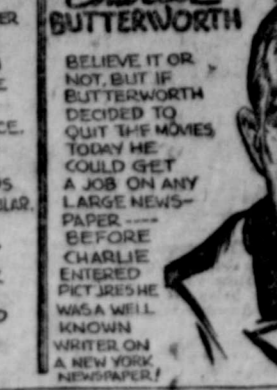

More Than A Pattern — Cut It To Size

From foods to furniture, patterns are available for everything now that it is the vogue to "do-it-yourself." Breakfasts, too, should be made from patterns. These patterns, however, should be adjustable with mother "cutting to size" breakfasts to suit nutritional needs of each family member.

On every hand is the reminder, "Eat a Good Big Breakfast." How big is big when it means breakfast? From one of the surveys of the breakfast habits of young people, comes a basic pattern for adequate breakfasts. Purdue University judged breakfasts of women students by the following yardstick: (1) fruit or fruit juices; (2) cereal with milk, or an egg; (3) milk or cocoa made with milk; and (4) whole grain or enriched bread with butter or margarine. Of the students, approximately one-third included three of these types of food and another third, only two types. Only a few had all four and the remainder ate only one food or did not breakfast at all.

These breakfast habits were developed at an early school age. They were found to be an indication of the student's total daily diet. If breakfast is eaten, though inadequate, the total diet will score higher than if breakfast were skipped.

Research workers at the University of Iowa found the calorie to be one of the gauges to determine the bigness of the breakfast. Young men and women whose balanced breakfasts supplied one-fourth of their daily calorie needs, were able to work more efficiently throughout the morning than when they had less or more food.

Physical activity tests revealed that a basic cereal breakfast consisting of fruit, cereal, milk and enriched bread and butter or a bacon-and-egg breakfast were equally efficient energy-wise, providing each supplied 25 percent of the daily calorie needs.

So measure and cut breakfasts to energy needs; up calories for youngsters and active adults. Be certain to include the protein and B vitamin contributing foods—enriched bread, cereals and milk.

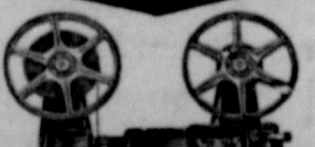

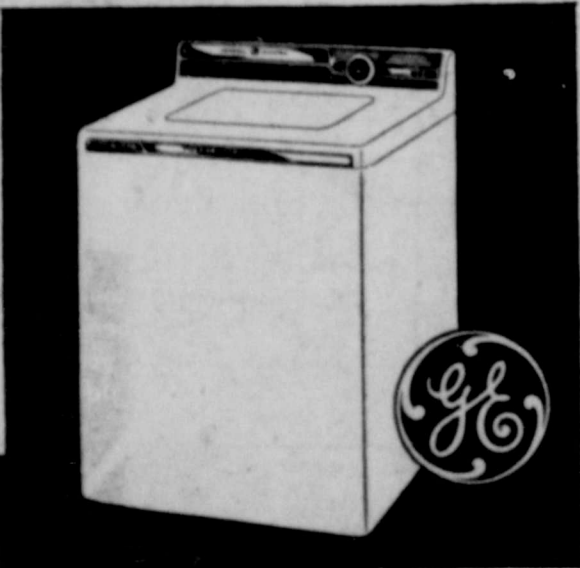
