"Children, obey your parents in the Lord; for this is right. Honor thy father and mother, which is the first commandment with promise; that it might be well with thee, and thou mayest live long on the earth. And, ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath; but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." Ephesians 6:1-4.

In dealing with the problem children of today, many of whom will become the criminals of tomorrow, the conclusion is soon reached that the children are what they are because of the training or lack of training that they have received. The parents have failed to follow the teachings of the Wise Men of old when he proclaimed, "Train up a child in the way that he should go, and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6.

To many people, the causes of delinquency and crime are a mystery. As one sits and reads the accounts in newspapers, and magazines of the lurid happenings of youth and acts of misconduct, they cannot understand why. The basic foundation of misconduct that ultimately leads to delinquency and crime is brought about by violation of the Word of God. Parents have failed to teach to their children by word and by example which has resulted in the breaking down of parental authority with all of its anti-social consequences. These children are not being brought up in "the nurture and admonition of the Lord" nor do they honor their father and mother; consequently, they do not have that which may give glory in this life and eternal salvation in the next. "For ye day, we see the fulfillment of an old wise saying: 'As the twig is bent, so will the tree be inclined.'"

The Lord has ordained in his scheme of things that every child should have a father and a mother. It takes the combination of the two to train the child "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." Children are sensitive. They are for comradeship. They want to be loved, appreciated and respected, and want to know that they live with the love and devotion of someone and most of all, of daddy and mother. From parents, most of all, the children get their estimation of values, their ideals, and their conceptions of life.

Judge Sam Davis Tatum of the Juvenile Court of Davidson County of Tennessee reports, "Since I became judge in 1939, I have tried approximately 14,500 youngsters under the age of 17 for violating the law in that jurisdiction. Of that great host of children, in only two instances, did the father and mother go to Sunday School and church regularly with their children. And of that approximate 14,500 youngsters, only 43 of them were going to Sunday School and church regularly at the time they came into the Juvenile court for violating the law." You can find similar records all over the United States.

Yes the fathers and mothers that go to Sunday School and church with their children, by their way of living, impress upon the child that there is something of value. If the parents only go occasionally, then the child is going to soon conclude that church is of little value. Daddy can get up on Sunday morning and go down to his office, go out to play golf, or go with his friends fishing; then it is not going to take little Johnny and little Betty very long to conclude that the activities are far more important than worshipping the Lord. Little Johnny, desiring to grow up to be like daddy, will soon begin to sneer and to make light of things divine. There is the possibility and probability that before too long, he may be brought in as a delinquent. Daddy and mother will make their way to the Juvenile Court and try to make explanations and alibi for little Johnny.

They may shed a tear and wring their hands and explain that they just cannot understand why little Johnny got into trouble or little Betty has grown wayward. It is not any mystery. The parents who do not go with their children to Sunday school and church, who do not read the Bible and pray with their children each day, are teaching their children that these things are of no importance. We must answer to God for failing to set a good example as well as for setting the wrong example.

Guard Assembly To Be In June 2 Days, Cisco

The entire 648th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, Texas National Guard, will gather in Cisco in June for a two-day assembly, it was announced today by Sgt. Jess Cole, Ranger unit's administrative assistant.

About 400 officers and men are expected to participate in the training which is an annual affair usually held just before summer field training for the division, which is July 8-22 this year.

The 648th, commanded by Lt. Col. Ralph Trolinger of San Angelo is comprised of the following units: Btry A, Cisco, commanded by Capt. F. N. Sayre; Btry B, Breckenridge, commanded by Capt. Tom Seeley; Btry C, Colorado City, 1st Lt. Yancy; Service Btry, Ranger, Capt. C. C. Carr; and Headquarters Btry, San Angelo, Capt. Floyd Hackler.

The battalion, a medium artillery unit, employs the use of 155-mm self-propelled howitzers as its principal weapon. The 155 is the heaviest artillery piece assigned to the 49th Armored Division.

The 648th was called into active Federal service 25 November 1940 as Hq & Hq Btry, 2 Bn., 131st Field Artillery Regiment, Texas National Guard. In 1942 it was redesignated as a part of the 202d (Continued on Page Two)

Assault To Murder Filed Against Negro

Charges of assault with intent to murder were filed against a 34-year-old Dallas Negro Friday morning after the accused, C. Jeff Christian, had been returned by Ranger policemen Ed Freeman and Don Butler from Weatherford where he was arrested.

Christian was admitted to the house without question and Mrs. Hampton, 76, said she "had often wondered how his family was and if they ever got to Arizona."

The Dallas Negro said that he went to bed for 30 or 40 minutes then crept into the room where Mrs. Hampton was sleeping. On his way into her room he picked up a stick of cord wood used in a nearby stove.

As Christian entered the room, Mrs. Hampton awoke and began screaming. Christian said that he tapped her lightly twice with the wood to knock her out or to keep her quiet.

She kept screaming, however, he related. Christian said that he laid down the stick and lit her two or three other times with his fist, before choking her, and finally leaving.

Christian, who said that he had never served time in a penitentiary but admitted spending time in a Dallas jail for carrying a pistol, said that he thought Mrs. Hampton kept money around the house from her conversation when he and his wife spent the night with her in January.

He said that he started three or four other times to rob her before but each time had turned around and gone back to Dallas. He denied, however, that it was his intention to kill her.

Early Completion Of Cafeteria Sought

Ranger Junior College is growing a modern brick dormitory which will house seventy-five boys is now under construction. The second brick dormitory to be added in the past twenty-four months, the new building is financed on a revenue basis and will be paid for out of the student rent revenues.

Over a period of years rents have been more than adequate to support such a project.

A new air-conditioned cafeteria is scheduled to be in operation by the 1955-56 term.

Spring enrollment is the largest in the history of the college. At the present time there are 593 full-time students registered for twelve semester hours or more. Increased enrollment makes the expansion of school facilities imperative. The State-approved list of college courses has been doubled during the past 30 months, new departments have been added, and all facilities generally expanded to meet the needs of a modern educational institution.

The Business Department has greatly increased in size and equipment. A customer, dictating machine, sound scriber, check writer, bookkeeping machine, a stencil scope, and twenty-five new Royal typewriters have been recently added. New office furniture is being placed in the Business Department at Boswell Hall. The latest addition is a P.R.B. telephone switchboard to be used in the training of general office students.

Added to the technological and mechanical shop which was put in operation last year will be a program of industrial arts. Fall classes of '56 will include woodwork, metal work, and mechanical engineering. The development of this program will be of interest to the industrial engineers, contractors, metal purists, farmers, ranchers, and many other trades in this area. The student potential is unlimited in this field of terminal students.

Only basic, preparatory courses are offered this year, but the department is planning terminal courses to be offered in the Adult Evening Program. It is the desire of the college to serve the farm population in a consulting capacity as well as in a teaching program.

These improvements are only the beginning of the growth of Ranger Junior College. A long-range planning program launched by College President Price R. Ashton and the Board of Regents composed of Morris Newham, F. P. Brasher, Jr., J. M. Nuesse, L. L. Bruce, A. E. Crawley, Carl Page, A. L. Wood, and David Pickrel, will assure the continued growth of the college.

Ranger Junior College, organized in 1926, as a member of the Texas Association of Colleges, the American Association of Junior Colleges, the Southern Association of Junior Colleges, and is approved by the Texas Education Agency and the National Commission on Accrediting. It will begin its thirty-first annual session on Sept. 4, 1956, in Ranger and at its branches in Albany and Breckenridge.

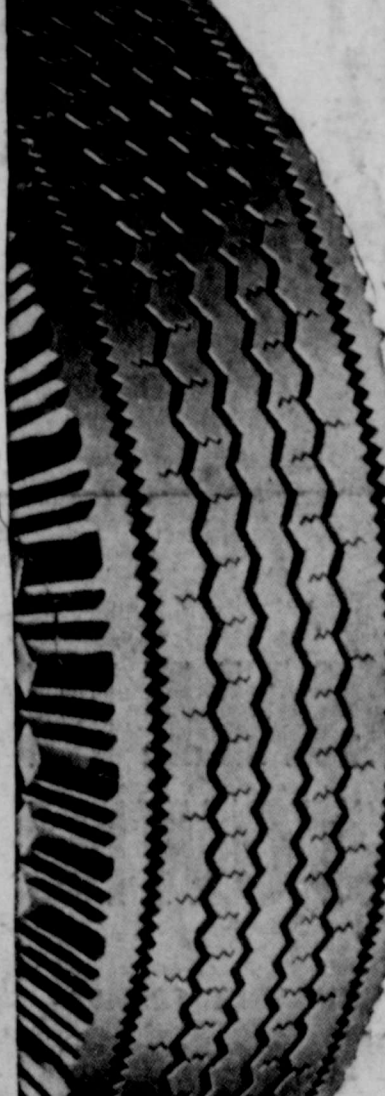

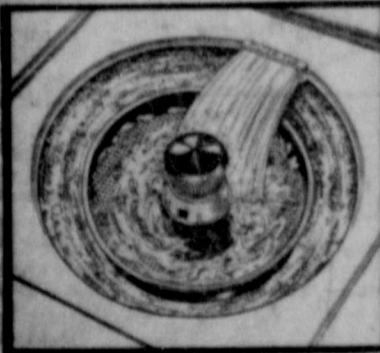

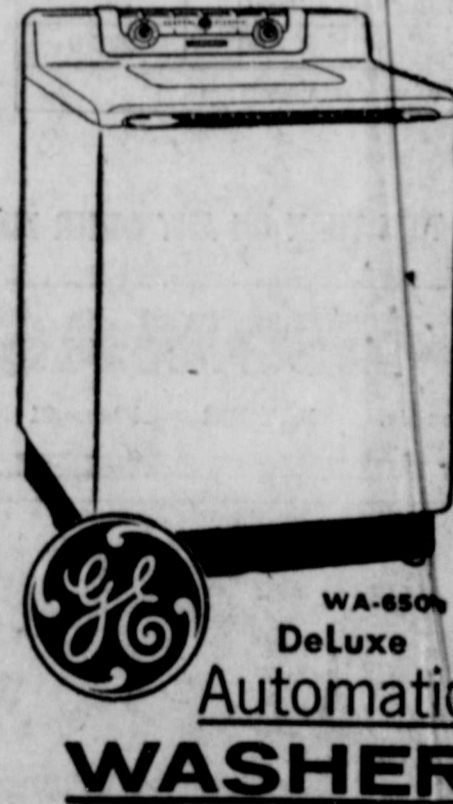
