Statistics May Prove New Highway's Value

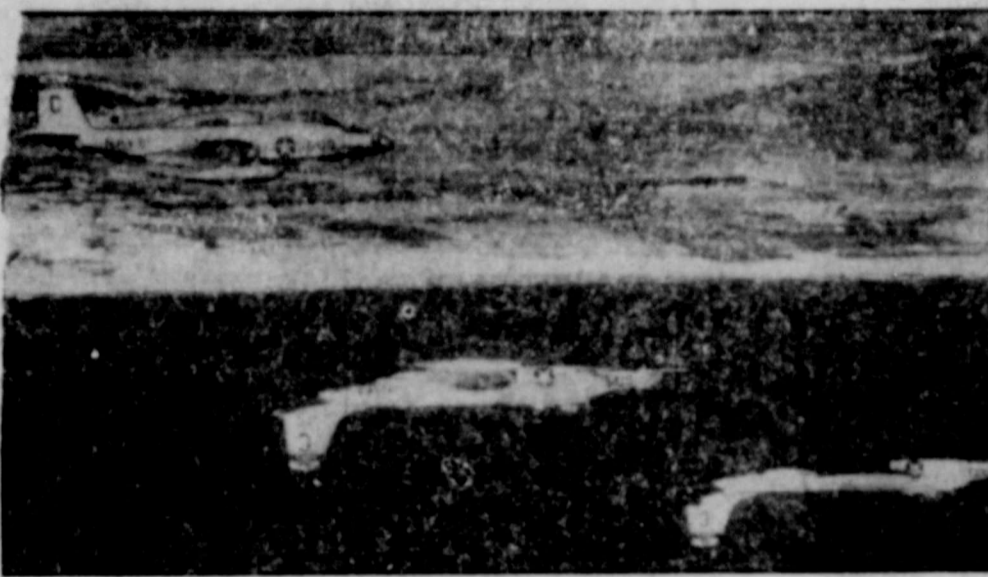

Expedit: To confound confusion with commotion.

To activate: To make carbons and send more names to the memo.

To implement a program: To hire more people and expand the office.

Little Bobby had forgotten a schoolmate's birthday and a note to write a note of apology. "I have no excuse for forgetting," he wrote, "and it would really be right if you forgot my birthday next Wednesday."

In a way that the "Meet the Press" panel put Governor Allan Shivers ill at ease Sunday over their national television program aired from Fort Worth, would be putting it mildly.

He evaded, backed up, hedged and skipped his way through 30 minutes of questioning from the four panel members.

He hinted that he would not back Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas.

When some 285 years ago, Thomas Shadwell wrote "The Miser" and penned the words, "I shall kill two birds with one stone," little did he know that his "birds" would be adopted by posterity. Nor could he foresee that birds themselves would fill dual roles after the 17th century.

But they have. Birds for many years have been "killing two birds with one stone." They've migrated into sports, games, government, song, and, movies, titles, have become official symbols, automobile design, and a measure of speed (the knot) to include a few.

In sports, the cardinal bird became part of major league baseball history, and Dizzy Dean, Frankie Frisch and today's Stan Musial will always be associated with the St. Louis Cardinals. Chicago's hockey team favored the Black Hawk bird.

In the South and Southwest, the ten-inch long mockingbird, which reportedly sings more exuberantly in the South than in the North, has been declared the official State bird in Arkansas, Florida, Mississippi, South Carolina, Tennessee and Texas. Meanwhile, bird lovers in state legislatures in Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, North Carolina and Ohio named the Cardinal safely in their capitals as their official bird.

Congress became bird-conscious officially on June 8, 1940, when it legislated that: "By this Act of Congress, by tradition and custom during the life of this nation, the bald eagle is no longer a mere bird of biological interest but a symbol of American ideas of freedom." And so, the bald eagle, which appears on the Great Seal of the United States, became the living symbol of the nation.

In connection with the state's integration problems, Leon Graham of the Texas Education Agency told a district teacher's meeting in Galveston that 45 tax-supported colleges and 65 public school districts formerly for whites, are admitting Negroes; that integration has not usually extended beyond the classroom, and that Negro students are apparently about two years behind white students academically, and even more sociologically; and that "interposition" has left school officials who thought integration was only a matter of time "somewhat confused."

(Continued From Page One) should be able to provide decent schools and school facilities without the Federal Government going into the business.

As has often been said in this column, the United States is far from self-sufficiency as a member of nations in this small world. Regardless of how much we would like to isolate ourselves within the small spot of this globe we call the United States, it is impossible to do so and protect the future. At the same time we should be getting pretty tired of some of the actions of our friends in trading vitally needed goods to Soviet Russia. It is true that nations like England must carry on world trade if it is to survive, but it does not justify England's or any other country's selling strategic materials and products which increase the war-making power of the Reds.

American allies have sold to Russia machine tools and power equipment which certainly has enabled the Communists in building a war machine. There is strong evidence to support the belief that the executive department has been less than fair with the Congress by not revealing the full facts of this situation.

The memory of ships loaded with scrap-iron on the way to Japan prior to World War II seems to have been forgotten by some people. A standing reward is being offered to anyone who can fully and completely explain the farm bill as passed by the Senate. The bill now goes to a conference committee between the House and the Senate, and it is anyone's

guess as to what will result. One thing appears fairly certain, and that is that the small of "family-size" farmer will not have his purchasing power increased under the bill.

Strangely enough, if we go far enough back in history, we can usually find a parallel to most any situation experienced today. The decay of Rome began when the hardy farmer - citizens, whose valor made Rome great, ceased to be able to maintain themselves and their families by their small holdings. In hardly more than a generation, the family-size farms were swept away in Italy. That made way for vast consolidated absentee owners. It was the beginning of the end. When the little farms went, it was as though the nation's healthy roots in native soil were stricken and withered. In the end the nation was stricken also.

The warnings of history need to be remembered at this moment. A single statistic tells the story. Per capita farm income has now declined to the level of \$860. The per capita income of Americans in other business and occupations now stands at \$1922. Farm folks are less than half as well off as

others in America. "When we have gone as far as we can on our feet, we might try our knees."

You Can Do Wonders With A Small House

If you live in a house that is too small, use space - stretching decorating ideas to help hide the size of the small rooms.

Color, furniture arrangement, accessories, furnishings, and lighting are the most important ideas in making a small home live big, according to an article in the April issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine.

Correct use of color is vital to a decorating scheme. A basic color or principle is that dark colors advance, light colors recede. Use closely related colors to avoid "chopping-up" backgrounds that make rooms appear smaller than they really are.

Furniture arrangement that defines traffic lanes keeps a room from looking like a bargain basement on sale day. The article advises being open minded, not sentimental, about furniture. A good furniture arrangement may mean eliminating a piece of furniture. Or, for instance, doing away with a large, bulky sofa in favor of two well-scaled love seats for more seating in less space.

A few large, and useful, accessories are better than a hodgepodge of small, meaningless objects, the magazine says.

Furnishings that serve dual purposes, like sofa beds and sectional pieces, are good choices. Comfortable seating pieces do not have to be bulky.

Lighting that draws attention to tall draperies or puts a dark,

unused corner to work will surprise you with the space it can add to small rooms, the article says.

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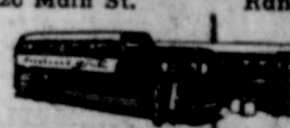
