WHERE IS THE DIFFERENCE?

Time was when attendance at church services on Sunday evening was as large, if not larger, than on Sunday morning. But now the number present for services in the evening is much smaller than in the morning. Naturally, we wonder why this is the case.

Is it because people are not as interested now in Christianity as they used to be? We believe this is true to some extent because when folks do not attend services, they do not hear and learn as much of the gospel. Knowledge of the gospel is the thing which furnishes the motivating influence that is responsible for one's interest in services and other things which pertain to Christianity.

The above is all true but there are some other things which enter in for a part of the reason for the difference. The difference in social conditions, personal habits and modern environment come in for their share of the present situation. Folks today seem to feel a greater need for recreation and gratification of personal pleasure than in time past.

People will not forego their favorite past-time even to read the word of the Lord to say nothing of attending extra services in the church. One service per week is all they can afford to take the time for.

What, with theatres, TV's, parties and various forms of diversion, their time is so filled with these things that they have none left in which to read and meditate upon God's word or attend religious services.

In time past there was little for us to engage in for recreation or pastime. And when religious services were announced, everyone almost, attended because it furnished something to do—a place to go. But now there are plenty of places to go and things to do. The inevitable conclusion is that people today are simply not giving themselves a chance with reference to Christianity. They are not giving God a chance to influence them through his word to make the proper choice in the affairs of life.

If anything is done about these things it is going to be up to us who understand them and are aware of the reasons behind them. Many have been the efforts made to overcome the difficulties which confront us in these modern times with regard to interesting folks in matters of religion.

tion and social affairs, it would be well to introduce these things into religion and maintain a program of this kind along with the teaching of the word of God in the hope that some religion may "rub off" on those who come for the innovations. This means is proving disastrous in many religious circles. Of course, those who know and love the truth, can readily see the fallacy and danger of the solution just mentioned.

We honestly believe that the only solution lies with the individual Christian who understands these matters and has a desire to do something about it. We might start with those who attend only one service per week and try to prevail upon them to devote more time to the study of the Lord's word and participation in the other services of the church.

We need to make a personal appeal to these people to consider the Lord's word and the affairs of his church of greater importance than the gratification of their fleshly desires. Then we need to try personally to interest people who never attend to give themselves and the Lord a chance to save their souls. And keep the church pure and free of innovations so when folks do attend, it will be for that which is holy.

'Fish-Up' Lenten Treats With Tuna Dishes

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

CANNED tuna has many interesting uses. In our house, we like it just "as is," served on a platter garnished with lettuce and lemon slices.

It is delicious, also, in a casserole with olives. Simply combine a can of condensed mushroom soup and one of condensed celery soup in a casserole and add a quarter of a can of milk to two cans of soup. Then add tuna, drained of oil. Also add lemon juice to taste and a small jar of small, pimento-stuffed olives (drained). Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees F.) about 30 minutes. Serve with rice.



Spaghetti with tuna sauce goes swimmingly on the Lenten menu. Serve with a tossed salad. Parmesan cheese goes well on the tuna-spaghetti dish.

Spaghetti With Tuna Sauce (4-6 servings)

Three tablespoons fat, 1 small clove garlic, minced, 1/2 cup finely diced onion, 1/2 cup finely diced celery, two 8-ounce cans tomato sauce, 1 teaspoon kitchen bouquet, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon oregano, 2 cups sliced carrots, 1 pound spaghetti, cooked, 1/2 cup sliced green pepper, 7-ounce can tuna fish, 1 tablespoon minced parsley. Melt fat in saucepan. Add garlic, onion and celery. Cook over moderate heat for 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Add contents of cans of tomato sauce. Kitchens bouquet, water, salt, pepper, sugar, oregano and carrots (sliced diagonally, about 1/4-inch thick). Bring to boil. Lower heat and let simmer until it is the desired consistency, about 15 to 20 minutes longer. Meanwhile, cook spaghetti in boiling, salted water until barely tender (about 10 to 12 minutes). When sauce is of the desired thickness, add green pepper, parsley and tuna, which has been drained and coarsely flaked, and let simmer about 5 minutes longer. Drain spaghetti, arrange on serving platter. Top with spaghetti sauce. Serve with grated Parmesan cheese.

There are probably scores of Eastland County couples who couldn't locate their marriage licenses if someone were to offer them a try at the \$64,000 question if they could produce it.

Truth of that statement can be found in the County Clerk's office, where old marriage licenses dating back to before the turn of the century can be found. The licenses have been carefully preserved throughout the years, although it is not the duty of the clerk to do so.

Before you start laughing about someone who would forget his own marriage license, you had better check on your own. It's easier to do than you would think. For if you remember, when you purchased your license, it was given to you, but when you were mar-

ried, the minister or judge who read the ceremony had to take the license so that it could be recorded with the clerk. That's the time many newly-weds forget that they have to call at the clerk's office to pick up their licenses, and that's how the large collection of old licenses has been handed down from clerk to clerk so that finally Johnson Smith has them.

Some of the oldest licenses in the clerk's office are dated 1893, when W. C. Bedford was county clerk. Fifteen marriage certificates are dated that year.

Licenses dated in that year were issued to P. L. Pate and Miss Mattie B. Lear, B. H. Singley and Miss Z. T. Byrd, H. R. Young and Miss E. L. Johnson, W. H. Jeffries and Miss E. M. Strange, S. L. 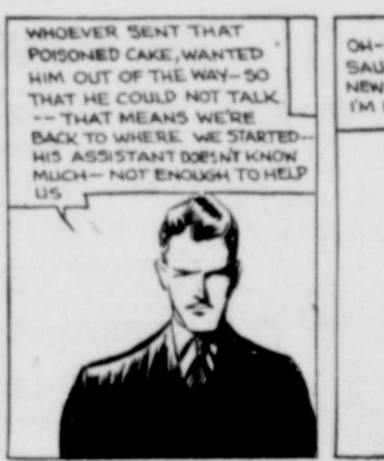
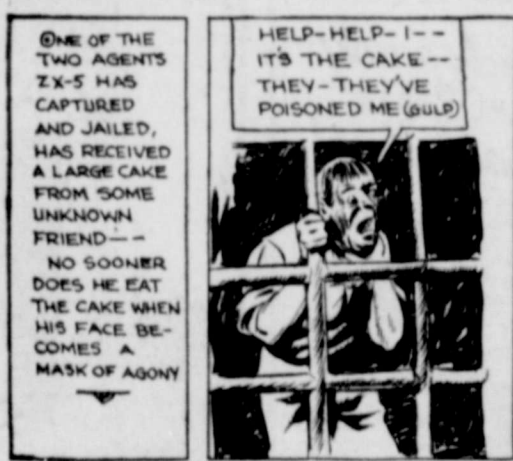

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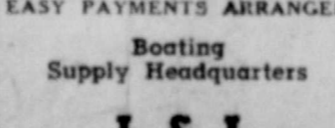
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Eastland County Delegates To Attend District HD Convention

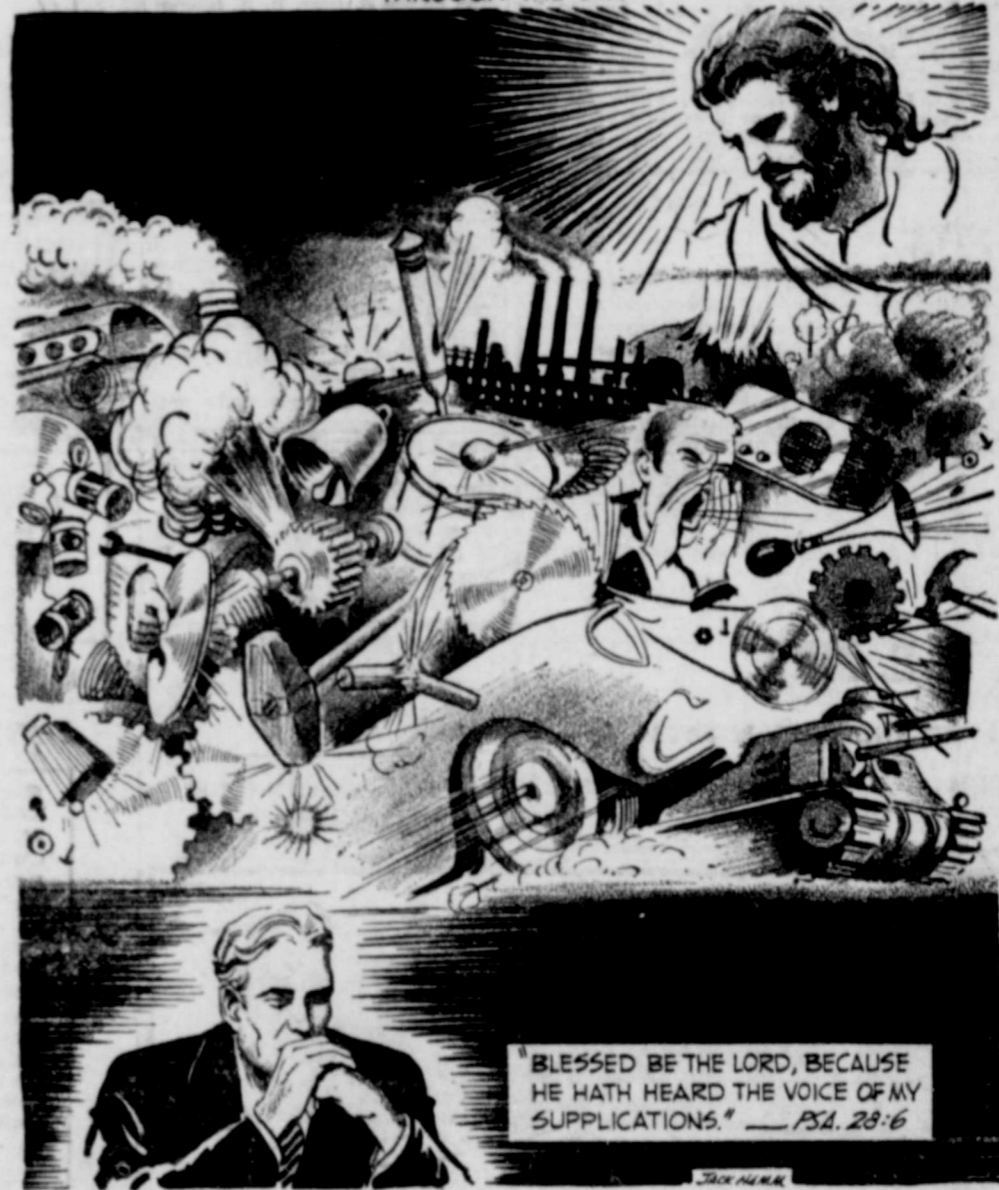
