Barbecue Corned Beef Medley (4 servings)

Three tablespoons fat, ½ cup chopped onions, ½ cup chopped celery, 1 cup tomato sauce (8 ounces), ½ cup catsup, 1 cup water, ¼ teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons sugar, 3 tablespoons vinegar, 2 tablespoons kitchen bouquet, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 2 cups cooked corned beef, julienne style (½ pound), 1½ cups corn cut off cob or one 12-ounce can whole kernel corn, drained; 1 table-spoon cornstarch, 2 tablespoons water.

 Heat fat in 2-quart saucepan. Cook onion over moderate heat until soft but not brown. Add celery, tomato sauce, pepper, sugar, vinegar, kitchen bouquet and Worcestershire sauce. Simmer for 10 minutes. Add corned beef and corn and cook until thoroughly heated. Serve over toasted picnic buns or split, hot biscuits.
