Foul Play Hinted In Train Death

Mrs. George C. O'Sullivan, whose husband was found dead in the Texas and Pacific Railway right of way near Santo early Wednesday morning, has hinted that robbery may have been the cause of her husband's fatal plunge from a train.

Mrs. O'Sullivan has revealed that an unidentified man in the men's room of a T & P coach was the last person to see her 70-year-old husband alive. She said that she believed that \$80 or \$90 of her husband's money was missing from his billfold.

When discovered on the right of way, Sullivan's billfold contained \$97.18, but Mrs. O'Sullivan said he had \$200 when they left California and that he had spent only about \$20 on meals en route.

Mr. and Mrs. Sullivan, both former residents of Jack County, were enroute to Dallas, where O'Sullivan was going to have a check of a skin cancer on his face.

Mrs. O'Sullivan reported that she last saw her husband about 4 a.m. when he told her that he was shaving in the men's room and mentioned having an interesting conversation with a man he had met there.

Mrs. Sullivan, falling back to sleep, did not miss her husband until the train arrived in Fort Worth. A brother from Azle was there to meet her and when they found that O'Sullivan was not on the train they asked railway officials to help them.

O'Sullivan's body was found by a T&P signal maintenance man in the meantime.

Arrangements have been made for O'Sullivan's body to be shipped back to the West Coast for burial.

Results Of West Texas Survey Noted

R. V. Galloway, manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, was the only member of the local chamber to attend a meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at the Crazy Hotel at Mineral Wells Wednesday.

Main speaker for the event was Dr. Sidney L. Miller, noted economic analyst, professor at the University of Pittsburgh, and author of "Tomorrow in West Texas."

Dr. Miller told the group that the future of West Texas is in the hands of the people. He previously wrote the book after an extensive survey of the area.

Dr. Miller stated that he recommends in his book that West Texas follow more soundly the paths which the area is already traveling, but made suggestions as to how this could be done. He suggested a livestock feeding program, rather than the practice of shipping to other states for feeding. He also suggested an expanding fruit program.

"Despite the fact that you think of your state as being advanced in flocks and herds, you have a long way to go to match other states," Dr. Miller declared. He pointed out the need for pasture land improvement and said that great deterioration had taken place in the lands of Texas in the past 50 years.

Dr. Miller was introduced by Frank Kelly of Colorado City who was chairman of the committee named to start project of the survey of West Texas which was sponsored jointly by the WTCC and the Texas and Pacific Railroad.

Cisco Man Given Five Years For Theft of Auto

A Cisco man, received a five year penitentiary sentence in District Court in Eastland this week.

Maxwell Keith Huey waived his right to jury trial and was found guilty of charges of auto theft and burglary of private residence at night.

Huey, who was prosecuted by District Attorney Joe Nussle, was charged with burglary of the M. D. Hanel residence in Cisco and with theft of an automobile owned by Gene Congleton of Cisco. His sentence was handed down by District Judge Turner Collie.

Another case which originated in District Court also reached completion this week. William C. Lewis of Rising Star, who was found guilty of a liquor violation last summer, has completed serving a 30 day jail sentence and paying a fine of \$500 plus costs of court.

Lewis appealed his conviction, but the State Court of Criminal Appeals upheld his Eastland County conviction. Later he asked for a re-hearing, which was also denied.

Three Youths On Parent Probation Following Theft

Three Ranger youths, two 16 and one 14, were put on parent probation and ordered to report to Police Chief W. G. Pounds once a week, after they were taken into custody for stealing a car battery Monday.

The three youths were sentenced Tuesday by Juvenile Court Judge John Hart.

The battery stolen was taken from a junked car. The license number of the car the three were driving was reported to the police by the owner of the car from which the battery was taken.

Police later recovered the battery from a junk dealer.

University Women Among Least Known

The Ranger Branch of the American Association of University Women is probably one of the least known civic organizations in the area, but each year they contribute much to various projects while continuing their common purpose of educational work to the widest sense and on a level to make use of college training.

Locally, the group is headed by Mildred Balch, president. She is assisted by Mrs. Howard Oliver, secretary, and Mrs. Jettye Balenger, treasurer. Mrs. H. L. Coody, formerly served as the club's vice president until moving from this area.

Each AAUW branch works out its program according to the interests of its members and community needs but never dismissing the idea of education. In general, these lines of interest are developed: education, social studies, status of women, the arts and fellowships.

The branch here is definitely interested in better public schools—studying local school budgets, analyzing needs of education and mobilizing public support to meet them. They sponsor projects to extend and improve educational facilities of all kinds.

For the past two consecutive years, the local AAUW has sponsored the Reed Lawton productions, a group of children plays. Funds from the productions were donated to the Youth Canteen in 1955. Profits from this year's show has not been dispensed, but Miss Balch says, "We'll find some good use for them."

In past years, the organization has also provided a girl with a scholarship to Ranger Junior College. They have donated to every important campaign within the city since their organization June 30, 1941.

Women of the group are allowed membership only if the college they attended is accredited by the National AAUW.

Also, women not currently registered as undergraduates are eligible for associate membership in any branch which grants such membership if they have completed as regularly matriculated students in any college or university on the approved list at least two full years of non-professional work, such as would be credited toward an approved degree.

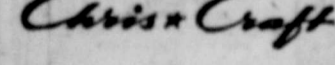
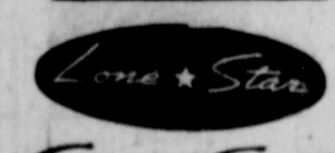
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Dr. Howell To Speak At First Baptist

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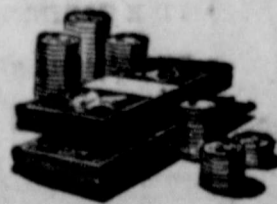
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
