Nussle Asks Re-Election As County Attorney

Joe Nussle, candidate for re-election as county attorney, today issued a formal statement in behalf of his candidacy.

The statement is as follows:

"I have considered it a distinct honor to represent you as your county attorney for the last few years. I sincerely and earnestly solicit your votes and support for another term. As many of you know, I was born and raised in Eastland County. I attended the University of Texas for my college education and was admitted to the bar in 1943, while I was undergoing aviation cadet training. Following my military service of over two years with the Air Force, during which I flew 58 combat missions as a bomber pilot in Europe, I moved to Eastland County with my wife, Gayle, and my daughter, Lucille, now 11, and established our residence in Ranger. We have lived there ever since, bought our home on a G.I. loan and increased our family by adding Joe, Jr., 3 years old.

After six years of private practice, I was privileged to be appointed by the Commissioners' Court to fill out the unexpired term of our esteemed Judge Elzo Bees, as county attorney. I have devoted all of my time and energies to fulfilling the multitude of duties of my office and have benefited by this experience. After this service, I feel better qualified in every way, at age 35, to serve even more efficiently. I assure you that I have strived to do my very best to serve fairly, honestly and conscientiously.

"I have been particularly concerned with the importance of patience and understanding in our work with our junior citizens — our juveniles. I have tried to give these cases every measure of attention they deserved. I have tried to be gentle and discreet in our work with those senior citizens unfortunate enough to require the facilities of our State institution for mental disorders. I have tried to prosecute vigorously, fairly and impartially all violations of our criminal statutes and still recommend use of our probationary statutes in meritorious cases. I take pride in my record of public service in Eastland County and urge each and every voter to inquire about it to their satisfaction before election day.

"Do not think a public office should be treated like a suit of clothes, to be worn, then discarded, and then worn yet again, as it may suit the convenience and desires of the individual at any given moment.

"I earnestly seek one more term as your County Attorney and pledge to you that if I am elected I will never betray your confidence, nor bring discredit to the position of high public trust and responsibility which you have bestowed upon me.

"It is my desire and intention to see every citizen personally before July 28. This may not be possible, however, and to those who I am unable to see, please consider this as a sincere solicitation of your vote and active support in my behalf."

More Than 500 Exes Have Been Located

In his junior year, John was a member of the Junior National Rifle association team that placed first in Alaska, winning in the "I Speak for Democracy" contest and vice-president of a debating society.

In his senior year, John was president of the senior class; co-editor of the high school newspaper; president of the Anchorage chapter of the National Honor society; vice-president of the National Theatrical society, Troop 700; member of the student council; member of the Anchorage chapter, Quill and Scroll society; and received the gold star award from the National Scholastic Press association.

Two New Oil Tests Slated For County

Brightest spot in the Eastland area-oil news this week was the announcement that a wildcat and a regular field try have been staked.

The wildcat is a proposed 1000 foot casing tool try to the Tannehill sand being put down by Lynn V. Shirk and A. C. Moore of Cisco. It is the No. 1 Stewart and spots 460 feet from the north line and 990 feet from the east line of Section 130, Block 3, H&TC Survey, two and three fourths miles northeast of Scranton on a 160 acre lease. It is one mile southeast of a shallow marginal producer.

The other county try is the No. 1 D. S. Howard being drilled by Jarbo Oil Company, Inc. of Houston. Location is 2450 feet from the north line and 200 feet from the east line of the Victor Souza Survey A-443, 3 1/2 miles southeast of Deedlemons on a 80.5 acre lease. Proposed depth is 1939 feet with rotary. Jarbo Oil Company is operating out of Eastland.

STEPHENS COUNTY
In Stephens County, George Blackerby, et al, of Wichita Falls has staked the No. C-7 L. C. Link "C" five miles southeast of Caddo. Proposed depth is 1850 feet.

Lloyd H. Smith, Inc. of Houston has staked the No. 2 W. O. Cross 14 miles northeast of Caddo in Section 2 A&M Survey A-2603. It is to go 4200 feet with rotary.

Another new try near Caddo is the No. 1-A J. A. Carey being put down by Echols and Dofflemeyer of Breckenridge. The well spots four miles southwest of Caddo in Section 3, Block 6, T&P Survey. Proposed depth is 3000 feet.

J. R. Coody of Breckenridge has staked the No. 1 J. R. Coody, et al, 18 miles southeast of Breckenridge. Proposed depth is 2800 feet and the well is located in Section 44, Block 4, T&P Survey.

Jack Chamberlain of Eastland has staked the No. 2 A. W. Branda as a wildcat two miles southwest of Frankell in the southeast part of the county one-half mile west of recently opened Strawn production by Fletcher Oil and Gas Drilling Corp. Proposed depth is 2800 feet with rotary to the Strawn sand.

He especially praised the group for signing up acreage for deer stocking. He expressed the belief that 20,000 acres would be signed up and that now more than 12,000 acres have been signed up with several thousand more promised.

COUNTY FARM BUREAU VOICES PEANUT SCREEN OPPOSITION

Ninrod Community Club had on its best bib and tucker on Thursday night, June 14, when Eastland County Farm Bureau Directors met in a joint meeting with Comanche County members as guests. Approximately 60 persons attended the meeting.

President of Eastland County Farm Bureau, Mitchell Campbell, introduced the Comanche County Service Agent, Don Chester, and Mr. and Mrs. Hezlie Dean, and several others from Comanche County. Also R. J. Gist, director District 7, J. D. Jordan, SWFGA, and S. E. Cloninger, manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, who was principal speaker.

Cloninger spoke on the problem currently facing farmers on the 1956 crop — that of screening peanuts, with a larger size, than used last year, and definitely means a losing to all peanut growers in this area.

Foreign material also presents a problem, as in the past, and regulations are under consideration to improve this phase of marketing peanuts and was discussed at the Thursday night session.

Farm Bureau members of Eastland County, together with those of Comanche, moved to present a resolution opposing the increase of

screen size in grading this year's peanut crop.

The resolution committee, headed by Luther Cunningham, of Gorman, went into action this week in drawing up a resolution to that effect and sending to the proper legislative channel.

Ninrod Community Club women served refreshments at the close of the meeting.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D.C. — An event of no small proportions occurred in Washington this past week. It made front-page news, but not particularly the main headlines.

The event was the dedication of the new AFL-CIO Building, located just across the park from the White House.

President Eisenhower was present to deliver the main dedication speech, and referred to his presence as a "neighborly call from my place across the square."

I have driven by this very fine and impressive \$4 million building of seven or eight stories, which dazzles with its symbolic display of wealth and power.

It is said that privately some of the labor leaders are half embarrassed and self-conscious about the swank and conspicuous luxury of their official mansion. On the other hand, many industrial leaders congratulate labor on its outward sign of material success, and regarded it as an illustration of the American way of doing things.

Probably no greater pressure has been applied by the President and his top Administration officials than was exercised on the Foreign Aid Bill.

In addition to an all-out effort of the Administration to have almost twice the amount of money appropriated at this time than was provided last year, the leadership of both the Republicans and Democrats in the Congress also exerted every effort for the authorization of \$4,900,000,000 for foreign aid.

The Foreign Affairs Committee cut \$1,100,000,000 from the bill, and under the able leadership of Congressman James P. Richards of South Carolina, chairman of the committee, the House of Representatives overrode the request of the President and the top leadership on both sides of the aisle to retain the reduced figure.

Even after the reduction of funds, I could not support the bill for three main reasons: (1) The President has recommended a re-approval of our entire foreign policy as related to foreign aid; (2) Figures show that countries in Europe have recovered economically sufficiently to defend themselves, but are not dedicating their resources to their own defenses accordingly; and (3) There remains almost \$7 billion unexpended in the foreign aid "pipeline."

Movement To Aid Texas Quail Is Outlined

Progress on two fronts were reported by the Assistant Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission who is supervising efforts to aid a Texas quail comeback.

He said rains in East Texas have "picked up" habitat in the area destined to receive most of the young bobwhites from the state's experimental quail hatchery near Tyler.

At the hatchery, between four and five thousand eggs are in the incubators. Delivery of the young birds is tentatively scheduled for the latter part of June, after they spend four weeks in brooders plus two weeks in the "hardening pens."

The Assistant Executive Secretary said applications for the pen raised quail, which will be issued on a cost basis, indicate that some persons misunderstood a basic requirement. This provides that the game birds will be distributed only where food and cover provisions have been made subject to approval of the local game warden.

"The Commission has re-emphasized that the primary purpose of this experiment is to create interest in quail habitat," he said. "The reason for this policy is that our quail population crisis developed only because of habitat shrinkage."

The Assistant Executive Secretary said persons interested in helping stock the hatchery quail should write the Commission in Austin.

Meat and milk production can be cut by insect pests which attack livestock during the summer months. Extension Entomologist C. F. Garner says such pests as hornflies, spinoe ear ticks and stable flies can be controlled with dips, smears or sprays made of the proper pesticides. Local county agents can supply detailed information on recommended pesticides and treatment practices.

There'll Be No 'Beef' Over These Budget-Wise Beef Dishes

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

GROUND BEEF can be used in so many good-tasting and economical ways. The U.S. Department of Agriculture predicts that the supply of beef will continue heavy and with prices low. And here, homemakers, are two new recipes using ground beef.

Pickle Supper Loaf (Makes 4 servings)

One pound ground chuck, 1/4 cup sweet pickle relish, 1/2 cup fine dry bread crumbs, 1/4 cup milk, 1 egg, beaten; 1/4 cup chopped onion, 1 teaspoon salt, freshly ground pepper, 3 slices bacon.

Pickle Meat Ball Casserole (Makes 4-5 servings) One pound ground beef chuck, 1/2 pound ground pork sausage, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground pepper, 4 slices bacon, 1/2 cup chili sauce, 1/2 cup sweet pickle relish, 1/4 cup water, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 2 medium-size onions, sliced; one 1-pound can baked beans.

drain on absorbent paper; crumble bacon. Brown meat balls in bacon drippings. Drain off all but 2 tablespoons drippings. Combine chili sauce, pickle relish, water and brown sugar; mix well. Pour over meat balls and add onion slices. Cook over low heat 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Combine baked beans and bacon in greased, 1 1/2-quart casserole. Arrange meat balls and sauce over bean mixture. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 45 minutes.

The meeting was closed with the group saying "The Lord's Prayer" in unison.



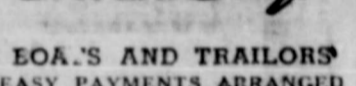
