It makes eleven medium glasses of sparkling jeweltoned jelly - each fit for the king or queen of your house!

Strawberry Jelly

Yield: about 11 medium glasses (51/2 lbs. jelly)

854 cups juice (about 235 qts. 34 cup lemon juice (2 lemons) ripe strawberries) 735 cups (334 lbs.) sugar 1 bottle liquid fruit pectin

First, prepare the julce. Crush thoroughly about 235 quarts rully ripe strawberries. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 334 cups juice into a very large saucepan. Squeeze and strain the juice from 2 medium-sized lemons. Measure 34 cup into saucepan with strawberry juice. Then make the jelly. Add sugar to juice in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. At once stir in liquid fruit pectin. Then bring to a full rolling-boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim off foam with metal spoon, and pour quickly into glasses. Cover jelly at once with 34 inch hot paraffer
