Kiln 6, New Crusher Added To American Aggregate Installation



MINUTE OFF RANGER TEXAS KILN NO 6

"ANOTHER BIG 'UN"—Kiln No. 6 for the American Aggregate company, is shown as it passed through Ranger en route to the plant where it will soon be in operation. The "big 'un" is 85 feet in length, and due to restrictions of the highway department, 10 feet were removed in order that it might be transported by truck. The 10-foot section will be attached to this 75-footer at the plant.

With the installation of kiln six and a new \$8000 crusher, the American Aggregate company is rolling along in its expansion program. The present project is expected to be completed in 45 to 60 days, and will continue until about Jan. 1, 1957, according to Emmett Korff and Frank Bomar, company men.

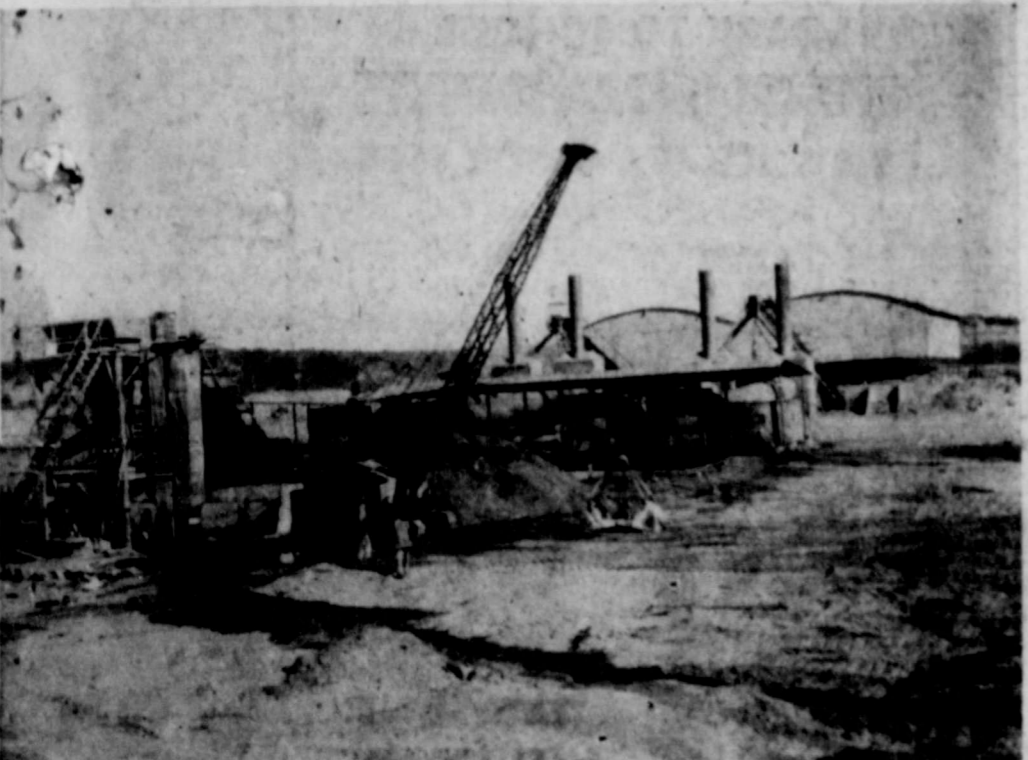
about two months and along with kiln five, a recent addition, the two new kilns will increase production about 50 per cent, it is said.

An engineering feat, of no mean accomplishment, the giant kilns are pulled by a small 5-horsepower motor, and turn at the rate of one-and-one-half revolutions per minute. Starting cold, the company representatives said, it takes from 18 hours up to bring

the temperature to the necessary reading to place the kilns in production. Average output is from 100 yards to 125 yards each 24 hours.

The addition of the new crusher, already in operation, will create a speed-up of some 15 per cent, it is asserted.

When present expansion plans are completed, the installation will be among the largest in the nation, according to reports.

To the Citizens of Ranger:

A building worth at least \$35,000 is available to Ranger Junior college. The cost of relocation will amount to approximately \$3,500. The small share required by us will give us an excellent college-community dining facility useful to the growth and health of our town. We would like to point out a few of the facts about Ranger Junior college which merit your support:

1. Ranger Junior college receives support from the state for teaching salaries. This state money must all be spent for instruction. No part of the state appropriation can be used for building.
2. Local taxes for Ranger Junior college amount to approximately \$19,000 yearly, while Ranger Junior college brings to our town over 10 times that amount.

Anthony White Speaks at Ranger Rotary Club Meet

Members of the Ranger Rotary club held their regular Wednesday luncheon meeting at the Ghossein hotel.

Rotarian G. C. McGowan introduced Rotarian Anthony White, manager of the Boss Glove company plant, Cisco, who brought the program.

White presented each member and guest present with a pair of Boss flannel work gloves, compliments of the factory.

The company was founded in Kewanee, Ill. in 1889 and opened its Cisco plant in 1944. Since 1946, White said, the company has increased its Cisco operations five times over. In 1946, when he became manager, some 60 persons were employed with a payroll of approximately \$2000 per week. Today there are 250 employees with some \$10,000 per week in the pay envelopes.

The Breckenridge plant of the company was recently re-opened, it was stated.

About one carload of cotton flannel is used by the Cisco branch, while approximately a carload of leather is used every two to three months. So far this year, approximately 100 million yards of thread has been used in plant operations.

Price Daniel Gives 622,000 Thanks

Sen. Price Daniel—this week thanked the 622,000 Texans who gave him their overwhelming lead in the first primary race for governor, putting him more than 162,000 votes ahead of his run-off opponent.

"This is the widest lead a candidate for Governor ever has had in a run-off," Daniel said. "I am confident that, with hard work,

we can win a landslide victory on August 25."

Daniel, a native of Liberty county, maintains his family home on a small ranch near his birthplace and is a member of the REA.

As a U.S. senator, he supported 90 per cent parity on basic crops, authored an amendment to the farm bill which placed grain sorghum supports at a comparable level as corn, and helped obtain more realistic farm credit provisions.

Daniel is advocating a state-wide water and soil conservation program, and a state drought relief program that would include loans to farmers and ranchers facing mortgage foreclosure.

His program also includes stepped-up research into proposals to create additional water supplies, such as conversion of salt water and artificial "rainmaking."

Daniel said that as governor he would "put the full power of the state government behind our farmers and ranchers, to help them regain their fair share of the national income and to help them fight the worst drought disaster in our history."

Burning Trash, Grass, Cause Four Alarms

Four trash and grass fires have called out the local fire department two days this week.

Fire Chief Charlie Lubell, Wednesday issued a warning to all people to keep trash burning under control at all times especially in time of drought.

"While burning trash or other refuse, keep a lid or cover of some kind on the container, to prevent the flaming debris from starting grass fires," the chief said.

On Tuesday, a grass fire was reported on Pershing street, calling out the department.

At 2 p.m. Tuesday, a pasture fire south of Marton Valley was reported and the departments of Ranger, Eastland and Cisco responded. This was a 3-hour battle by the firemen before being brought under control.

At 2:10 p.m. while the department was out at Marton Valley, a grass and trash fire alarm was turned in from Eastland Hill.

Repressuring of Water Lines to Begin Saturday

The city of Ranger will start another improvement this Saturday. Work will begin to repressure the water mains in some sections of the city.

A 4-inch main will tie onto a 12-inch on the T&P railway right-of-way to repressure the Ranger Junior college area.

Mayor Urges Local Citizens to Increase Water Use In City

Mayor Lee Dockery stated today that while many of the towns in Texas are rationing water by various means, from alternate days for outside watering to imposing fines for such watering, Ranger because of abundant water in Lake Leon, finds itself in the very enviable position of being able to urge people to use more water.

Of course there are still some sections of town that have low pressure due to inadequate mains and these are being corrected as fast as funds and time will allow.

In the meantime however, Dockery pointed out that increased use in sections that have good pressure will not materially effect low pressure areas, and the additional revenue from increased water sales will enable the city to make additional corrections to mains in low pressure areas.

Dockery stated that Lake Leon has ample water for a number of years without additional run-in, and the people of Ranger are very fortunate in having secured such a source supplying almost unlimited water of excellent quality.

The mayor explained that per capita water consumption in Ranger had increased from an average of 49 gallons per day in 1940 to a present average of approximately 152 gallons per capita per day which has seriously overtaxed line capacities in some areas, but as pointed out above, corrective measures are being made just as fast as funds will allow, and where at all possible temporary lines are being installed to give some relief to such areas.

C of C Directors In Routine Business Meeting Tuesday

The Chamber of Commerce board of directors met in regular session Tuesday evening, 7:30, at the chamber office.

T. C. Wylie, chairman of the agriculture committee, reported on a meeting held at the Cheaney community Monday night. It was stated that a community progressive club had been organized in the locality.

Morris George, chairman of the highway and airport committee, stated that plans were complete for painting of a sign on the hanger roof. Plans call for the sign to be on the west side with letters to be 20 feet high. He will be assisted in the project by Joe Collins and Charles Bonney.

George reported that a conference was held Monday with Ranger business men, Bob Milligan, district engineer of Brownwood and Gordon Smith, resident engineer, Eastland.

At this conference it was stated by the engineers that it was "probable" that the proposed road would be put in the next 1-year program, to be made up the latter part of August, or the first part of September. It was pointed out that the road from highway 80, to Lone Cedar, where it intersects road 570, was in the current 10-year program previously made up and handed the engineer when he took over the district. This hard - surface road passes one - and - one - half miles northwest of the dam at Lake Leon.

The statement was made at the conference, that it "was barely possible" that the road proposed by people of Ranger could be included in the next program. If this could be worked out, it was said, there is a possibility that the road "may be built next spring."

Other routine business was disposed of at the meeting.

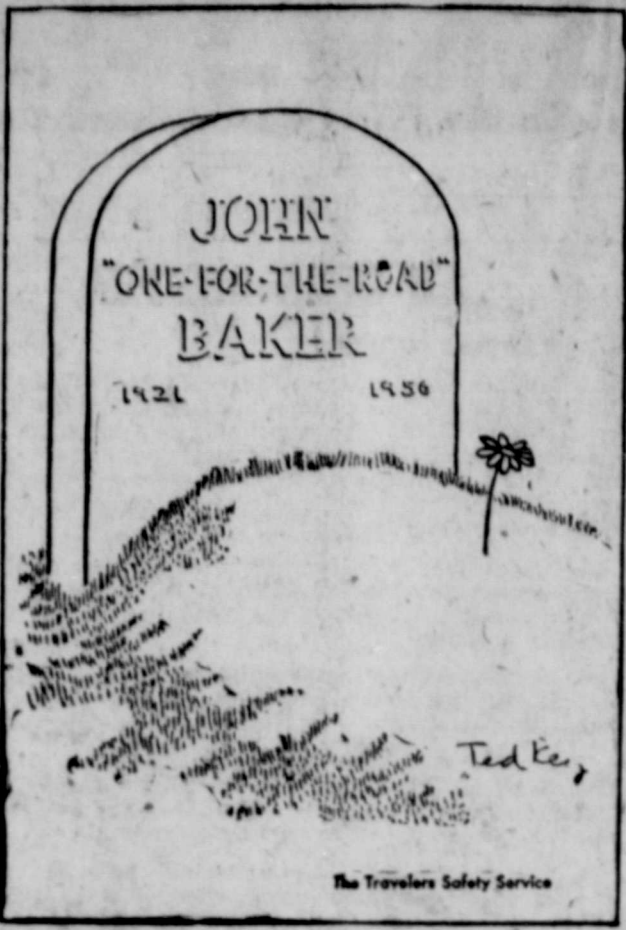

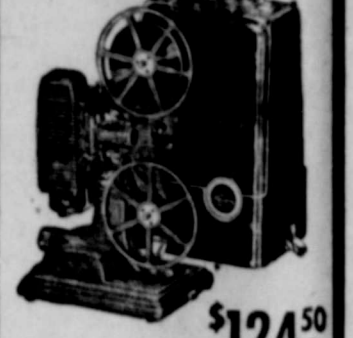

Thrillarama Premier Today Soon To Be Shown At Majestic Theatre

Much that is new and exciting is happening in the movie industry these days. It hasn't always been that way, as from 1927, when the screen first found its voice, until a quarter century later, there was little progress aside from minor technical improvements.

But when "This Is Cinerama" was premiered on Broadway on September 30, 1952, its impact was so violent that it washed away almost overnight the lethargy that had beset the industry for 25 years.

Cinerama challenged and the industry accepted. An almost forgotten screen novelty was dusted off, technically revamped and presented as something new. Called "3-D" (for third dimension), it had only one fault; one had to wear special polaroid glasses to view it. This one fault was its Achilles heel; the necessity of wearing glasses quickly killed its popularity.

Then came a new wide-screen process, CinemaScope, which at once spelled the doom of the old-fashioned, standard size movie screen. CinemaScope exploded the screen horizontally, to break through the dimensional barrier that had always held the movies to the width-height proportion of a postage stamp.

Searching for a means to achieve a Cinerama-like effect at an operational cost substantially less than the enormously expensive Cinerama system entails, Mike Todd got together with the American Optical Company and came up with a remarkable optical, camera and projection system called Todd-AO. Like Cinerama, its picture is presented on a deeply curved screen. Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Oklahoma!" the first attraction filmed in Todd-AO, is enjoying great success wherever presented. However, because of high installation cost.

Bible Comment:

Suffering Brings Fellowship In Christ

WHEN Jesus hung upon the cross, one of the two thieves between whom He was crucified reviled Him, urging Him to save Himself and them. The other thief rebuked his fellow, reminding him they were suffering justly for their misdeeds, whereas Jesus was suffering for His innocence and goodness. The penitent thief had the reward of hearing Jesus say, "This day thou shalt be with me in Paradise."

It is the distinction between two kinds of suffering which Peter emphasizes in his writings that does so much to encourage suffering Christians.

The Christian who suffers is a partaker of the sufferings of Christ. Instead of being embittered, he may well glorify God. Certainly as we observe life, we can not very well say that the ideal life is entirely free from suffering.

We have seen those who have accepted the way of suffering patiently and in subjection to the will of God enabled by their experience, finding a deep satisfaction in life often denied to those whose ways have been easier and more pleasant.

Peter brings this philosophy of endurance of suffering into the realm of Christian faith and practice, emphasizing the part of humility and the strength that comes to men through casting all their cares upon God.

The mystery of pain has never been solved. We do not know why the innocent suffer with and for the guilty. We do know, however, that there is a fellowship in Christ's suffering which has brought to suffering Christians happiness and peace. And his, too, is a mystery.

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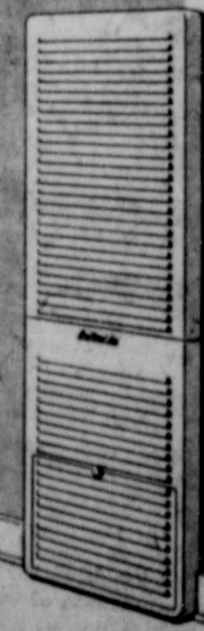

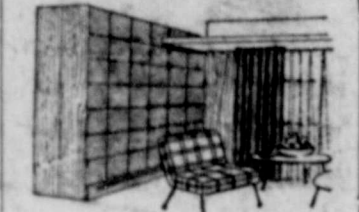

Bible Comment: Church Grew From Experience Of New Life

THE Christian Church did not arise out of plans of some emotional organizer. There was no advance prospectus or blueprint of a proposed organization. The Church definitely grew out of an experience. It was not a matter of organization awaiting or developing life; it was life leading to organization.

Although Jesus did not formally organize the Church, there was more organization associated with his ministry than is commonly supposed. He gathered about Him the apostles, to whom were committed special privileges and responsibilities, and with whom He communed concerning the deep things of the Kingdom, so that he developed an inner band of disciples—a sort of Christian cabinet—to carry on His work. Also, He organized the "seventy" who went through the villages teaching and preaching, two by two.

The Church, as I have said, had its origin in the experience of the new life. It began as these experiences found expression in the remarkable events on the Day of Pentecost. Here, as the disciples were gathered together in one place, there came a strange outpouring of spiritual power. Peter, who formerly had denied his Lord, preached with great boldness and courage about the reality of the Christian way, and brought home to the hearts and consciences of his hearers the realization of their sins. The result was that many were brought into the Christian way.

In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul sets before us a noble ideal, that of the Church as a body incorporating the spirit of Christ. The Church is still waiting for the fulfillment of that ideal, and the world itself will never find peace until the unity in love becomes the dominant mark of human society.
