### Midland Man Reminds U. S. That Nation's Men Still Can Produce Oil

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (Sp.)—Government was urged today to consult with domestic oil producers on any study of U. S. petroleum supply which might be needed should Middle East oil be disrupted in the Suez crisis.

Robert L. Wood, Midland, Tex., president of the Independent Petroleum Association of America, wrote Defense Mobilization Arthur S. Fleming that, "if there is to be a study of the important question of U. S. (oil) productive capacity, those best equipped and most directly affected should have a part in such study; these are the producers of oil in the U. S."

Quoting press reports that the office of defense mobilization director has asked 13 American oil importers "to work out plans for meeting any oil shortage in the U. S. or Europe that might result from the Suez Canal crisis," Wood said: "These news stories raise two questions of great concern to us. "The first is a presumption that shortage of oil in the U. S. is expected if the Suez crisis is not properly settled. "This presumption is unfounded and unjustified. There is now producing and reserve excess producing capacity in the U. S. in excess of total imports and far in excess of all oil shipped through the Suez canal for the U. S.

Your people were so kind and sweet; we drove on to our destination with a lasting memory of Ranger and its thoughtful citizens.

### He is a Mechanic; But His Bird Hobby Pays Off; It's Fun

Ben Pickle, is not what a fellow would call a large man, in size, nor is he a small man—but what started as a hobby, has him bustling now.  
Ben (B. G. to you) got to "monkeying round" with chukar partridges, and Chinese ringneck pheasants, just for fun — now look, what has happened.

Ben has a 4-tray incubator, capacity of 580 pheasant eggs, 600 chukar eggs. He hatches off about every 10 days, a batch of young pheasants and chukars, usually averaging around 80 per cent of the incubation.

Ben, his wife, the former Alberta Windham Burns and their 14-year-old son, Johnny, live out in the Glenn addition with their birds, and where most hobbies cost money, Ben makes his pay.  
Ben came from Atlanta, Ga., to Ranger back in the '20s, liked what he saw and remained—now he can't get away.  
His feed bill runs an average of \$60 per month. Starting with about 18 pheasants a n d 3 pair of chukars, Pickle now has about (we didn't count 'em) 55 pair of chukars and some 335 pheasants.  
Pheasants are usually ready when about 14 weeks old, and along about September he will have plenty on hand. One of the beauty spots is the fact that Mrs. Pickle will furnish recipes for cooking the birds.  
Prices range from \$2 on up. It is a nice hobby.

### Brashear Defends His Action As Vet Officer

Paul Brashear Thursday labeled his "purported removal" as an assistant veterans service officer as a "political move" and said "...the commissioners' court and their bonding companies are equally responsible for any 'illegal payment' made of county funds, along with the recipient thereof."  
Brashear's full statement, which came in the form of "an open" letter to the editor of the Ranger Times, follows:  
"Your article in the Aug. 14 issue of your paper concerning my purported removal by the commissioners' court as assistant veterans' service officer, compels me to make a public statement in my own behalf.  
"At the time of my appointment 19 months ago, the full com-

missioners' court, including Tip Arther, unanimously voted for it upon the recommendation of Lee Dockery, the county veterans' service officer, and after I was requested by the Cisco American legion post to take the job. I did not seek it but they were unable to find anyone else at the time in a position to serve. I entered into the work in good faith and assumed that the court was acting likewise in their appointment of me. I performed the duties as well and diligently as possible and I wish you could have consulted me (instead of Omar Burkett's cohort) before publishing your article as you would have found that while I was in Austin serving with the legislature, I resigned this veterans' post and the court appointed J. W. Sifton to take over. That arrangement lasted for seven months and then I was again unanimously reappointed by Tip Arther and the other members of the court. I have only actually served, and been paid for 12 months, and innocently drew \$540, instead of \$850; as reported in your paper. I am sure

that both Omar Burkett and Tip Arther knew such to be the true facts. I made little profit, if any, from the work as almost all of the \$45 a month was spent in trips to Waco, Dallas and McKinney in taking things to the boys I visited in the VA hospitals, at no expense to the county. I have no regrets concerning this point, however, as I was more than happy to be of what assistance I could.  
"In view of the recent attorney general's letter dated Jan. 16, 1956 (obtained by the county attorney, of Ector county, at the request of his friend, and my perennial opponent, Omar Burkett), I am naturally resigning, effective immediately. The entire matter is a complete surprise, and a source of extreme embarrassment to me and should be to Tip Arther. I know of nothing else to do in view of the recent developments."  
"However, I would like to point

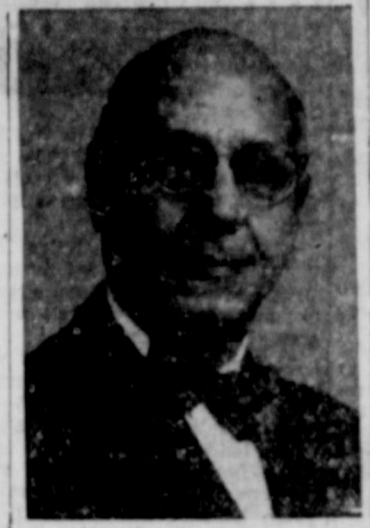
out that I am advised that under the law, the commissioners' court and their bonding companies are equally responsible for any "illegal payment" made of county funds, along with the recipient thereof. Because the court and I went into this arrangement together, I will most certainly insist that we see it through together, and that Tip Arther and the other commissioners, and their bonding companies, are made defendants with me in any suit brought against me to recover the money paid to me for fair and honest services rendered in good faith. However, I am further advised, and of the opinion that there is no basis for any lawsuit after the work was done and the money was paid and that the most that can be expected of me, either legally or morally, would be my resignation at this time, which I have already mentioned.

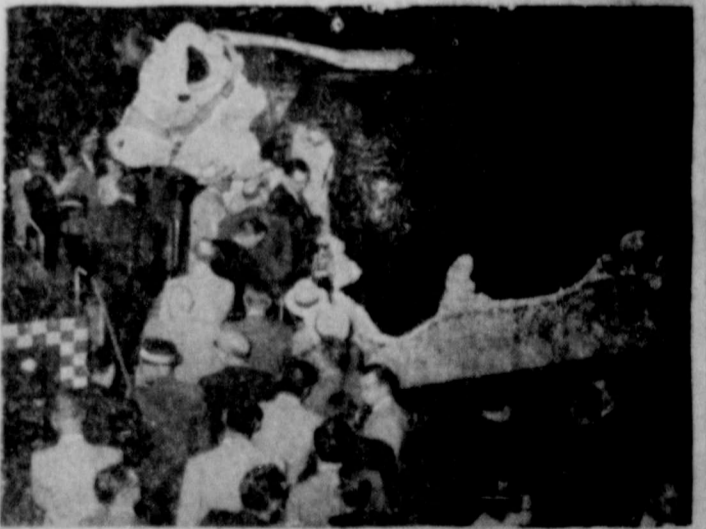
### S. A. Gaines Will Visit Ranger On Wednesday

The Rotary club of Ranger on Aug. 21 and 22 will be host to Sydney A. Gaines, governor of the 186th District of Rotary international, who is making his annual official visit to each of the 36 Rotary Clubs in Northwest Texas. Gaines will address the local club and will confer with club president David Pickrell, with club secretary Dewey Cox, and with committee chairman on Rotary administration and service activities.  
A member and past president of the Rotary club of Wichita Falls, Gaines was elected a district governor of Rotary international for the 1956-57 fiscal year at Rotary's 47th annual convention in Philadelphia last June. He is one of 248 district governors supervising the activities of more than 9100 Rotary clubs which have a membership of 431,000 business and professional executives in 99 countries of the free world. Gaines is general manager of United Electric company in Wichita Falls and for many years has given leadership to civic, fraternal, religious, and business activities on both local and state levels.

### GE Offers Its Safety Door To Manufacturers

General Electric company today offers to license other manufacturers to make its magnetic safety door for refrigerators.  
W. M. Timmerman, general manager of General Electric's household refrigerator department, made the announcement following signature yesterday by President Eisenhower of a law requiring manufacturers to equip refrigerator doors with safety closing devices so that they can be opened from the inside.  
The legislation is aimed at making it impossible for children to be trapped in abandoned refrigerators. During the past 10 years abandoned refrigerators have been responsible for the deaths of at least 115 children who shut themselves up in them, or were shut in them by their playmates. During 1955, alone, 18 children lost their lives in this manner. Ages of the children have ranged from two to 12 years.  
"General Electric company took the lead in putting an end to this threat to children's lives by developing its magnetic safety door," Timmerman said. "This device was incorporated in all our 1956 refrigerators. The door has no latch or other mechanical fastener. It is held closed by the action of a permanent Alnico magnet, and the pressure required to open it from the inside is so small that it can be easily opened by the instinctive action of a child pushing or kicking against it."  
"In the interest of national child safety," Timmerman continued, "we are glad to make our magnetic door available on a license basis to other refrigerator manufacturers."

# Record of Congress 'Generally Good' to Sports and Parks

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Where it took definite action, the record of the 84th congress on natural resources conservation was "generally good," according to a summary released by the National Wildlife Federation.  
The "dark spots" were mostly "sins of omission, in failure to face up to certain pressing problems," the federation said. It listed the following major conservation accomplishments of the Congress which adjourned July 27:  
1. Soil bank legislation that included forestry and wildlife objectives, and the supplementary Great Plains conservation program.  
2. A new water pollution law that has stronger enforcement teeth and provides federal grants to municipalities to help build sewage-treatment plants.  
3. Long-needed reform of the outmoded mining laws of 1872 for the purpose of preventing and eliminating fake mining claims on the public lands.  
4. Actions to strengthen and improve the national park system. These included defeat of Echo Park dam, a reclamation project proposed for construction in Dinosaur National monument in Colorado and Utah, and appropriations to start "Mission 66," a 10-year program of rehabilitation and improvement of the parks and monuments.  
5. Elevation of federal fish and wildlife functions by creation of a new assistant secretary of Interior and reorganization of the Fish and Wildlife service into two major bureaus, one for sport fisheries and wildlife, the other for commercial fisheries.  
6. Legislation to release \$134 million of federal aid wildlife funds that had been tied up in the treasury for 10 years.  
7. Revision of the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention act of 1954 to cut red tape, broaden the objectives, and accelerate the small watersheds program.  
The federation listed the following "serious problems left unsolved" by the 84th congress:  
1. Encroachments upon a national refuge through pressures for military land acquisition, oil development, mining, and "other forms of exploitation." The federation recommends legal safeguards for the refuges similar to those congress has erected for the national parks.  
2. Neglect of recreational and wildlife resources in the national forests, where booming public use—more than 40 million visits in 1955—have turned picnic areas and campgrounds into "outdoor slums." Conservationists have advocated earmarking a portion of national forest operating receipts for development of recreational facilities and wildlife habitat.  
3. Federal subsidies through farm programs and others that encourage the drainage of marshlands without which waterfowl and other kinds of wildlife cannot exist. Conservationists recommended eliminating the subsidies for unnecessary drainage and speeding up the acquisition and preservation of wetlands.  
4. The problem of securing adequate recognition of, and protection for, wildlife and recreational values in connection with federal river development projects.  
The "major black mark" on the conservation record of the 84th congress, according to the federation, was approval of an Army engineer project called Bruce Eddy dam on the Clearwater river in Idaho. This "black mark" was caused by President Eisenhower, however, in his veto of the omnibus rivers and harbors bill, which included the Bruce Eddy dam along with 112 other projects.  
Conservationists have opposed Bruce Eddy dam because it would eliminate spawning runs of migratory fish and flood out winter feeding grounds of elk and other big game.  
The National Wildlife Federation, the nation's largest conservation organization, is composed of state federations and sportsmen's leagues representing more than three million members. It distributes regular reports on conservation legislation while congress is in session.

their programs, therefore, to be secretly arrived at and confidentially withheld from others."  
"We believe this to be an improper approach to the solution of this problem."  
"Outside the violation of the antitrust laws involved," Wood said, "it contemplates passing on the position of the domestic industry and its abilities to supply our demands by companies whose outside interest in production is greater than the U.S."  
The IPAA president charged that representatives of importing companies "have long been trying to convince the American public, contrary to the facts, that U. S. oil could not be relied upon for our requirements." He added:  
"A misunderstanding of our domestic supply situation could cause such concern with the consumers of petroleum products and with governmental agents as to lead to action involving military programs or war."  
"There is no need to go to war to insure abundant supplies of petroleum products for American consumption," he said. "Whatever oil problem now presented through the Suez crisis is, in so far as American consumers are concerned, one of market convenience of a few American companies."  
"We recognize that their representatives are the proper ones for government conference on that question," he said. "When the question of our own productive capacity is purely domestic producers become the ones that should be consulted."  
Wood observed that the Suez controversy may result in a determination of ownership and toll rates in the canal, and "could spread the nationalization movement to other countries where oil is now produced by American companies."

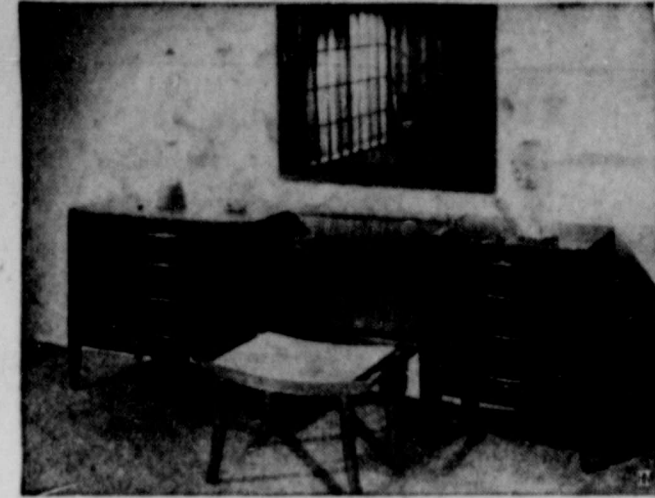

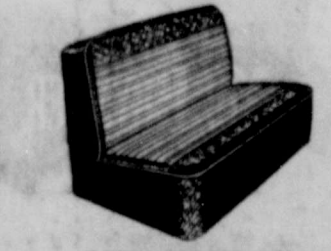
