Robert B. Hershey Assumes Duties As C. of C. Manager

Mr. Robert B. Hershey arrived in Dimmitt from Dallas last week to assume his duties as Secretary of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce. Hershey, who is an attorney, was employed recently by the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce to serve as secretary until such date as his law practice will require a major part of his time, or until another secretary can be secured.

Although Hershey is inexperienced in Chamber of Commerce work his background which is briefly outlined below, should be of much value in coping with the problems and discharging the duties as secretary of a newly formed Chamber of Commerce:

Following is a brief biographical sketch embodying some of the qualifications and experiences which should prove of inestimable value to Hershey as he assumes his new role in Chamber of Commerce work:

Thirty-six years of age, born at Johnstown, Pa.

Graduate of Allegheny College, Meadville, Pa., with an A. B. degree.

Graduate of Vanderbilt University Law School, Nashville, Tenn., with an LL. B. degree. Graduated from law school with honors and is a member of the Society of Lincoln's Inn, an honorary legal scholastic society.

Worked as an accountant on two separate occasions with the American Red Cross, during the flood disasters of 1936 and 1937 in the Ohio River Valley.

Went to Dallas, Texas in October 1937 and practiced law for three and one half years with Mr. J. F. Hyman, leaving him January 15, 1942 to enter the Military Welfare Service of the American Red Cross. Remained with this organization for four years during which time he was stationed at Ft. McPherson, Georgia, Alexandria, Virginia and overseas for one year in Italy and on the Islands of Corsica and Sardinia. In Corsica and Sardinia he had charge of the field and hospital work at 15 airfields and six station hospitals. At Alexandria, Va., was an Assistant Director of the Eastern Area.

After returning from overseas was stationed at Love Field, Dallas, Texas.

Since January 25, 1946 practiced law in the offices of Mr. Webster Atwell in Dallas, Texas. Mr. Atwell is the son of Federal District Judge W. H. Atwell of Dallas.

Married Edna Mae Shaffer of Toledo, Ohio and Dallas Texas on December 28, 1938; have no children.

Is now President of the North Texas Alumni Association of Phi Kappa Psi, a national collegiate social fraternity but plans to resign. Belongs to the Dervish Club of Dallas, a social club. Is a member of the Dallas and Texas State Bar Associations. Is a member and one of the organizers of Citizens United, a non-partisan organization in Dallas for the improvement of government on a national, state and local level. Member of the Vanderbilt Alumni Association of Dallas.

Mrs. Hershey will join her husband in Dimmitt in the near future.

Have you ever been to Hot Springs, Arkansas?

It's not so far from us Texans—325 miles from Fort Worth—less than from Wichita Falls to San Antonio for instance, and Texas folks think nothing of a drive like that.

Your columnist visited Hot Springs recently—and it was a most enjoyable experience. All activities seem to center on the main street because the city is in w sections which are connected only by that one thoroughfare, so closely do the mountains press at the midway point.

And such a main street! On one side is bathhouse row, palaces of stone in a setting of trees and velvety lawns, and in the distance the vast structure which is the Arlington Hotel; on the other side of the street, shops with displays of laces, jewelry and curios. People from every state in the Union saunter in a leisurely manner along the sidewalk. Incidentally, Texas ranks second for out-of-state visitors, Illinois being first.

There are sight-seeing buses drawn up at the curb, and there is a shooting gallery on that main street, the towers of the Arkansas side of a mountain. One spot was blasted out of solid rock to make room for a filling station and nearby is a bus stop which is only a few paces from a ledge of rock under which one can take refuge from rain.

Over yonder is an ancient two-seated carriage, the kind the governor used to ride in when there was a parade when you were a boy; and the old driver is wearing a high top hat. Honeymooners go for a drive in the quaint vehicle, and of course have their picture taken. From somewhere there comes the sound of music—and you look through a fringe of trees and see, in a park bandstand, an Army band.

Hot Springs has facilities for 31,000 visitors, declares Miss Alta Smith, of the Chamber of Commerce, who for years has ably publicized the city's many attractions. But the races were in progress and finding accommodations for the wife, her mother and myself was a problem—which Miss Smith solved by appealing to a former Texan, Vance Bryan, who used to run a big trucking business out of Kilzore and now is owner of the Jack Tar Court Hotel, favorite stopping place for famous athletes, big business men and movie stars—the

Sheriff Brown's Condition Still Highly Critical

Sheriff Garland Brown who recently underwent surgical treatment at a Lubbock hospital returned to Dimmitt Monday, in a highly critical condition, for further treatment. A blood clot which had affected Mr. Brown's right leg for the past several days made it imperative that the member be amputated Tuesday. The operation was performed by local doctors in the Plains Memorial Hospital. Critically ill since his first operation Sheriff Brown's condition has shown little if any improvement at any time.

PRECAUTIONS GIVEN FOR VACATIONISTS

Austin, Texas April 10—Some timely advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports now that swimming pools are open, was released from the State Health Department today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Vacation days are apt to include excursions and picnics at nearby lakes, rivers, and ponds of unfamiliar depths and currents, and some times without the usual lifeguard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools.

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted; "nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety, through carelessness or thoughtlessness, are disregarded."

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming in safety: when swimming, be alert and careful of unknown depths and currents; at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore and call it a day; if you become chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float, this is most important; never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; never swim in water that may be polluted.

Swimming close to or even a few miles below sewage outlets is inviting the possibility of acquiring disease.

"Excursions, picnics, and swimming parties contribute much to a healthy, happy, normal life, which is always desirable," Dr. Cox said. "It is by no means advisable to eliminate these excursions from our summer program, but it is important that they prove beneficial and not disastrous."

Initial Survey to Ascertain Natural Resources Planned

An overall comprehensive program for the development of Castro County was adopted by the Castro County Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night when the Board of Directors met in the District Court Room. The program was outlined and submitted to the directors by the Chamber of Commerce Secretary, Robert B. Hershey. Among the projects, immediate and long-range, proposed to and adopted by the Chamber of Commerce: An overall agricultural survey with the purpose of attracting more farmers to the county and more businesses to its towns; population survey, town and county; Research of industrial possibilities; Active support of Boys Farm; Publicity campaign for entire county; Development of county roads and highways.

The board of directors, acting on the advice of the secretary, is taking steps to have the organization incorporated, and is submitting an application for membership in the U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

Temporary office for the organization has been established in the rear room of the City Hall, the permanent office will be over the First State Bank Building.

The first and immediate undertaking of the Chamber of Commerce will be a beautification and property improvement program in the building and residential sections of the towns in the county and also encouragement of a similar program for the farm homes of the county. A mass meeting, especially for business property owners for consideration and discussion of the program will be held in the near future.

A detailed outline of the aims of the Chamber of Commerce will be published in a page advertisement in next week's issue of the News.

FINANCIAL PROGRAM

At the meeting Tuesday night the board of directors authorized the collection of dues from members beginning April 15. Notices will be mailed or presented to members who have signed pledges to make monthly payments to the organization. The first dues will be for the last half of April, then beginning May 1, dues will be collected monthly or annually, depending on the desire of the member. The April payment should be made immediately to Bob McLean at the First State Bank.

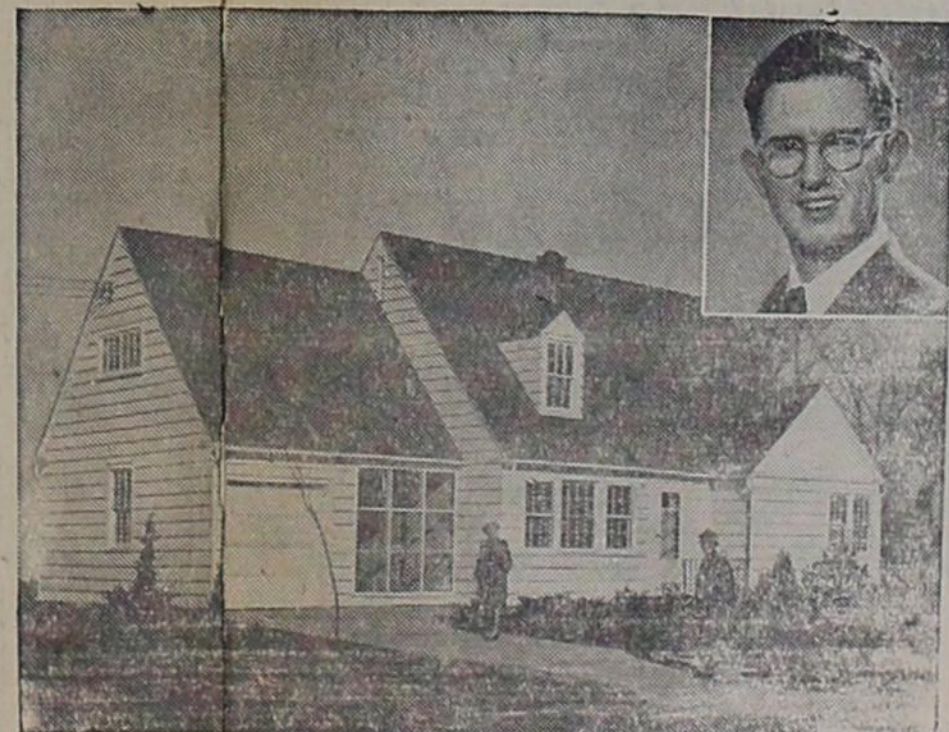

Good Laundering Keeps Bedding Fresh and Fragrant

NOTHING makes sleep more enjoyable than clean sheets and pillow cases, fluffy clean blankets and fragrant bed spreads, Georgia Leffingwell points out in nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer.

Listing home laundering methods that will insure fresh and fragrant bedding, she writes:

"Manufacturer's instructions give a washing machine's capacity. Be sure there's plenty of suds when washing a quilt, blanket or spread. Four to six sheets are a normal load, but a mixture of sheets and pillow cases gives better circulation and cleaner bedding."

Sheets and pillow cases, she adds, should be washed in water about 130 degrees F., with a rich, two inch suds. Let wash from 5 to 15 minutes, depending on how soiled the bedding is. Then give them a clear rinse and follow with a cool rinse.

Pinning on the clothesline from the corners or edges is an invitation



to tearing, so fold sheets or pillow-cases from hem to hem with corners even. Hang a third to half over the line.

"Blankets and spreads need a bit more careful handling," she writes in the magazine read by 1,300,000 farm families. "Use lukewarm water and rich suds. Spots may be rubbed with two well-soaped fingers and blanket binding with a soft brush. Give them three rinses to remove every bit of soap. Keep the wringer loose.

"Dry the blankets or rayon colored spreads in the shade or on a line indoors away from direct heat or sunlight. Reverse them occasionally as they stop dripping to prevent sagging. Blot moisture with a towel as it collects. When dry, brush both sides of blanket with clean brush to bring up nap. Press the binding with warm iron."

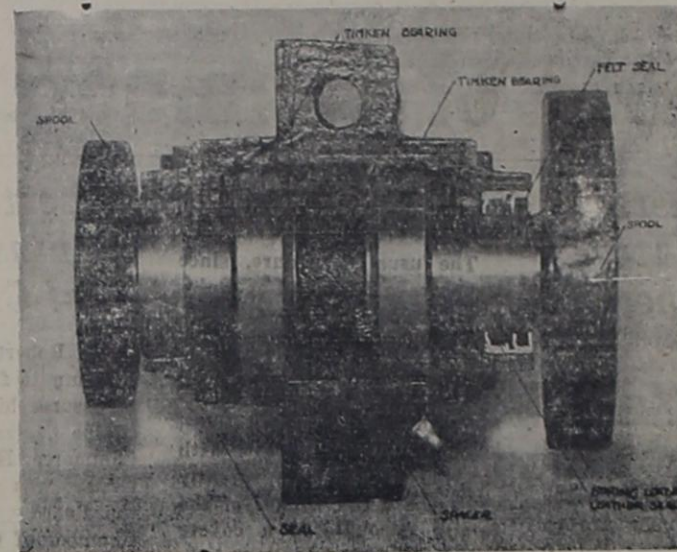

Washday for Lamp Shades Makes Rooms Brighter

ROOMS will look brighter when you establish a washday for the lamp shades and light bulbs, the Rural Home editor of nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer advises housewives.

"In the days of kerosene lamps it was part of the weekly housecleaning to wash lamp chimneys," she points out in the farm magazine read by 1,300,000 farm families. "But not everyone realizes that electric lighting calls for a regular cleaning program.

"Your lamp shades will give better service and look much better if they are kept clean."

Here are her directions for giving lamp shades a real soap and water treatment:

Remove a parchment or paper shade from lamp; go over it with a cloth rung quite dry from rich suds. Then go over the shade with a cloth wrung out of clear water. Finish by wiping it with a dry cloth. Examine the shade to see if bindings are glued or sewed on and if there are ornaments that might not be wash-



These should be cut off before making up a too or good rich, lukewarm suds. Plunge the shade up and down in the suds. Rub obstinate spots gently with two well-soaped fingers. After the shade is bright and fresh looking, give it several rinses of the same even lukewarm temperature.

Stand the shade to dry on a bath towel, away from sunlight or direct heat. You can hasten drying by blotting the shade between the palms of your hands with another bath towel. When the shade is partially dry, reverse its position.

Don't forget, too, that electric bulbs should be cleaned regularly. Do not try to wipe the electric bulbs in their sockets. The best way is to remove the bulb from the socket and wipe with soft cloth wrung out of soapy water. Hold the bulb by the metal end while wiping the glass with the soapcloth. This minimizes the risk wetting the metal part. If the metal part of the bulb does get wet, be sure not to screw it back into its set until it is completely dry.

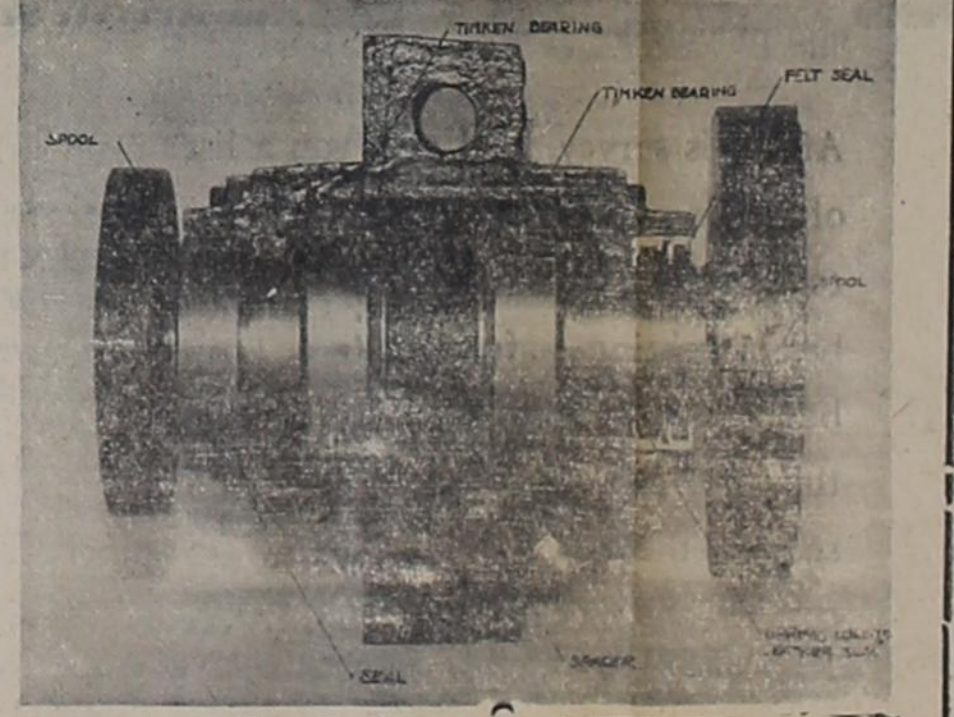

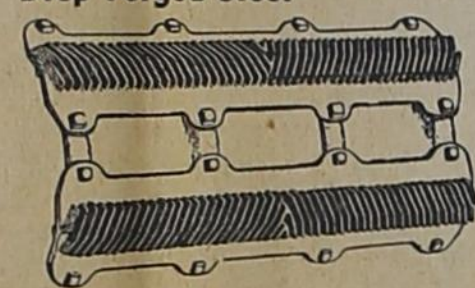

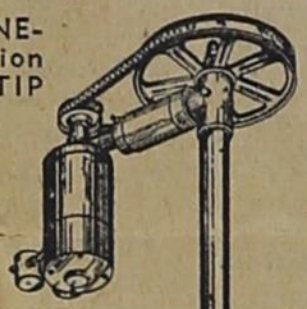
