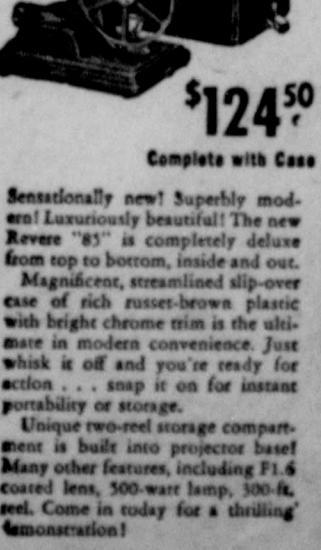
That is amusing, but without young men and women who have been exposed to learning and education, where would we be?

Teacher Training TV Program to Be Launched in Area September 22

ABILENE (S)—A teacher-training television program will be launched in the area of Sept. 22-23 over KRBC-TV, Channel 9, in 7:00.

The program of a state-wide project to qualify bachelor degree holders lacking professional credentials for teaching through accelerated teacher education program. Enrollment in television education program will be for employment on an agency teaching permit.

Dr. Joe Huey, dean of McMurry College, Abilene, is chairman of West Texas area committee working with the Texas Education Agency on the TV project and teacher education program.

Dr. Humphrey, state commissioner of education, will pay fees to the college or university where they enroll; view 26 telecasts, read required materials, and submit informal papers; utilize opportunities to visit schools for "on the job" looks; and take the program series examination.

Cooperating colleges will designate staff members as advisors to the participants. However, most of the study will be by mail and by television.

Conference totals for the 1956 season are: Conference AAAA, 86 teams, compared to 57 last year; AAA, 87 teams, compared to 60 last year; AA, 162 this fall, 182 last season; A, 188, down from 203 last year; B, 227, compared to 230 last year; and six-man, 150, down from 165 last season.

All of last year's state champions will be campaigning again in their old leagues, with the exception of Deer Park, the 1955 conference A champ, which has been moved into AA to fit its enrollment. Other defending state champions are: Abilene in AAAA; Ford in AAA; Conference B and six-man conferences do not play past regional championships.

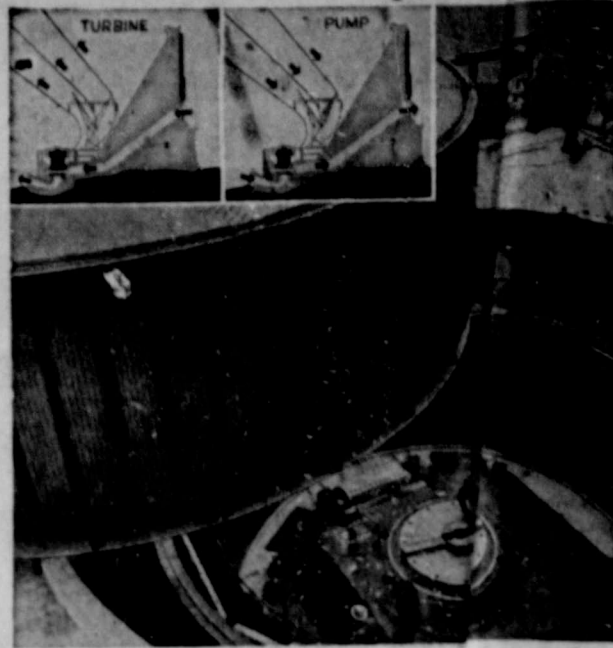

**Reversible Machine Enables
Dam To Store Surplus Engy**



Lowering a rotor weighing 300 tons into pool was one of the final steps in the installation of a powerful machine recently placed in operation at TVA's Hiwassee dam in North Carolina. The machine, developed and built by Allis-Chalmers, called a pump-turbine. During periods of greatest demand power, usually daytime hours, it uses water to generate electricity (left insert); it is then operating as a turbine. When the need for electricity falls off, usually at night and when surplus power is cheap, the machine can be reversed to serve as a giant pump and force water back through the dam to be stored in the reservoir (right insert). The unique machine in this way makes possible the storage of surplus energy.

What Protein Level for Day Cows' Ration?

Good dairymen know that the proper amount of protein in the grain ration is vital to the performance of their milking cows. The question is: What is the proper level of protein feed?

The soundness of a program was illustrated in a long test conducted at the Rab Purina research farm in Miss. Thirty-six mature Holsteins averaging about 1200 and live weight were divided to three equal groups on the basis of previous production and other factors. Lot I received alfalfa hay and corn silage with a 16 per cent grain mixture; the rate of 1 pound for each 100 pounds of milk. Lot II received poor quality timothy hay, rice, along with corn silage and per cent grain at the same as Lot I. Lot III received same poor quality hay and silage, but were fed more protein the same 16 per cent grain mixture that was fed in Lot I. Lot III cows received 1 pound supplement for every 2 3/4 lbs of milk.

Cows in Lot I, good hay and normal feeding 16 per cent supplement, increased their production an average 1.2 pounds per day over the previous lactation. Cows in Lot II, fed poor roughage and a 16 per cent supplement, fell off an average of 6 pounds per day. Cows in Lot III, fed poor roughage with increased

amount of 16 per cent supplement, gained an average of .6 of a pound of milk per day over previous lactations. Lot III returned an average of 19 cents more per cow per day over feed costs than Lot II.
