ing - in school, on-the-job and on-the-farm. Mr. Harrington said there is no such "ceiling" for veterans in school under the Korean GI Bill. However, he added, there is one for Korea veterans taking on-the-job training. Under this ceiling, when a veteran's on-the-job training wages, plus his GI allowance, exceed \$310 a month, VA will scale down the allowance accordingly, to bring the total within the \$310 limit.

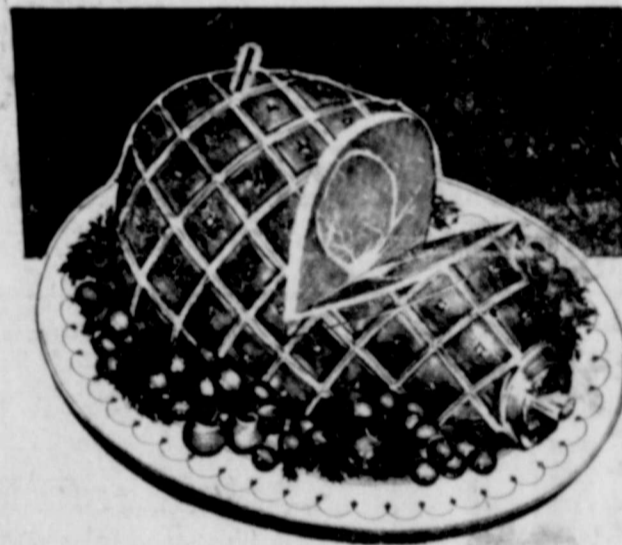

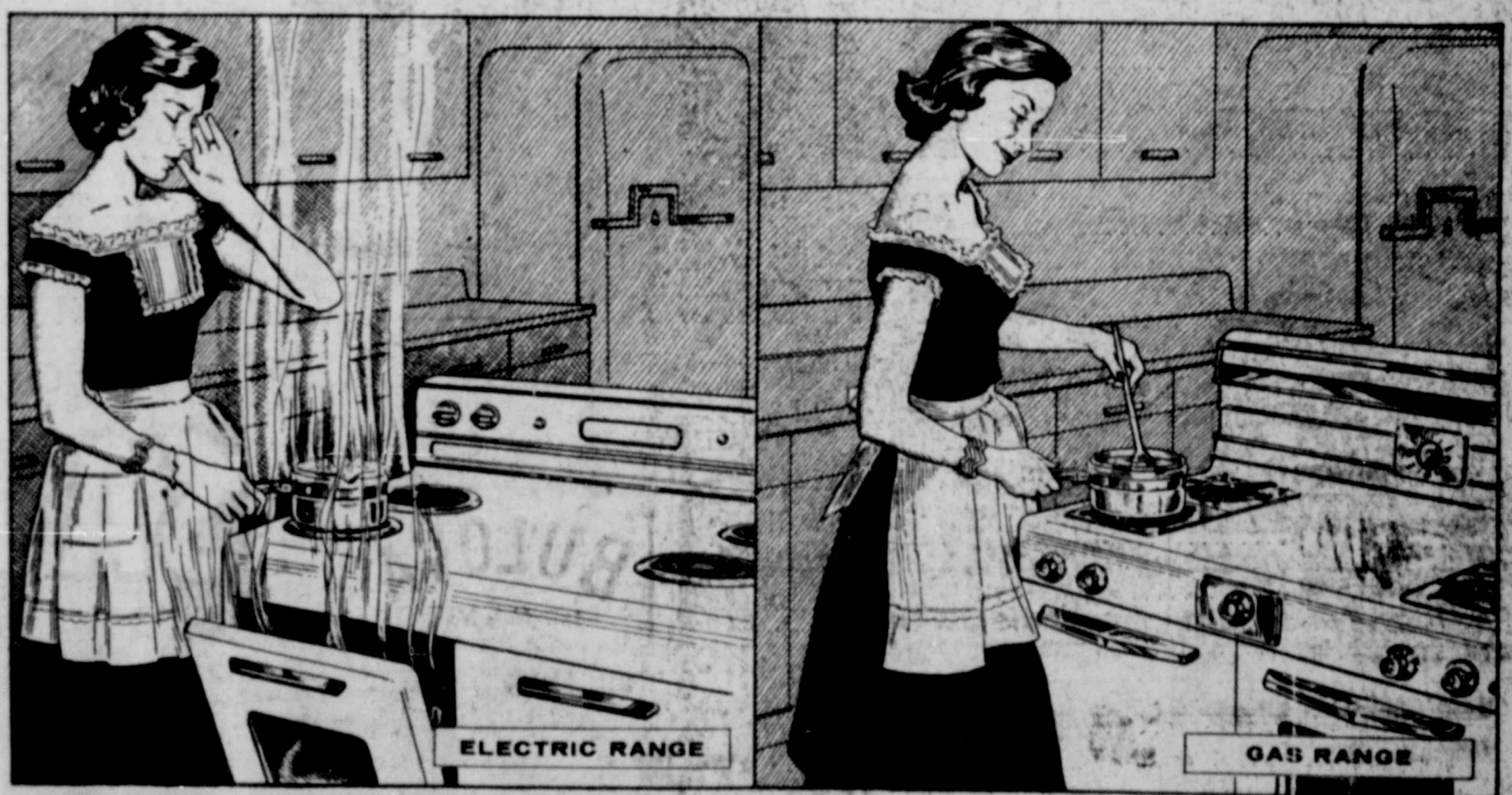

"The ones I am worried about are these out-of-state senators who are coming down here to Texas to tell us how to vote. I sure feel sorry for those boys. It must be tough to face life with their attitude."

"To hear them tell it, this country is in a terrible shape. All the farmers are starving, all

the businessmen are going broke, and all the working people are just barely making enough to keep body and soul together. The only reason some little country doesn't step in and whip us tomorrow is that they know they can just wait a few days and the United States will fold up of its own accord. That's what I understand from listening to the visiting senators."

"Of course, they know how to correct the situation overnight. Elect Adlai, and let him abolish the draft and do away with the H-bomb, and let Estes establish the Atlantic Union which he has made speeches about all over the country, and everything will be all right."

"These things are too important, of course, for these senators to waste time telling us Texans why they voted against the Texas tideland bill. "As a medical man, I am worried about the great shock these senators are going to get, after the election is over and Ike is re-elected and this country keeps on being peaceful, prosperous and progressive. It's liable to put them all in bed."

And Doc Brown walked on off, shaking his head. Of course, the Stevenson man caught on that Doc was hurrahing him, and he didn't like it much, but he'll still have to call him the next time one of the kids gets the 'croup, because like I said he's the only doctor in town.

**Lighting Tips For New Homes**

The following are questions most frequently asked of authorities by families who are buying or building a new home:

What shall I look for when selecting lighting fixtures for a new home or when remodeling an older one?

To avoid the same harsh lighting effect of bare, unshielded bulbs, choose lighting fixtures with frosted, ceramic-enameled or opal glassware. These types of glass shields softly diffuse the light for most comfortable, easy-on-the-eyes lighting.

Clear or thinly frosted glass

can't possibly "smooth" the light and conceal the bare bulb. Avoid those heavily painted or other heavy glassware that are so dense the light actually can't get through.

How much should I spend on lighting fixtures for my new home?

That, of course, depends upon what price home you are buying. However, a good rule of thumb is to allow a minimum of at least one and a half per cent of the cost of the house for lighting fixtures, including valance lighting for the living room.

Remember, lighting fixtures, like plumbing fixtures aren't replaced as frequently as your floor and table lamps so don't be penny wise and pound foolish. Small inexpensive and inefficient lighting fixtures are no bargain. The nighttime appearance of your home is dependent upon the lighting fixtures you give it. Choose only those that can give service and provide most comfortable and attractive lighting for family living.

How can I be sure when a new house has sufficient electrical outlets for my family's needs?

First of all, visualize your furnishings, both new and old, in each room. If possible, measure furniture and make cut-out patterns to scale. Then, if you don't have a set of plans for your house, borrow them from your builder. Arrange furniture on plans to help locate the outlets so you can enjoy balanced lighting with furniture arrangements and others where you'll really need them. This helps avoid finding yourself with outlets behind heavy pieces of furniture such as sofas, beds or refrigerators. Be sure to show your cutouts and plans to your electrical contractor when deciding where outlets should be placed.

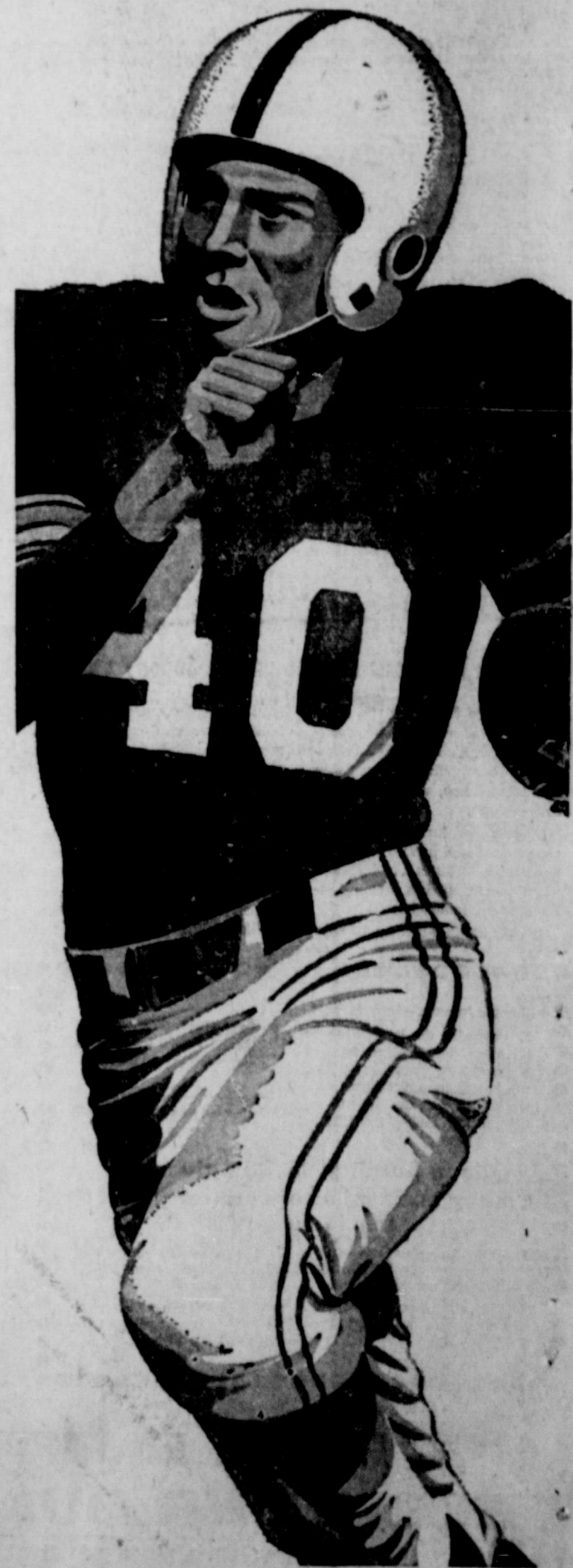
