## Mingus Youth Dies As Auto Hits Culvert

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Monday in the Mingus Baptist Church for Alton Wayne Foster, 19-year-old Mingus youth, who was killed instantly about 1:30 a.m. Sunday when the car in which he was riding ran into a culvert on Highway 80 about 20 miles east of Ranger.

Rev. J. W. Blackwell and the Rev. Howard Foreman officiated at the services and burial was in Mount Marion Cemetery at Strawn.

Foster was a 1956 graduate of Gordon High School where he played football, basketball and baseball. He was an employee of the Lone Star Gas Company and a member of the Baptist Church.

The accident occurred near Gordon when a fire on the automobile reportedly blew out causing the car to hit the culvert and overturn several times. Foster, who was driving, was thrown clear of the car and killed instantly. Only other occupant of the car, Rayburn Dickson of Gordon, received minor cuts and bruises and was treated at Ranger hospital and released.

Foster's survivors include his mother, Mrs. Ruth Simmons of Eastland; one brother, Lindell Lee and one sister, Carolyn Ruth Foster, both of Mingus; two half-brothers, Richard L. and Nelson Ray Campbell, both of Eastland; and two grandmothers, Mrs. Lee Dyer and Mrs. Emma Foster, both of Mingus.

The youth's father was killed in World War II.

Miss Shaffer was chosen sweetheart by popular vote of the band members, and runners-up were Miss Gail Rapp and Miss Judy Craig, who were the sweetheart's attendants during the ceremony.

As the band formed a three-sided square behind a beautifully decorated Maroon and White throne, the sweetheart and her attendants rode to the scene in new Chevrolet and Ford Automobiles.

Miss Shaffer wore a strapless formal evening dress, the bodice of which was of silver brocade and net, with the full white net skirt being 12-inches high, fashioned of gold metal and set with 480 small rhinestones, 116 large rhinestones and 16 sets of colored gems. It was lined with maroon velvet, and had a permanent display in the High School Trophy Case to be used in future coronations.

Band Captain Frankie Landtroop placed the crown upon the sweetheart's head and gave her the traditional kiss, doing such a good job of it that her crown fell off, and had to be replaced.

## Over 200 Tickets Sold for Banquet

What will undoubtedly go down as one of the most successful Civic Banquets ever held in Ranger is already assured as more than 200 tickets have already been sold for the 1920 Club Community Improvement Banquet to be held Thursday evening at the Methodist Church.

All members of the various committees working for the banquet in preparing the tables and the decorations and providing the food are now well on their way to putting on the finishing touches as "everything is over but the eating."

Ticket sales closed Monday and late comers who do not have admissions are going to have to pull some important strings if they hope to get on the inside Thursday night.

The complete program has been announced and appears at the head of this column. Mayor Vandergriff of Arlington will arrive in Ranger on his way to the banquet.

Carroll Edwards, Bob Burton and Ralph Dankworth are other backfield men for the Ballinger Bearcats that see a lot of service and all of them have come in for scoring honors this year. Edwards chalked up one 40 yard run for a TD against Cisco.

The Bearcats have a backfield of considerable depth and a good line, and the Ranger Bulldogs will have their hands full to come away with a victory Friday.

The Ranger Times is just one of several hundred other Bulldog boosters in and around this neighborhood that don't believe a word of this "whistle stop" stuff and somebody is going to have to show us before we're convinced. And if some of those "Big Three" clubs don't watch out, they're liable to get derailed in what they consider a practice game.

As far as we know the Bulldogs came out of the Cisco game last week which Coleman won 37-13. Stokes ran for 131 yards in 22 carries and this included one 49-yard jaunt for a touchdown. Stokes also ran 40-yards for a TD in the Ballinger game with Cisco, and he scored another one from 10-yards out.

Rodney Flanagan is also another fast, hard-driving Ballinger back who teamed up with Stokes to eat up 54 yards and another TD in the Coleman game. Flanagan made two touchdowns against Cisco, one of them on a 55 yard run.

Whereas the State of Texas acclaims the last Thursday in November to be the legal Thanksgiving and whereas the Texas State Teachers Association holds their annual meeting on the last Thursday in November, the Ranger Public Schools will continue to observe the legal Texas Thanksgiving holiday the last Thursday in November.

The following was heard from the Lone Star Gas Company: "Act 4591, Revised Statutes, Texas Legislature, provides that Thanksgiving Day in Texas shall be observed as the last Thursday in November. Accordingly, Thursday, November 29, 1956, will be designated as a holiday for Texas employees of Lone Star Gas Company and Lone Star Producing Company."

The bank has already announced the last Thursday as its holiday. The Ranger Chamber of Commerce has announced November 29 as the day to be observed by the city, following a poll of the merchants and business men.

The Ranger Bulldogs have a brand new title this week! They are none on record as being a "Whistle Stop" ball club. This title was given them in the Abilene Reporter-News last Saturday morning by Fred Sanner, head of the Abilene sportswriters who said in his write-up of the Coleman - Ballinger game that "Only Ranger and Cisco remain as whistle stops for the Coleman Bluecat Express on the track to the 7-AA crown."

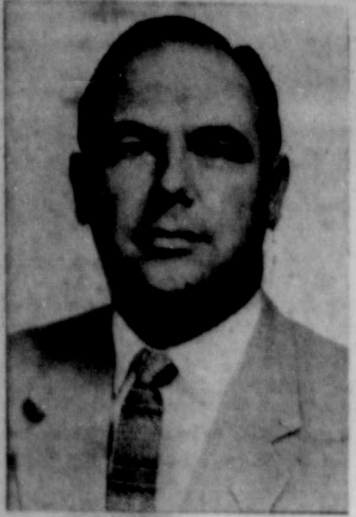

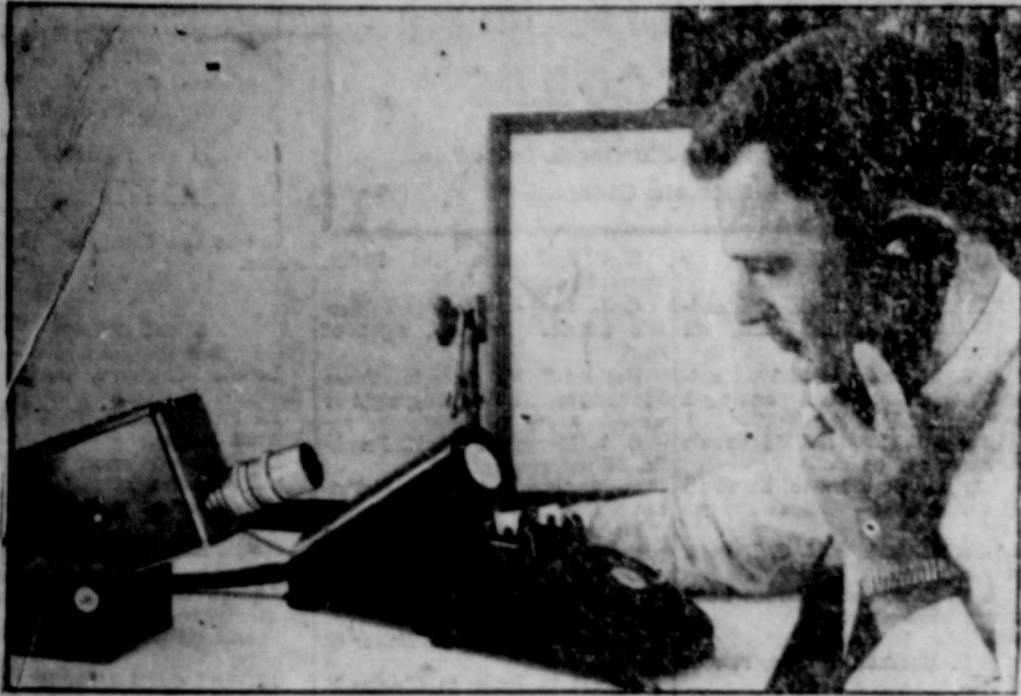

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**STOP FOR SCHOOL BUSES**

Thousands of school children are now trooping back to school throughout Texas. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up school children or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or a motorist, or both, were careless at that very time.

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense

to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lanes, or upon a four-lane highway.

However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or main-traveled portion of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the no-passing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or when traversing any intersection or railroad grade crossing.

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when not engaged in passing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the center of the roadway.

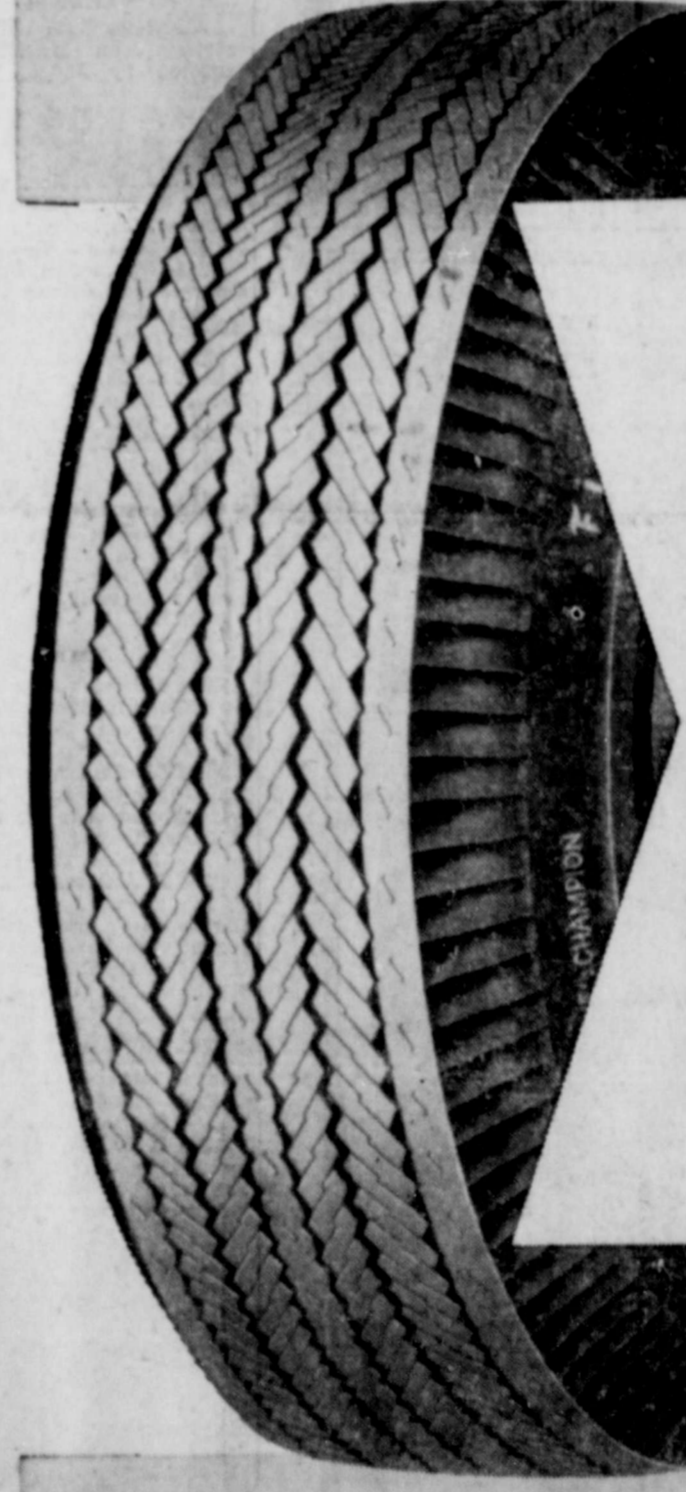

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### 1000 Victims Die Each Year By Electricity

Nearly 1,000 innocent victims walk "the last mile" to death by electric shock every year in the United States.

A miscarriage of justice?—no, at all, for they are victims not of a jury's verdict, but of their own or someone else's lack of knowledge. They lose their lives not in the electric chair but in whatever everyday pursuits electric power is a factor, and though they are guilty of no crime, these unfortunates are just as dead as though they had been strangled in the electric chair and the current turned on.

Nearly every day we read or hear about someone who has committed unpremeditated suicide by ignoring the inexorable laws of electricity that separate the quick from the dead.

Recently a young woman in Chicago was electrocuted when she stepped up the cord of an electric fan while mopping a floor. The cord was frayed and the floor was wet—a deadly combination.

Every year a few unthinking

citizens decide to enjoy the convenience of a radio, hair-dryer or sun-lamp while taking a bath. And every year some of them have their lives snuffed out when the appliance falls into the bathtub. For when a person is standing or sitting in water, an electric shock is hundreds of times more powerful than on a dry surface, according to a specialist for Employers Mutuals in L. C. Meyer, electric system of Wauauau.

Quick thinking can often mean the difference between life and death when electric power is running wild, Meyer says. Recently four young men in the Midwest were riding in an automobile when a live power-line fell across the top of the car. One by one the group jumped clear of the car, being careful not to be in contact with the vehicle and the ground at the same time. This action saved their lives, for if they had stepped from the auto to the ground they would have been instantly killed.

One of the most popular forms of home entertainment today is television—a harmless pastime if you observe a few common-sense safety rules.

First, Meyer cautions, never erect a tall television antenna close to a power line. Several deaths have occurred to date while

towers were being erected. In addition, an installed antenna could hit a power line if weakened supports gave way in a windstorm.

A more important precaution, and one too often overlooked, is the admonition "Don't touch the back of your TV set!" Do-it-yourself activities fare fine in some phases of home life, but leave your TV set to an experienced repairman. Even when a set is disconnected and has been turned off for hours, there is often a strong enough charge left in the instrument to cause serious and even fatal shock, Meyer explained.

"Electric power has helped make America the most prosperous nation in the world," the Employers Mutuals of Wauauau electrical system specialist pointed out. "Properly used, electricity provides us with the comfort and luxuries our forefathers never dreamed would one day be a reality, but electricity, like the genie in Aladdin's lamp, must be controlled in order for it to be a useful and harmless servant."

Begin now to do something about your community. Talk to friends and neighbors. Discuss it with your county extension agents. There are bulletins available that give suggestions on how to proceed. Ask for a copy of "Neighborhood Progress Through Organized Action."

Some groups centered their interest around social activities such as recreation, church, school and drives for public facilities. Still others began by improving their homes, farms and ranches. Some organized to improve health conditions and services. In every case,

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### Shivers Asked What About Tidelands Now

Republican campaigners in Texas, who have been attempting to inject the tidelands issue into a four-year-old prospective at every opportunity, have suddenly got themselves between an offshore reef and a hard place called Brownell.

Senator Lyndon Johnson let the GOP have its tidelands issue this week. He challenged Governor Shivers to get a yes or no answer from the Republican Attorney General Herbert Brownell on whether Brownell — after the Nov. 6 election — will sue Texas for two-thirds of its tidelands. Brownell has already done this in Louisiana, challenging that state's right to claim its boundaries as 10 1/2 miles into the sea. Brownell claims the state's right is only three miles.

Johnson asked Shivers what his "frequent weekend guest," Brownell, plans to do about suing for federal control of a substantial part of the Texas tidelands. "Texans are entitled to know before Nov. 6," he said. "If the tidelands issue is resurrected, Shivers and Brownell will be the ones who do it, and I want them to have full credit for it."

### Short Course On Sausage At Texas A&M

COLLEGE STATION — What is sausage? How did it get that way? How important is it in the American diet?

Almost every American family eats some form of sausage at least once a week. Yet the ordinary housewife knows very little about this product which she feeds her family.

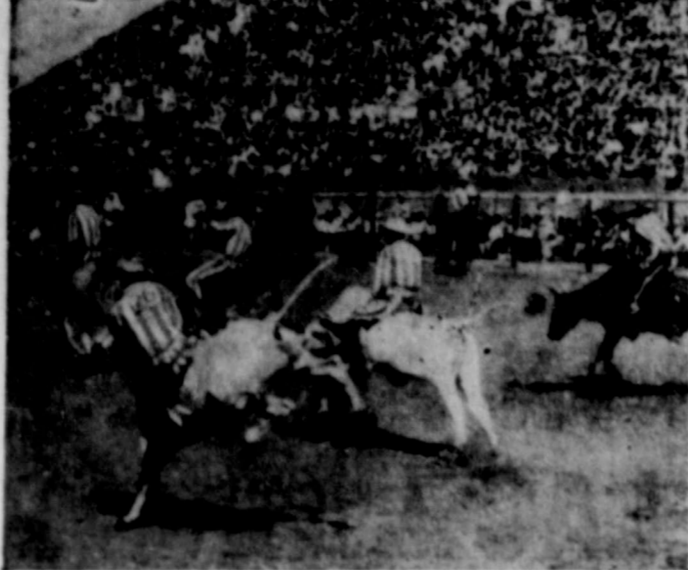
Sausage is defined as minced meat or a combination of meats, blended with various seasonings and spices and commonly stuffed into a casing or container.

That covers everything from plain ground beef to the fancy tinned hams and canned lunch meats. The variety is almost endless. Some of the large meat companies offer as many as 175 or 200 varieties. Sausage and prepared meats make up about one-fifth of the total meat supply for this country.

For that reason, a short course to be held on the Texas A&M campus in November is important to every meat eater in the state.

It is the Texas Meat Packers' short course on sausage, Nov. 16. Roy Snyder, extension meats specialist at Texas A&M, who is in charge of the short course, says the subject will be covered thoroughly.

Some of the nation's top authorities on various phases of sausage-making will discuss their special fields. Subjects to be discussed include everything from "Materials Needed for Top Quality Product" through "Bacteriological Aspects of Sausage Production" and "Chemical Methods for Quality Control" to "Packaging for Sale."

### IT'S THE LAW in Texas

#### DOUBLE JEOPARDY

Most likely you can't picture yourself being brought into court on anything worse than a speeding violation. Nearly everyone feels that way. Even so, it is good to know that in this country you can't be made to stand trial twice for the same offense.

We have a provision in the U.S. constitution against "double jeopardy." That's one of the important safeguards in our system of law which makes it certain that once a court has reached a verdict of "innocent," the acquitted person may not be put on trial again for the same offense.

To add to the protection, if a person has been acquitted, the prosecution cannot appeal the case to a higher court. The constitution states specifically: "Nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life and limb."

This right holds good, however, only if a full trial is held and a verdict is reached. It is possible to face another trial on the same charge if the first trial ends with a "hung jury" or a "mistrial," or if a new trial is requested.

A classic example comes from

the "Wild West" in the late 18-80's. A man named Ball was charged with murder, along with two others. Ball was acquitted, but the others were found guilty. The guilty pair appealed to a higher court, and their original indictment was found to be faulty.

Once again the government accused all three men. Ball claimed his right against double jeopardy had been invaded, and the U.S. supreme court agreed. He didn't have to stand trial again. The other two did, and paid the penalty for their guilt.

The reason for the "double jeopardy" provision is to protect the individual from being hounded all his life. In old England, where the fear of tyranny first prompted safeguards for personal freedom, one court said: "Were

it not for this rule, anyone obnoxious to the government might be run down by repeated attempts to carry on a prosecution against him."

This is the first short course of its kind to be offered by the college, he said, and he has particular interest in getting a broad attendance. His reasons are summed up in the original letter which he mailed to the packers.

"Progress in the meat packing industry has been spectacular. The 10-year period just past has featured a change to self-service meat retailing, with consumer-size packages being an increasing requirement of packers...."

"Progress, however, frequently creates new problems. The Texas A&M College system desires to assist meat processors of Texas in solving these problems. Discussion with others engaged in the same business frequently will uncover many answers...."

"We could report and discuss some of the results in our meats research, and you could help us plan improvements in our meats teaching, research and extension to make these activities more beneficial to you. We wish to give the taxpayers a good profit for their investment in our modern meat processing facilities."
