State Inspector Classifying Wheat

Mr. W. H. Goeth of Abernathy, State Seed Inspector of the Department of Agriculture, has been in Castro County during the past week inspecting wheat seed for certification.

Some 14 farmers have 1726 acres under certification. According to the inspector's report, the wheat will go No. 1 and No. 2 with some not passing the inspection for certification. Varieties of wheat under certification in the county are the Wichita, Wester, Comanche and Tenmarg. County Agent R. L. King declared that all of these are good milling quality wheats and are well adapted to this county.

A complete list of local certified wheat growers will be published at a later date for the benefit of farmers who might wish to purchase certified wheat seed.

Wheat Harvest Is Underway

Surplus of labor has been available in the county this week according to R. L. King, County Agent. With the wheat harvest just started farmers are urged to contact the county agents office or M. H. Fowlkes, who is working as farm labor field assistant during the harvest season and let their needs be known.

At the present there are plenty of combines, trucks and labor available, with the wheat harvest getting started good this labor may move on to other counties unless definite arrangements for jobs are made.

Farmers are urged to contact the County Agents office as soon as possible as to the kind of labor needed and when it will be needed.

DAIRY FARMERS SALUTED—June is dairy month in Texas by official proclamation of Gov. Beauford H. Jester. The proclamation is a tribute to 338,000 dairy farmers in Texas who own 1,400,000 milch cows, valued at \$150,000,000 and which produced four and one-half billion pounds of milk in 1946 with a net value of \$100,000,000. During the past 20 years Texas has advanced from twentieth to eighth place in value of dairy products.

EIGHT TEXAS COUNTIES AMONG NATION'S LEADING WHEAT GROWERS

Eight Texas counties are among the 100 leading wheat-growing counties in the United States, according to figures from the 1945 Census of Agriculture issued by Director J. C. Capt, Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. These eight Texas counties reported 1,892,472 acres in all kinds of wheat in 1944. This was 43 percent of the State's 4,408,046 acres in wheat and three percent of the Nation's 58,286,103 acres in this crop.

The eight leading Texas wheat counties and their 1944 acreages of all kinds of wheat are:

Deaf Smith county, sixth with 365,975 bushels; Ochiltree, nineteenth, 303,980; Hansford, twenty-first, 274,945; Parmer, sixty-second, 206,249; Swisher, sixty-ninth, 198,880; Castro, seventy-fifth, 191,290; Carson, seventy-eighth, 185,487; Randall, ninety-second, 165,666.

A contract for the construction of curb and gutter on portions of Highways 51 and 85, traversing city streets, was let Wednesday to the Bryan & Hoffman Paving Company of Plainview. Curb and gutter will be constructed on Highway 51 north from the intersection and on Highway 85 west from the intersection to the city limits. Curb and gutter is being constructed on the two streets in preparation for the paving of the streets by the Highway Department.

Construction of curb and gutter was contracted at \$1.95 per foot and assessed to property owners adjacent to the paving. Work on the project will begin within the next ten days.

Alley Parking Violates City Ordinance

The Chamber of Commerce office has received various reports and complaints concerning the use of city alleys for parking cars and trucks. In several instances the alleys were so clogged with parked vehicles that the residents could neither get in nor out of their homes.

Mr. Hershey, secretary of the local Chamber, reports he has discussed this situation with city officials. He says, "although there is a City Ordinance prohibiting such parking and subjecting the violator to a penalty, it is virtually impossible for the city to enforce it because of its lack of police officers. However, if the situation continues it will be necessary for the city to take positive action, because the alleys are public property and must be open to the public at all times. And as Glenn Smith, Fire Marshall, pointed out, the blocking of any alley in the city creates a definite fire hazard which must be eliminated at all cost." For the time being, Mr. Hershey suggested that anyone noting a person inadvertently parking in or blocking an alley should call his attention to the danger created, and the need for drastic city action could probably be averted.

Health Article From State Health Office

AUSTIN—A statement released by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, indicates that the incidence of whooping cough in Texas is at present almost three times as high as the seven year median.

"Prevention and control of whooping cough, especially among infants and small children, may be accomplished through use of approved vaccine and convalescent serum," Dr. Cox asserted, "and it is important that such measures be taken to protect them. Neglecting to do so, and allowing the young child to suffer an attack of this disease, may seriously impair his future health."

"The infectious agent or germ of whooping cough, is transmitted by droplets expelled in coughing, sneezing, or speaking," Dr. Cox said. "The discharge from the nose and throat are dangerous to susceptible persons; the need for early recognition and careful isolation of whooping cough is obvious."

The first sign of this disease is usually a dry cough, which persists day and night and tends to become increasingly severe. The disease is fully developed when vomiting of food and whooping accompany the paroxysm of cough. Dr. Cox stressed the fact that children who have whooping cough should not attend school and should be isolated so that they will not come in contact with other children until three weeks after the appearance of typical signs of the disease.

No doubt the prompt action of the County Health Officer in closing all public entertainments and gatherings staved it off for the time being. But have we taken any positive action to prevent a recurrence? And if we haven't, what can we do?

Now the disease that threatened us was a disease of germs. But the naked eye cannot see germs. The germ carrier though is another matter. With half an eye you can see him everywhere you go. He is the common house fly and he is thriving mightily in Dimmitt this year.

Walk down the street and you will disturb hundreds of them from pieces of discarded candy or spilled ice cream cones; in the alley way he will buzz angrily to keep you away from the garbage pail he considers his own; in the barn yard he eats his fill and he comes through your screen door like invited company.

Have you ever considered the trail of deadly germs he has just dragged across the piece of bread you are going to eat, or the spoon you are about to use with your soup? If you haven't considered it yet you had better think of the epidemic we might have had and then go into action.

Burn all garbage thoroughly, dispose of all spilled foods, sweep your sidewalks regularly, and above all spray or swat every fly you see for continued good health.

The other morning, as I packed my small daughter's lunch box for school, I began thinking about the tremendous role waxed paper plays in our every-day life. Why, I'm sure I must use it a dozen different ways a day—to wrap lunch box sandwiches... to keep food fresh when stored in the refrigerator... and on my kitchen table when I roll pie dough—to mention just a few!

When I stopped at my grocer's that afternoon, I remarked about it to him, and he told me some very unusual facts. Did you know that waxed paper was used to keep products clean and sanitary as early as 1854? That enough waxed paper is used every year to circle the earth 500 times? Well, that figure really amazed me and I decided to find out how waxed paper is made. Perhaps you've been curious, too.

Waxed paper is merely a thin sheet of paper which has been treated with purified paraffin, a wax similar to that used in preserving jelly. To make it, rolls of paper are fed over rollers into tanks of hot liquid paraffin. Then the paper goes through a squeezing process similar to that of your washing machine wringer, and passes into a cold water bath which sets the wax. I watched the whole procedure one afternoon and it was really fascinating.

Every woman knows that waxed paper pays for itself in the foods it saves. Here's how it saves food and why for me: Whenever I serve bread, crackers or cereals, I always make sure I properly re-wrap the waxed paper wrapper. This helps keep them fresher longer, and in the long run saves me money. Try it. It takes but few minutes.

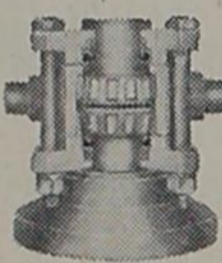

Since most spring farrowed pigs have been weaned careful attention should be given to the control of parasites according to R. L. King, County Agent. The new method of worming pigs as recommended by the United States Department of Agriculture is very effective against the parasite if directions are followed and should be used about two weeks after pigs are weaned. The method is the use of Sodium Flouride and directions are as follows:

Mix one level teaspoonful of sodium flouride with each pound of ground dry feed. A pig will eat about one pound of this mixture in one day. Repeat the treatment the next day for pigs weighing under 60 pounds. For heavier pigs, give each pig one pound of the above mixture per day for three consecutive days. The day before beginning the treatment, feed only about a half ration so the pigs will be hungry the next day when the treatment starts.

Other parasites that should be controlled on swine are mange and lice, this can be done successfully
