There was some talk for a while of the service institutions, such as tailor shops, clothing, but they apparently never could get together and at last reports they had decided to remain open. School, of course, will go on as usual. As far as is known, drug stores and doctors will be on the job, and it will be just another day for the police department.

Here We Go Again! Polls Open At 8, Close at 7, Tues.

Ranger citizens, as well as all other voters in Eastland County and Texas, are scheduled to march to the polls again Tuesday and vote this time on the 9th Amendment which, by oversight, was scheduled by the Legislature to be voted on one week following the General Election of November 6.
Polls will be open locally at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. Only in the larger cities do the polls open at 7 o'clock.
Many people think the 9th Amendment is perhaps the most important of all the Amendments submitted for approval or rejection this month, and it is a foregone conclusion that it will receive less votes either way than any of them.
Attention of readers is called to a part of the "What's Cooking?" column in today's paper which explains the 9th Amendment fully. It is aimed at providing financial assistance for permanently and totally disabled Texans between the ages of 18 and 65.
The State of Texas has provisions to take care of disabled citizens below the age of 18 years and above the age of 65 years, but there are no provisions for the in-between group which comprises the largest part of our population.

For Social Security purposes it is advisable to show as big an income as possible.

Lion Members See Movie On Children's Camp

Members of the Ranger Lions Club were shown color movies of the Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children at Kerrville, at their weekly luncheon at the Gholson Thursday.
It was the first time many of the local Lions had viewed the camp, which they, together with other clubs over the state, have contributed more than a million dollars in making it one of the finest summer camps for crippled children in existence anywhere in the USA.
Any handicapped boy or girl in the state between the ages of 7 and 16 is eligible for the camp, except those who are mentally retarded or those with contagious diseases.
The camp provides individual activities for handicapped children include camping out, arts, crafts, swimming, archery, miniature golf and other sports.
The camp operates six summer sessions starting the first Sunday in June, and each camping period lasts for 15 days for each group. The camp is located three miles southeast of Kerrville on Highway 27, on 504 beautiful hillside acres with 13 permanent buildings of stone, steel and concrete. The camp is open every day of the year to visitors who wish to inspect its surroundings and facilities.
The camp is operated and maintained through dues from the Lions Club of Texas, contributions from them and their friends, special projects by local Lions Clubs, memorials, endowments and an annual Christmas Card project.
The campus is dedicated to providing the crippled, blind, deaf and mute youngsters of Texas with a camp of their own where they can have the same kind of summer recreation normally available to other children.
Gaston Dixon, in cooperation with Dr. M. E. Jolly, brought the Thursday program.
