As a result of all this stupidity, the State of Texas is going to be out \$250,000, which is a quarter of a million bucks, just to hold this election on this one amendment. General Election, nearly.

Then a little later on you are going to have to march back to the polls and vote on a United States Senator to take the place of Price Daniel. You are going to do this because Gov. Allan Shivers didn't want to interrupt a bear hunt he had planned, and this will cost you another \$250,-000, and maybe more. Not only that, but there may have to be a run-off in this special senate election, and that will cost you another \$250,000, which makes bear hunting pretty darn expensive when you have to pay for it. 


