WHAT'S... COOKING?

It will be interesting to watch what Allan Shivers will do about naming a successor to fill the vacancy created by Price Daniel in the United States Senate.

Once a man has become a turncoat, there is no telling how far he will go. And right now, Allan Shivers has the power to turn the organization of the Senate over to the Republicans, and he is just the kind of man who would do it.

The only way a Governor can appoint a man to fill a vacancy in the Senate is for the Senate to be in session when the vacancy occurs. The Senate will be in session on January 3, and Allan Shivers will still be governor.

There is nothing to keep him from accepting Daniel's resignation on that date, and appointing his own man to fill out the unexpired two-year term.

As it stands now, there are 49 Democrats, counting Daniel, and 47 Republicans. Counting Daniel out for a moment, that would leave 48 Democrats and 47 Republicans. If Shivers appointed a Republican, the count would be exactly even, 48-48.

Richard Nixon, having the tie-breaking vote, could swing the organization of the Senate to the Republicans, which would carry with it all the important committee chairmanships now held by the Democrats.

If Allan Shivers should happen to pull a stunt like this, Texans should rise up and ride him out of the state on a pole covered with grasshoppers.

The Democratic party is still the ranking party in this state by hundreds upon hundreds of thousands of people, and if Shivers is laboring under the impression that Texas went Republican last November 6 he is sadly mistaken. The state went Eisenhower. In everything else it went solidly Democratic.

The way things stand now, it would be better if Allan Shivers didn't do anything at all in the Senate matter. Price Daniel does not become Governor until January 15, so let him go on and attend the opening of Congress as a Senator on January 3 and cast his vote with the Democrats in the organization. Then he could come on back home and appoint his own successor for the unexpired two-year term.

This isn't the way it was planned, but it would be anything we can think of right now. Daniel could certainly be depended upon to appoint a Democrat, and we could have the election two years from now.

Besides, this would save the expense of a special senatorial election that would cost the taxpayers around another half-million dollars. The State of Texas is election poor now, having to spend a quarter of a million dollars to vote on that 9th Amendment as we did.

We don't believe the people of Texas can stand another election right now, and all that political oratory. We've had it this whole blessed year long. Let us at least go through Christmas without it. As for us we say, Daniel appoint a man after he becomes governor, and save the oratory and the money!

Hot Checker Is Ex-Convict, Sheriff Says

The hot check artist who passed a worthless check for \$64 at Robinson Food Market in Ranger on Oct. 27, and passed another one just like it at Bourland's Meat Market in Eastland less than an hour later, has been apprehended by Sheriff J. B. Williams to be an ex-convict with a string of hot checks from here to California.

The man represented himself in both Ranger and Eastland to be L. V. Wimpler and he had a check made out to himself for \$64, drawn on the Commercial State Bank of Ranger and signed by H. L. Davis, "for wedding work."

Before cashing the checks the man was questioned by both Robinson and Bourland and said that Davis lived north of Ranger. "Wimpler" seemed to know a lot of people in both towns, including all kinds of legitimate people.

"North of Ranger," and the storekeepers concluded he was all right. He even noticed Bourland's Masonic ring and named off several men in the lodge.

The bank at Ranger had never heard of either Wimpler or Davis. Authorities speculated that the man might have been traveling with a circus that was in both towns about the same time he was operating. Where he is now, nobody knows.

Bachelors... You're Sunk, It Says Here

According to a thing we received here this morning from the U. S. Bureau of the Census, there are, as of right now, 1,400,000 more women in this country than men, which means that things are going to be pretty rough on the bachelors, or the women. No matter how thin you spread the men folks, there are not enough to go around.

Also, while on the subject of the census, the Division of Vital Statistics for the State of Texas reports that this state has averaged 800 births a day for the past two years for a total of 624,408 births. This compares to 134,045 deaths recorded over the same period. Four births for each death, plus an influx of newcomers, has pushed the state's population to over 8 1/2 million mark as of today.

The vital statistics department also reports that of 811 cases of paralytic polio investigated in Texas, only 25 were vaccinated children under the age of 20. None who had received all three shots of the Salk vaccine was stricken.

President Eisenhower has now issued a proclamation declaring Nov. 22 the official Thanksgiving in the United States. Allan Shivers is still insisting that Nov. 29 is the official date in Texas. Ranger will close about half and half—some on the 22nd and the rest on the 29th.

Must Defeat Blizzards To Win Runner-up

The Maroon and White Ranger High School Bulldogs will ring down the curtain on the 1956 football season at Bulldog Stadium Friday night in a final game against the Winters Blizzards that will determine who walks off with second place honors in District 7-AA this year.

The Blizzards and the Bulldogs have both lost one district game each, and they both lost to the same foe, the Coleman Bluecats. The sad part about it is, Winters played Coleman a harder game than the Bulldogs did. Winters held Coleman scoreless for 45 minutes and led the game 7-0 with 5 minutes to go when Coleman caught fire and exploded for three touchdowns in the final moments to wind up the game on the long end of a 19-7 score. Coleman started off ahead against Ranger and stayed that way all night.

There is little doubt but what Winters is the most improved team in the district, as witness their 41-6 wallop of Ballinger last week, team that Ranger defeated 28-7.

The Bulldogs will be hard pressed to win this encounter, but if they take it and wind up in second place they can consider their season a successful one. To lose one game in District play, and that to Coleman, is no disgrace, because the Bluecats have a whale of a ball club. It is quite possible that they will give somebody a run for their money in the playoffs.

Friday night's game will also be the last chance the Ranger High School Marching Band will have to perform before the home folks this year and it is expected they will have some elaborate routines worked up.

The odd-makers and the experts haven't had time to make their selections on a winner in the Ranger-Winters game, but we suspect the Bulldogs will be underdogs again if comparative performances with common foes are taken into consideration.

We're hoping, however, that this is one game where those Bulldogs explode as they are capable of doing.

Deer Hunting Reported Good For Opening

Ranger and Eastland County sportsmen who plan to go after the bucks when the season opens Nov. 16, should find good hunting conditions according to reports from the Texas Game & Fish Commission.

"Surprisingly well-conditioned deer herds will provide prime hunting for the sportsmen," said H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary. He said all field reports agree that deer, reflecting characteristic ability to withstand extreme drought, are in the main "getting fat."

Dodgen said bountiful rains have revived "badly needed green stuff to augment the diet of the animals which has regained pretty good condition from a substantial acorn crop."

The executive secretary emphasized that no such optimism prevailed concerning the wild turkey, ordinarily a favorite Texas target.

"There's going to be plenty of prime venison on the hoof," Dodgen said, "but our wild turkey population is still far below normal. Turkey simply cannot stand the extreme weather like deer."

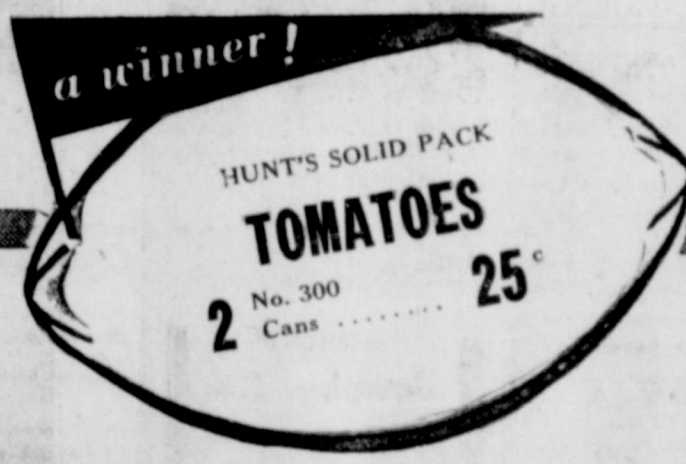
