### 1956 Income Tax Guide Available For Farmers

The Times has received the following communication from the Department of Internal Revenue regarding Income Tax Guides now available to farmers:

"Farmers ought to get the 1956 'Farmers Tax Guide' and start studying how to prepare their 1956 tax return come January 1st. They can get it from their County Agent, any Internal Revenue Service office, or by writing the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, 2101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Texas.

"This is profitable reading as it gives a lot of hints on record keeping as well as telling how to pay the tax owed without paying any more than is due. A lot of farmers will need to learn how to pay self-employment tax and qualify for social security. This booklet tells what kind of income qualifies for self-employment, and has the answers to most every question that is likely to be asked."

The Times received a sample copy of the book, and we don't see how a farmer could make out his tax statement without it.

Retiring directors were B. A. Tunnell, Calvin Lipkin and J. A. Bates.

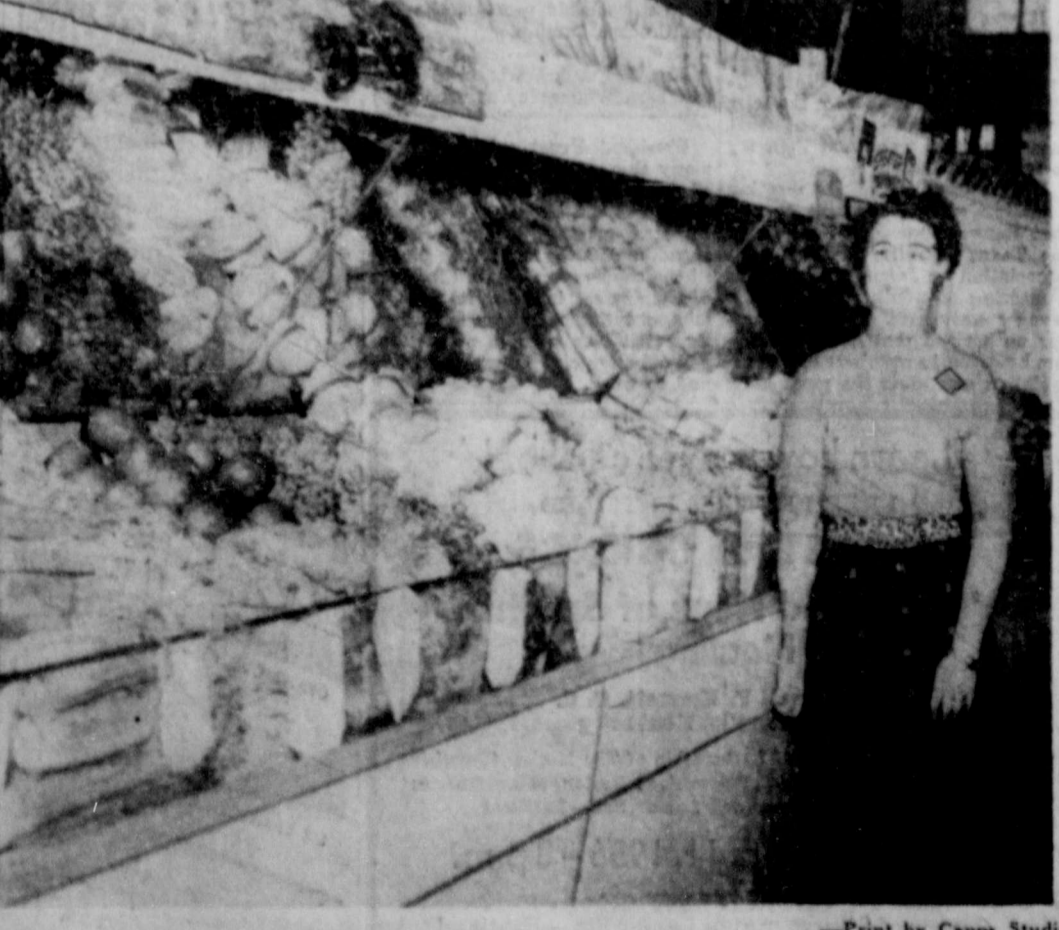

Ex GI's in Ranger may, at long last, after years of waiting, be given an opportunity to build and own a home of their own if one or two small developments can be worked out within the next few days.

Believing that Ranger has missed out on having at least 25 brand new homes built within recent years because nobody was around here to offer Ex GI's the full benefit of the Home Loan Program available to them, a group of Ranger citizens including C. E. May, Jr., Pete Brashier, Lester Crossley, R. V. Galloway and W. F. Creaiger, met at the Commercial State Bank Monday with M. L. Lawson, an Abilene builder and contractor, to survey the possibilities of erecting some GI Homes here on such a basis that Veterans could handle the financial obligations without putting them in the well known financial strain.

### Juke Box Raids In Area Net Thieves \$300

Thieves broke into the Porky Pig Drive-In in Ranger early Wednesday morning and took \$300 from a juke box. The theft was the first of a series of burglaries that started in Mingus last Friday night and in which the thieves have netted more than \$300 up to now.

Raymond Bryan, owner of the Porky Pig Drive-In, discovered the theft about 10:30 Wednesday morning when he opened his shop for business. Coins were scattered all over the floor and thieves had broken in the back door to prize open the cash drawer in a juke box owned by the T. R. Craig Music Company of Ranger. Craig said the box contained about \$90 in nickels, dimes and quarters.

Jim Riddle of Breckenridge, a member of the Texas Rangers, was in Ranger taking fingerprints Wednesday, and Ranger City Police were also investigating the robbery.

Craig also lost \$50 that thieves took from a juke box when they broke into a tavern at Mingus last Friday night, and some \$150 was taken from a juke box, a cigarette machine, and two coin-operated amusement machines at Strawn Sunday night. Also on Sunday night thieves made off with an undetermined amount of cash taken from coin boxes robbed in two establishments at the Brazos River Bridge.

By working in a straight line from the River Bridge to Ranger, the thieves netted well over \$300 for three night's work, and may still be in the area.

themselves to improving relations with people of the rural communities who come here to trade. It was suggested that steps be taken to keep the vacant shop windows on Main Street dressed with merchandise all the year around as a means of giving display space to firms that are off the beaten path as well as to keep the street looking attractive.

Other suggestions included making a new survey of our resources, and making a bigger effort to locate many small industries here as well as trying to find large ones. It was mentioned that the Chambers of Commerce of Ranger and Eastland should cooperate closely on all projects that are too big for either town to handle alone.

It was stated that everybody should be encouraged to pull together on everything of a civic nature and that the spirit of cooperation shown during the Christmas season should be continued. Business firms should present a solid front in boosting Ranger as a site for new businesses, and everyone should unite in showing the proper appreciation for businesses already here.

It was suggested that the city concentrate on its clay and lime resources and encourage businesses to come here that could profit by them, and also that the city make an effort to find out what new industries want and then try to meet the challenge.

Before the close of the meeting a motion was made and carried that Ranger sponsor a meeting of the Texas Poultry Improvement Association on January 17. This is a meeting of poultry raisers in a seven county area and the Chamber authorized that a free barbecue be given to members of the association attending the meet here.

If production controls are established during 1957 Eastland County farmers will have 1418 acres of their 1956 allotment—

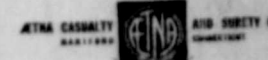
which was thin itself—whacked off, the Agriculture Department's county-by-county breakdown of acreage allotments reveals.

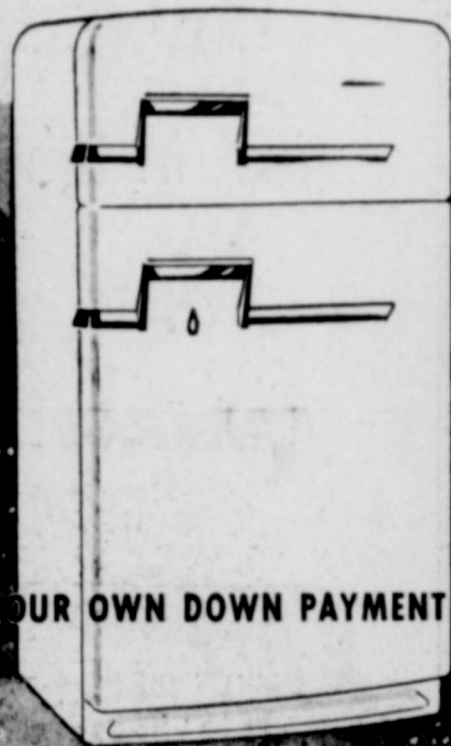
