Gas Company And Merchants' Spring Range Event Begins

A few weeks ago we made some remarks about people who are able to take something that is absolutely worthless and make a fortune out of it, having in mind at the time these Featherlight people of Ranger who discovered that an aggregate for building materials could be made out of these worthless old shale hills around here, and they now have a million dollar industry right on the edge of our city.

But we have found something that will beat that. We can't possibly imagine anything any more worthless than bat manure. But they have now found \$10 million worth of the stuff and are getting ready to recover it and put it on the market. Yes, Sir, plain old bat manure.

Archaeologists have discovered 100,000 tons of the stuff in a cave, the entrance to which is 600 feet up a precipitous wall in the Grand Canyon above the Colorado River — Bat Cave they now call it.

The archeologists claim the entrance to this cave is one of the most inaccessible places on earth, yet modern ingenuity with the aid of a helicopter, a giant vacuum cleaner and the world's longest single-span aerial freight tramway will soon begin tapping this prehistoric treasure which is said to be at least 60 million years old.

This valuable bat "guano," the archeologists call it, was accumulated in the cave before the dawn of man. It is of high nitrogen content and its present state is now a powdered form that can be used as it is for a high-grade odorless, organic fertilizer.

The deposit also has additional value as a source for drugs, and chemists have already isolated uric acid, allantoin, xanthine, hypo xanthine, guanine and adenine alloxan.

Because of the year-around constant temperature of about 70 degrees and a lack of measurable humidity within the cave for the past 60 million years, the guano (Continued on Page Four)

Thomas Wins Place 4; Write-In Campaign Fails for Kuykendall

Ranger FFA Boys Win Prizes In County Live Stock Show

Boone Yarborough And Buddies Nab 20 Big 3-lb. Bass

Boone Yarborough, Dick Henderson and Robert Bailey, fishing between rains and gusts of wind over the past week-end, caught a beautiful string of 20 bass in all that averaged out around 3 pounds each. At one time 5 bass were caught, at another time 6 were pulled in, and at another time Boone landed 9 all by himself. The fish were caught in various places around the lake as the anglers sought still water here and there.

Freddy Cooper, Ranger FFA boy, competing against about 75 other FFA and 4-H Club members, showed one of his Hampshire barrows to the Reserve Championship of the Eastland County Livestock Show held last week. Freddy also showed the First and Second place Hampshire gilts and the First place Hampshire sow of the show. His First place gilt was later awarded Breed Champion female and Reserve Champion female of all breeds in the Swine Division.

A. P. (Pat) Thomas won an easy victory over A. H. (Addie) Williams for Place No. 4 on the City Commission in Tuesday's voting. It was the only contested place on the ticket, which also saw Dr. P. M. Kuykendall getting 11 write-in votes for the place.

The write-in campaign which was initiated at the last minute by Dr. P. M. Kuykendall on the Eastland County Water Board failed with Kuykendall getting 117 votes. Wilson Guest received 343 votes for the place and Felton Brashier 287.

It is said a number of write-in votes could not be counted because the voters had failed to scratch at least one other name from the printed list on the ballot.

The City of Ranger went for Ralph Yarborough for U. S. Senate by a vote of 277-225 over Martin Dies, with Thad Hutchison trailing a poor third, polling a total of 75 votes. The other senatorial candidates didn't poll enough votes to count with Seary Brashier being fourth high man with 12 votes in all in Ranger.

Game Preserve Men Tell Their Side Story

A delegation of officers and directors of the Sabanna Valley Game Preserve Association Wednesday attempted to "set the record straight" over the controversial hunting and fishing bill introduced by Rep. Paul Brashier in their behalf.

.20-In. Rain Falls Wednesday A.M.

A total of .20-inches of rain fell in Ranger from about 3:30 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. Wednesday. Added to another .20-inches altogether that fell off and on last week, that brings to 8.19-inches the amount of rain that has fallen here since last December 18 when the first good rain came following the long drought in this area.

About the only thing this section could ask for right now would be one big gully-washer to fill up the stock tanks, and then it would need to hold off for a while until farmers could get some work done in the fields.

Friday Is Last Chance for Free Chest X-Ray

Ranger residents are urged not to let the last chance slip away tomorrow without going to the lobby of the Ghoslon Hotel some time during the day from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and having their free chest x-rays made by the Texas State Department of Health which has brought an x-ray unit here under sponsorship of the American Legion Auxiliary.

During the two-day survey at Eastland, 1,060 people took advantage of the free x-rays, and Mrs. Tommy Wilson, general county-chairman, said the reason for such a fine number was because citizens mentioned the x-rays to everyone they met on the street reminding them to have the pictures taken, and Ranger citizens are asked to do the same thing in view of mouth advertising.

At least 600 people must be x-rayed, or the survey will never return again. The goal in Ranger is at least 2,000 people.

Having an x-ray made takes only a few moments of a person's time and there is no need to disrobe in any way.

Whatever the outcome of a person's chest x-ray, he has nothing to lose and everything to gain. If his x-ray is clear he will know his lungs are healthy. If tuberculosis is discovered, he knows he can take steps toward checking the disease before his illness becomes serious. X-ray officials report that the majority of cases found during such a project are in an early stage and the earlier it is found the easier it is to cure and the quicker the patient can return to a normal useful life.

The program is for everyone over 15 years of age, and more especially for elderly people in whom most of the cases of TB are found.

It is said that about 300 people a day catch TB in the United States, and about 110,000 a year, meaning there are just as many coming down with it as always, but hardly any of them are dying from the disease which was once the country's No. 1 killer. The reason for this is the disease people are being found by x-ray surveys and cured.

All Ranger citizens are urged to gather up every member of the family over 15 years of age and make the short jaunt to the Ghoslon lobby, and also to spread the word among their neighbors and friends.

Above all, don't let the day pass tomorrow, Friday, April 5, without having the x-ray made while the opportunity presents itself.

has retained all of its original chemical properties, running up to 16 per cent nitrogen with considerable phosphate and potash content. It is the only bat guano deposit of its kind ever discovered in North America of any commercial significance.

Plans for recovering the deposit call for developing the aerial tramway which will reach from the mouth of the cave, 600 feet up a sheer canyon wall, all the way over to the other canyon rim which is 1 1/2 miles across the river gorge, which is 2,911 feet deep at that spot. As a matter-of-fact, with the aid of helicopters they are stringing that tramway across there right now, a 1 1/2-inch track cable which will take out the first load this summer. They've been working on it since last August.

The guano will be picked up by a huge vacuum in the cave and carried 1000 feet through a 10-inch pipe to the cave's entrance where it will be loaded into tramway buckets and thence across the gorge to a packaging plant on the other side which will put it up in 5, 10 and 25 pound containers.

Since there is no road or trail in the bottom of the Canyon in the vicinity of Bat Cave, all equipment, personnel and supplies used had to be handled by air, mostly by helicopter. It was also impossible to get from the top of the Canyon wall down to the cave, or from the bottom of the Canyon floor up to the cave. Workmen who finally established a working base on the floor of the Canyon toiled away in temperatures ranging from 130 degrees in the summer to below freezing in the winter, and have had to battle scorpions, mountain lions and rattlesnakes all through the project.

That is a lot of trouble to go through just on account of a pile of bat manure, but after all,

folks, there's \$10 million worth of it. And right away soon you should be able to get a 25c package of the stuff from your favorite garden shop—good aged fertilizer, 60 million years old, all on account of the fact that somebody once again discovered something worthless and hid a fair to make a fortune out of it.

committee so that it would include only land in the Sabanna Valley. H. A. Lovell, Ted Underwood, Fred Burfield and W. R. Usery were other members of the committee which gave their side of the story in an interview with a reporter from this newspaper.

"We are 100 per cent opposed to the bill as it is now written," they declared. "We didn't want to interfere in anyway with fishing or hunting in any part of the county except on our own land in the Game Preserve."

The Sabanna Game Preserve includes some 66,000 acres of land, but not all of the land would be included in the controlled hunting area, they said. Greenwood said the group wants the land under regulation of the State Game and Fish Commission so that they can receive new deer stock, which the state will not otherwise provide.

Rep. Brashear, meanwhile, repeated his statement that he would oppose the bill himself if he was unsuccessful in getting it amended in committee so that it would include only land in the Sabanna Valley Game Preserve.

Brashear, a hunter-fisherman himself, declared, "I've practically got a lake right in my door (Lake Cisco) and I certainly wouldn't want to do anything that would close it or any other lake in the county to fishing."

No date has yet been set for the hearing on the bill before the Committee on Game and Fisheries. Brashear said he had no immediate plans to ask for a hearing, but that when he did he would certainly give advance notice to Eastland County citizens through the press so that they could have an opportunity to attend if they so desire.

The Veterans Administration has made it convenient for veterans to procure GI Home mortgage loans in localities such as Ranger and surrounding communities where private investors would not ordinarily make such loans, according to B. H. Peacock, local real estate broker.

Peacock said Sect. 512 of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act was added to assist veterans in smaller communities in obtaining loans and some 33 direct loans had already been made in Eastland County.

Peacock said word from the VA Regional Office was to the effect that sufficient funds were now on hand to make quite a number of direct loans if veterans wish to apply for them, that one application from here was already working and several letters have gone out to veterans in the Ranger area who have asked for information.

Peacock said his office now has complete and detailed information with reference to initial costs of

loans, down payments required, interest rate charged, amount of origination fee, and that this information would be given any veteran requesting it. It is understood the program covers both new and already built homes, and allows the purchaser an opportunity to build a home to his own specifications or to purchase his home from those already built in the community.

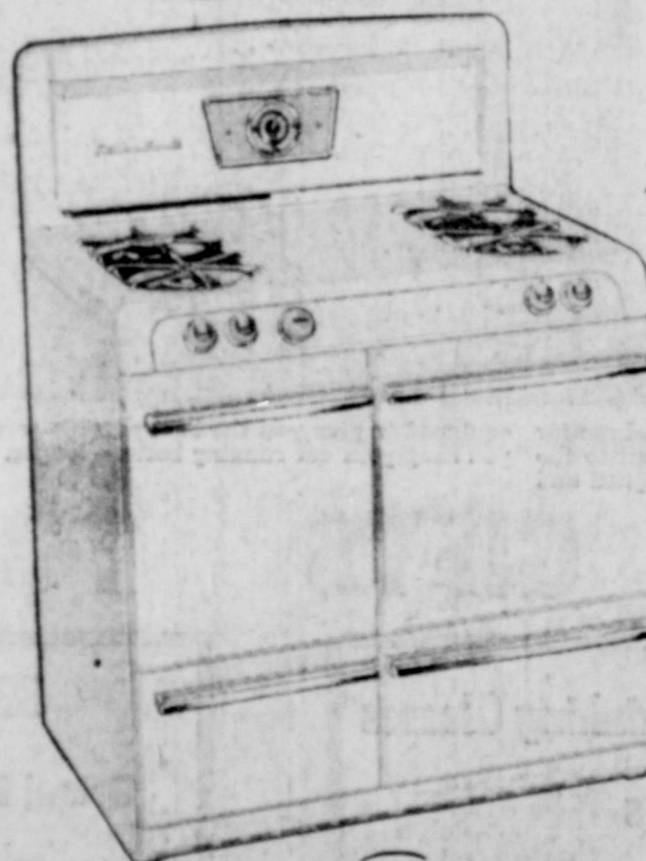

The two of them chatted casually down the corridor into the dining room by the hostess. The lunch was exceptionally good and both were hungry. The minutes flew by. John glanced at his watch, "Golly, it's almost 1 o'clock. Better get going."

But when they got back to the coat rack, Jean's fur coat was gone.

"I'm sorry, sir," said the manager, "but we are not responsible for lost articles. We put up the coat rack for the convenience of our patrons, but that sign you see makes you responsible for your own hat and coat. I'm awfully sorry, but we just can't watch everybody's possessions."

Sign Not Factor

The fact is that in the case of Jean's fur coat the restaurant would not have been responsible for its loss even if there had been no sign. One who takes off a garment and places it on a coat rack, as one would do in a restaurant, retains the power of surveillance and control over it himself.

Ordinarily, under such circumstances, the operators of the restaurant have no responsibility toward the customer's belongings because they have not knowingly received the exclusive possession and dominion over them.

The case would be different, however, where the coat had been delivered to an employee in a checkroom. In such event, the management probably would be responsible. So, also, in the cases where a customer checks valuables with a bathing house proprietor, or with a hotel desk clerk, or leaves his automobile with the parking lot attendant to be parked and stored for him, those receiving possession of the customer's property have the duty to use proper care to see that the customer's property is returned.

How To Drive Safely At Night

Three out of five fatal auto accidents occur at night; but, nighttime travel can be easier, safer, and more fun when you follow the advice of professional truck drivers, highway patrolmen, and other safety experts.

They advise reflectorized tape on the rear bumper and clean headlights as important safety factors. Other motorists can tell both the speed and direction of your car more quickly if it's marked with reflectors. Dirty headlights can cut your vision as much as 10 to 25 percent, say the experts in an article in the April issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine.

At dusk, drive with full driving lights on, not just parking lights. In fact, today's fast trains run with lighted headlights even in broad daylight. That's for safety—to gain quicker recognition.

Tuesday is the safest night for driving, according to safety experts. Next in order come Wednesday, Thursday, and then Monday.

On Friday nights, accidents increase, and on Saturday and Sunday nights they surge upward. Some truckers try to avoid the weekend "alcoholic traffic."

State troopers warn, in the article, that new rain makes roads slick after it mixes with the "traffic film" of the highway, so a light drizzle can be more dangerous than a heavy downpour. The reason is that heavy rain will wash the oily film off the pavement in 30 minutes, but it may take two hours for a light drizzle to wash away the film, so cut your speed sharply until the slick coating has disappeared.

Keep newspapers in your car. Newsprint contains tannic acid, which makes it an excellent windshield cleaner when used with plain water. Also clean the inside of your windshield often, especially on a long trip. Cigarette smoke, industrial fumes, dust, and "fried" oil from the cars ahead coat both sides of the windshield. This foreign matter causes "flashes" in the windshield as headlights come toward you, which tires the eyes.

Several other "owl driver" tips reported by the magazine are:

turn on the dome light when it's safe to do so to relieve tired eyes, change the brightness of the dashboard lights from time to time, and shift stations on the radio to avoid sleepiness.

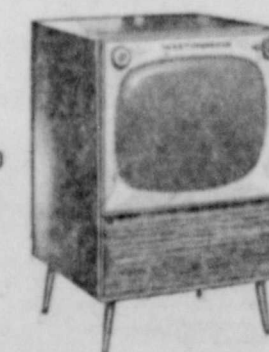

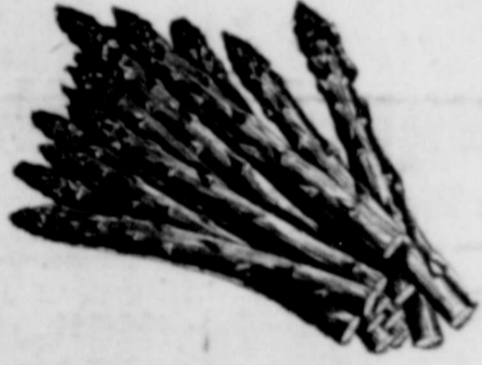
