## Ranger Is Set for Dedication Saturday

### Parade Set For 5p.m. Johnson Speech 6:30



Speaking, Barbecue and All of Program Will Be Held Inside New Building

If you have never seen a mounted, motorized 155 mm Howitzer capable of hurling 95-pounds of projectile for a distance of 10 miles, you've got a treat coming because you're going to get to see eight or ten of them in the parade in Ranger Saturday at 5 p.m., opening the Army Day program that will climax with the dedication of the new \$80,000 Armory Headquarters for Service Battery, 648th Armored Field Artillery Battalion.

The Howitzers are coming from Cheo's firing battery and from the battery at Breckenridge, and will parade in review, along with vehicles from Ranger's Service Battery, before Major General Albert Sidney Johnson, commander of the 49th Armored Division, Texas National Guard.

General Johnson will deliver the principal address at the dedication ceremonies at approximately 6:30 p.m. He will be introduced by Brigadier General Clayton P. Kerr, commander of the artillery of the 49th Division.

General Johnson has had a distinguished career as both a citizen and soldier. He attended the First Officers Training Camp at Leon Springs, Texas and was commissioned a second lieutenant in August of 1917 and assigned to the 90th Infantry Division. In France, lieutenant Johnson served with the 345th Machine Gun Battalion and with the 260th Infantry, participating in the St. Mihiel

Officers and men of the Ranger Unit of the National Guard are prepared in case rain shows up again to hamper the dedication program Saturday.

In the first place, according to Capt. C. C. Carr, the whole thing, speaking, barbecue and all, is going to be held inside the new building and it doesn't leak in there. Also, men of Service Battery have taken the precaution to lay temporary walkways from Highway 80 to the building entrance so that no body will get their shoes muddy coming and going.

"Regardless of the weather," Capt. Carr said, "we want everybody to come to the dedication. We have prepared for rain, and nobody will be inconvenienced by it very much."

We are happy that the Times is now offering such a full coverage in Ranger. We have known for weeks that our circulation has been on the increase, but we never had taken the time to see just how far it did go.

We don't know how this week has been with you, but it has been a rat race of the first order with us. We started off in a dead run and are still at it. With newspapers calling in here from Fort Worth and Abilene wanting to know how many dead folks had been counted in East-

### Ranger Rain Only 1.47 Inches Short Of All Last Year

Rainfall in Ranger up until Wednesday night has been measured unofficially by the Times at exactly 46.00 inches since the first of January, 1957.

This is only 1.47 inches short of being as much as fell here all during the year 1956.

If the 4.50 inches that fell during the latter part of December 1956 were moved forward only 10 days, placing it in January 1957, and taking it away from December 1956, Ranger would now have a total of 20.50 inches as compared to 12.97 for all of 1956.

Counting the 4.50 inches which fell in the latter part of December, total rainfall in 1956 was 17.47 inches.

### 46 lb. Catfish, Many More Whoppers Are Pulled from Lake

James Smith of Texas Electric Company Plant, fed a host of friends at his home Wednesday on a 46-lb. catfish that he pulled out of Lake Leon at a spot immediately below the Texas Electric Service Company dam. Dozens of other catfish were pulled from the same place weighing 39 and 30 pounds together with what witnesses described as "a whole truckload of catfish weighing from 2 to 10 pounds."

This fishing bonanza was discovered at a spot where the water runs from the gates in the Texas Electric dam into Lake Leon. When the water was split off from the gates, deep holes remained that were filled with water, and the fish were in these holes.

### Comm. Thomas Asks Citizens' Aid In Weed and Mosquito Fight

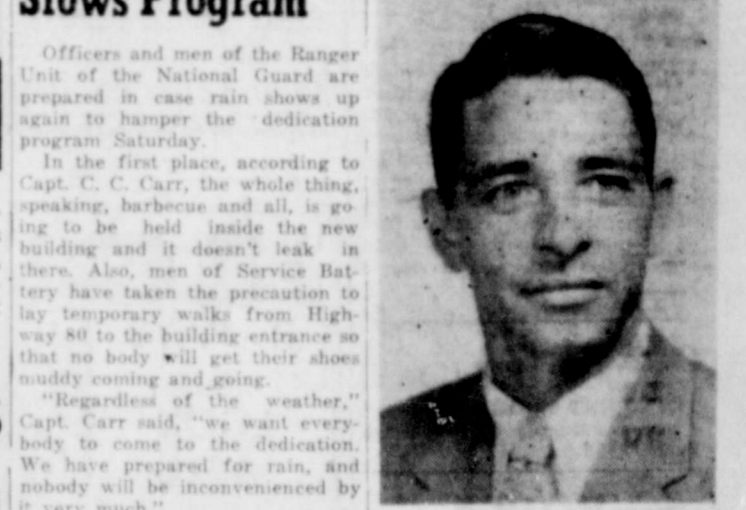
A. P. (Pat) Thomas Jr., City Commissioner of Sanitation and Dr. A. W. Brazda, City Health Officer, joined forces today in asking the aid of citizens to help rid their places of weeds and other things that would provide breeding places and harbors for mosquitoes or else the whole town will be overridden with them within a very short time.

Commissioner Thomas said the City was getting ready to give the town a thorough spraying for fly and mosquito control, and a mower would be put to work within a few days cutting high weeds and grass in the ditches along streets and alleys. He said the City would put forth every effort to keep the drainage ditches open so that as much water as possible could run off.

Get Some Kerosene

Dr. Brazda pointed out that no matter how open the drainage ditches were, there would be plenty of water left standing inside the city limits and he asked that residents cooperate in the mosquito control program by sending a few cents for a gallon of kerosene and pouring it all over the water holes that could not be drained.

**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**



Good ground cover such as dead litter and growing vegetation continue to prove to be the most effective conservation practice for control of wind and water erosion. This is true on all types land.

Conservation farmers on deep coarse textured "peanut" sands realize that a complete vegetative program is their only means of controlling erosion from wind and water. A good vegetative program on deep sands include a combination of winter cover crops, crop residue utilization and strip cropping on land planted to peanuts.

Winter cover crops of small grain with vetch seeded last fall have given excellent protection against high winds this spring, as well as conserving maximum rain fall. Recent good rains have produced excellent cover crop growth. Many cover crops will be harvested for grain, others particularly on peanut land the residue will be managed for continued soil protection and improvement.

Residue management on cropland is the plowing operation on grain stubble, stalks, and other crop aftermath so that they are only partially covered or left lying on the surface of the soil. Benefits from this practice include reduction of erosion by controlling raindrop splash, reduction of evaporation, reduction of runoff, increased water holding capacity of the soil, as well as greatly lessening wind erosion. Farm equipment most commonly used for crop residue management includes sweep type tillage plows, chisel plows, tandem disks and stalk cutters, and one way plows operated shallow and at slow speed to not bury residue. Some farmers return peanut hay to their field to further reduce wind and water hazards.

Strip cropping has become a common conservation practice with most peanut farmers. Strip cropping used in conjunction with peanuts provide a barrier against wind erosion. They act as wind brakes, being close enough together to break the effects of wind at the surface of the ground. Strips fit well into a system of crop rotation alternating from year to year. They provide organic material which helps hold water, plant food, and air. Deep rooted crops used for strips will open up the soil where it will catch and store more water. Crops used for strips must be adapted to soil conditions and should be fertilized the same as clean tilled crops. Strips left in the field will prevent sanding of peanut in the windrow during harvest and are helpful in the establishment of winter cover crops. Best results are obtained when strips are planted on the contour or across the prevailing winds, and not less than four rows of grain sorghum or two rows of sudan alternated with not more than eight rows of peanuts.

**Face Covering On Sheep Worth Up to \$5 Per Head**

SONORA — Face covering has long been an important selection factor in breeding fine wool Rambouillet sheep. Now, Animal Husbandmen at the Sonora Experiment Station affix definite values up to \$5.00 a head for sheep with medium face covering over those with near-complete coverings which pose serious wool-blindness threats.

Proper selection of ewes with an intermediate amount of wool-covering on the face can mean a difference of 5 to 9 pounds more lamb weight than either those heavily-covered or open-faced. The extra weight is due almost entirely to a higher percentage of weaned lamb crop. Ewes with an excessive amount of wool on the face also tend to be much more susceptible to screw-worm strikes in lachrymal pits below the eyes. It's a good management practice therefore, to cull potentially wool-blind sheep at birth or as found in the flock. While specialists believe it may be possible to develop a sheep which will breed true for an intermediate amount of face covering,

present recommendations center around culling out potential wool-blindness and selecting open-faced animals on the basis of individual production records.

There was even a piece in the Abilene paper Monday afternoon that said Norma Wright said so in a telephone conversation Sunday, and we said no such thing. We were not even in this part of the country Sunday. We were in Fort Worth.  
We knew of a report where the fire chief in Eastland had scouted around trying to locate a few boats in case the North Fork of the Leon got out into the colored section of town, but were so unimpressed by the story we paid no attention to it because why should anybody need boats to evacuate the colored section of Eastland when all those people would have to do would be to roll up their pants legs and wade out.  
The Fort Worth Star Telegram news called Tuesday afternoon was a 1 1/2 x 1 1/2 x 1 1/2 and a Fort Worth Radio Station at 10:30 a.m. all the gory details Monday night of the heroic evacuation.  
It reminded us of one afternoon a couple of weeks ago when all of us here in Ranger were standing around watching a black cloud over the center of town while listening to a nearby radio station give a blow by blow description of how a tornado was at that minute destroying the city.

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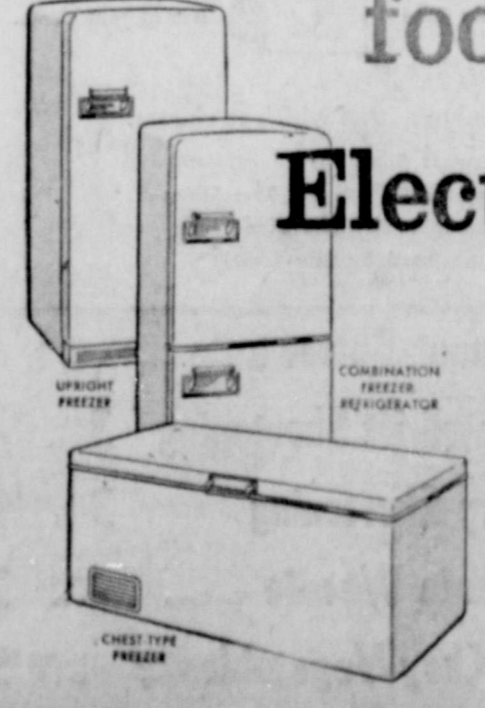
