

CAPT. GREER H. ESTES TO BE REBURIED IN DIMMITT CEMETERY SUNDAY, JAN. 23

Reburial Services will be conducted for Capt. Greer H. Estes Sunday, at 2:00 p. m., in the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Percy Estes, in Dimmitt. Capt. Estes, one of the many war dead who are now being returned home for burial, will arrive in Hereford Saturday and will be brought immediately to the family home in Dimmitt.

Rites will be in charge of the local Masonic Lodge and the Greer Estes American Legion Post No. 445. Burial will be in the Dimmitt cemetery where graveside services will be held.

No church service will be held as memorial services were conducted for Capt. Estes at the Dimmitt Methodist Church on September 3, 1944.

A member of a pioneer Castro County family, Capt. Estes had been engaged in combat during the first month of the invasion of France, before he was killed in action at Montgarden, France, on July 8, 1944.

RUNNINGWATER Soil Conservation DISTRICT

Barber Eubanks, Chairman R. A. Axtell, Vice-chairman Leo Witkowski, Sec.-Treas. Earl Cole, Member Willis Hawkins, Member The Board of Supervisors of the Castro County Wind Erosion District met at 10:00 o'clock a. m. on Tuesday, January 18, 1949, in the District Court Room in Dimmitt, Texas, with all members present. The purpose of the meeting was to develop the program and plan of operations for the newly formed Runningwater Soil Conservation District, which is also supervised by the same board. Much progress was made in developing a soil capability chart, which classifies the different types of soil found in the district according to the intensity of treatment needed to keep the land in productivity. The capability class of different types of soil depends on soil depth, texture, permeability, slope, and erosion.

The Board plans to meet again on January 31, 1949, for the purpose of making recommendations regarding the varying degrees of intensity of treatment that each soil type and class will require to prevent erosion by wind and water and improve its productivity.

The Board was reorganized at the last meeting with Mr. Eubanks being re-elected as Chairman, Mr. Axtell, elected Vice-Chairman, and Mr. Witkowski elected Secretary-Treasurer.

The Board was entertained at luncheon by the Dimmitt Lions Club.

Mel Jowell, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Jowell of Dimmitt was among those receiving watches.

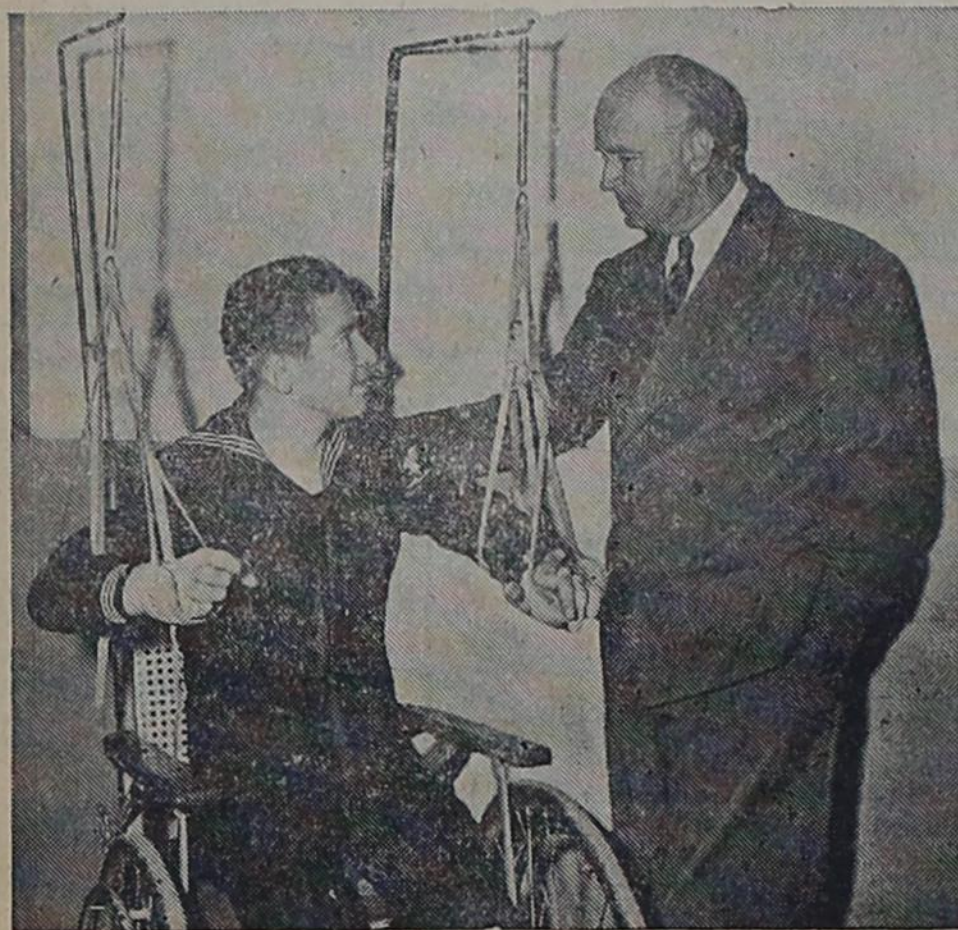

OUR FAVORITE RECIPES

HAM and CHEESE SOUFFLE

Melt in double boiler 3 tablespoons butter. Blend in slowly 3 tablespoons flour. Stir in gradually 1 cup hot milk. Add 1/4 teaspoonful salt, 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard, and 1-8 teaspoon pepper, and a sprinkle of paprika.

Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add 1/2 cup sharp cheese,

grated. Stir until melted. Add slowly to 3 beaten egg yolks. Cook, stirring until yolks are cooked, about 1 minute or until mixture thickens. Fold in 1 cup finely chopped ham. Allow mixture to cool. Whip until stiff 3 egg whites. Fold into cheese mixture and pour into an ungreased baking dish (7 inch). Bake at 325 degrees for 50 minutes or until mixture is puffed and firm. Serve promptly.

HALF A HAM

Choose either a cottage butt of smoked ham or a picnic shoulder. Place the ham, fat side up, on rack in shallow pan and bake at 300 degrees, allowing 25 to 30 minutes to the pound. The five-pound size will require approximately 2 1/2 hours.

After two hours remove from oven, remove hard outer rind, if any. Score surface of fat in diamond shapes. Rub with a mixture of: 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard and 2 table spoons vinegar, pineapple or other fruit juice. Insert a whole clove at each diamond point. Bake a half hour more to brown.

PIGS IN CORN CASSEROLE

Peel and cut in thin slices 4 to 6 medium potatoes. Cut 10 to 12 slices of baked ham. Arrange a layer of each in greased casserole. Sprinkle with flour. (Allow 2 tablespoons flour for 1 cup milk.)

Add 1 No. 2 can whole-grain corn, 2 tablespoons green pepper, chopped, and 1 tablespoon chopped pimiento. Arrange circle of potato and ham slices around top. Sprinkle with remaining flour. Add 1 cup hot milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, and 1/4 teaspoon paprika. Cover. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Remove cover and bake 15 minutes more until potatoes are browned slightly. Serves six.

Scalloped Cabbage and Apples

2 quarts shredded cabbage
1 quart tart sliced apples
2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon sugar
2 to 4 tablespoons butter or other fat.

In a greased baking dish place alternate layers of the cabbage and apples, seasoning each with salt and fat and sprinkling the sugar on the apples. Over the last layer spread the buttered crumbs.

Cover, and bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes, or until the cabbage and apples are tender. Toward the last remove the cover so the crumbs can brown. Serve in the baking dish.

HAM and YAM CASSEROLE

Cook until tender 2 to 3 yams. Peel. Mash yams to obtain 2 cups. Mix together 2 cups mashed yams 2-3 cup crushed pineapple, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 1/4 teaspoonful nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and 1 cup chopped cooked ham. Turn mixture into greased baking-dish. Top with 2 tablespoons butter, in bits. Bake at 400 degrees about 20 minutes.

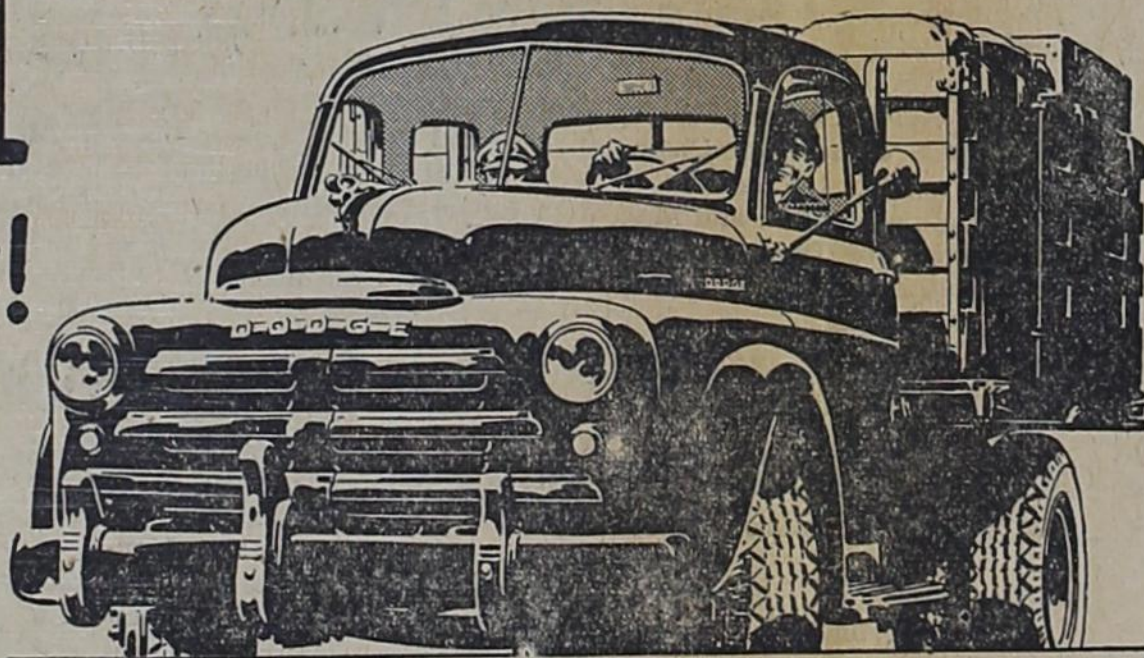

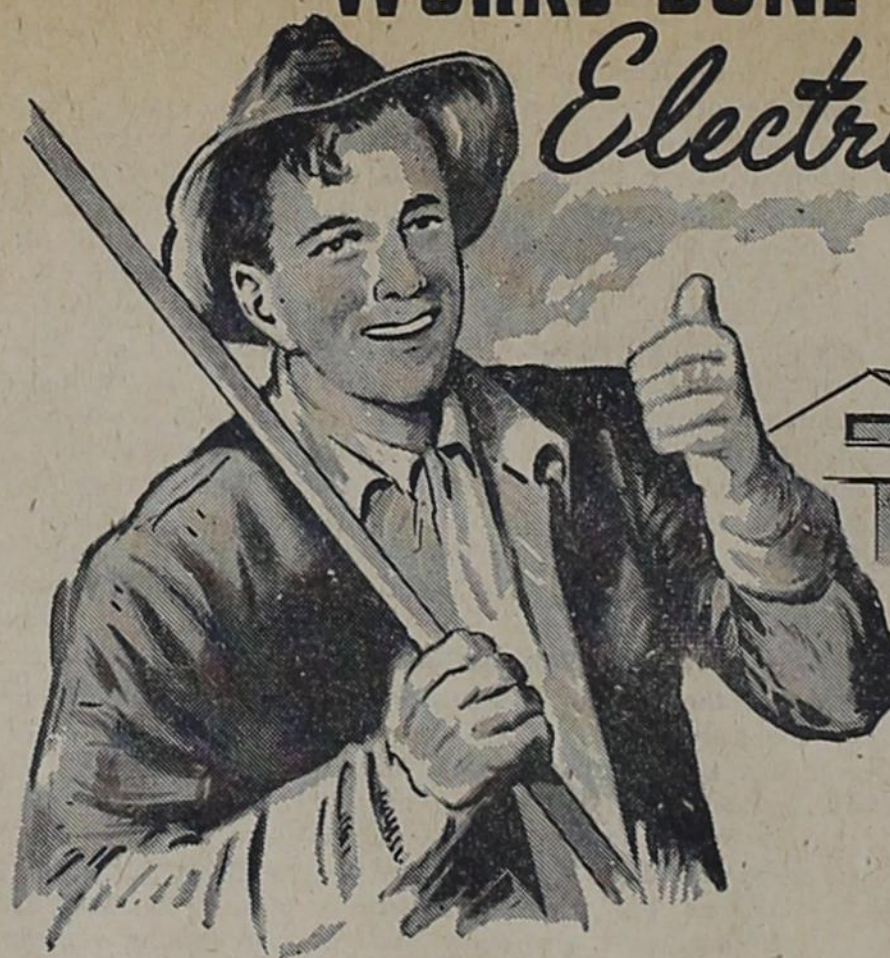

Texas Drouths Recur In Cycles Every 12 Years

The recent Texas drouth was part of a climatic cycle which can be expected to recur about every 11 or 12 years, says a University of Texas archaeologist who is interested in the relation between climatic change and human history in North America. Alex D. Krieger, participant in a program on weather cycles at the recent Plains Archaeological conference in Lincoln, Neb., says drouths have recurred repeatedly for many centuries in the Great Plains states, and this information should be a sign-post to farmers to anticipate these changes in their crop planning.

He points to modern drouth periods in 1934-36, 1923-24, 1910-12, 1899-1901, and the 1880's as examples of climatic cycles which have had profound effects on American economy.

Establishment of the exact dates on climatic periods in North America during the past 25,000 years is one of the problems facing climatologists.

The archaeologist can date his finds through geological and other means, thus helping the climatologist to determine the date of climatic periods which changed life on this continent during the past 25,000 years, Krieger says.

Tourist Records Broken At Canyon Museum In 1948

Canyon, Jan.—More tourists thronged through the Panhandle-Pinals Historical Museum during 1948 than in any previous year, announced Boone McClure, assistant curator. The 50,627 visitors last year brought the total of persons registering at the museum since its opening to 539,704.

Texans led the parade with a total of 44,532 persons. Oklahoma ranked second with 1,132 and New Mexico had 817. Other states represented with more than 100 visitors show California, 478; Kansas, 346; Illinois, 315; Missouri, 307; Colorado, 192; Arkansas, 184; Nebraska, 146; Iowa, 140; Ohio, 127; Indiana, 124; Louisiana, 120; and Michigan, 102.

August was the best month for visitors with 6,092. May tourists registered to the tune of 5,831; April had 5,517 and July saw 5,274 visitors. Other monthly totals are: March, 4,628; October, 4,466; June, 4,365; September, 4,250; February, 4,185; November, 2,744; December, 2,195 and January, 2,052.

Attendance at the museum has grown from 22,767 during 1933 after it opened in April, to the present total of more than 50,000. Other yearly totals are: 1934, 29,355; 1935, 26,299; 1936, 36,104; 1937, 27,806; 1938, 30,672; 1939, 36,849; 1940, 39,787; 1941, 40,330; 1942, 26,618; 1943, 25,698; 1944, 27,413; 1945, 35,266; 1946, 39,617; 1947, 44,507.

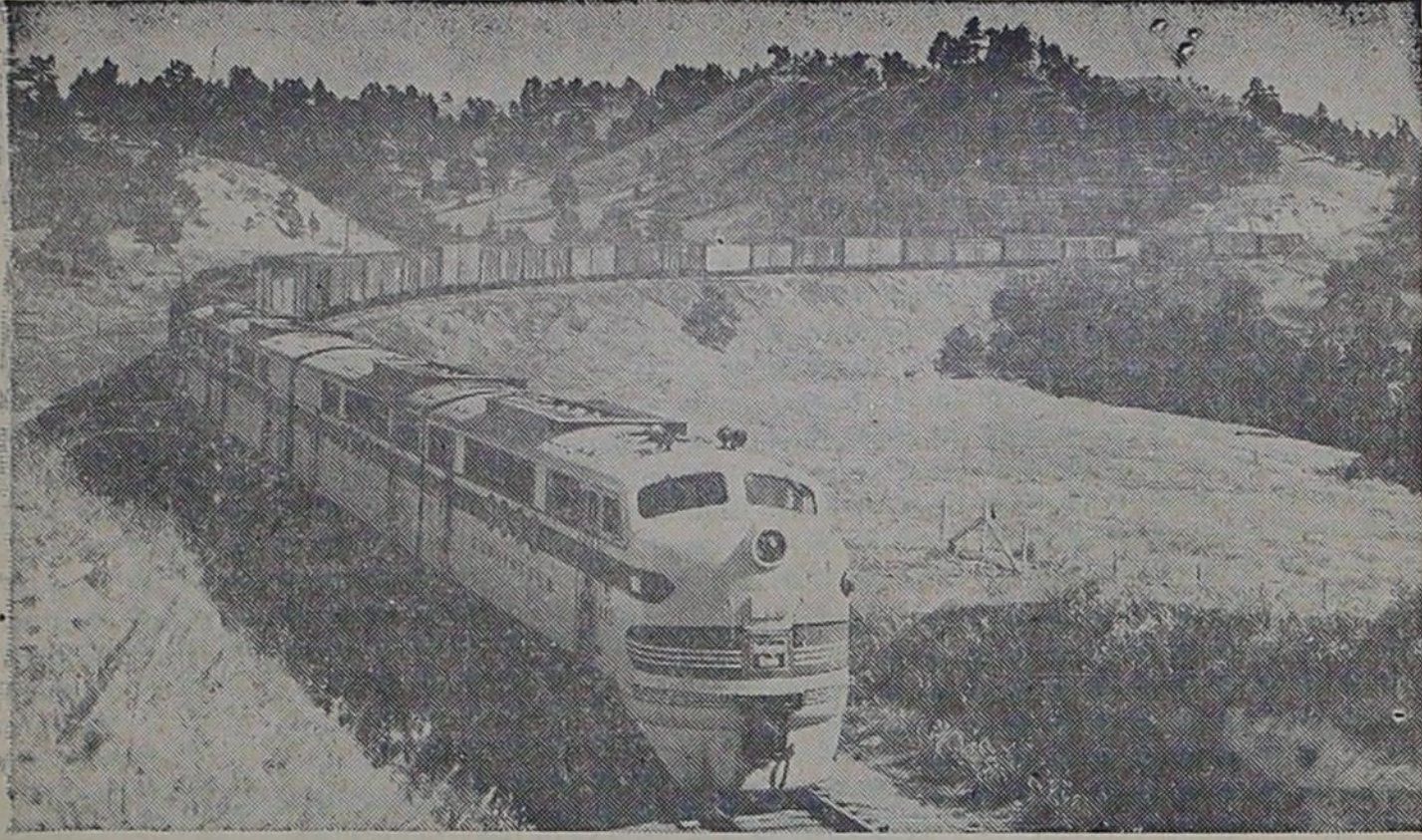
