\$400 Million to Be West Texas Share Of Federal Roads

Pretty soon it will be August and pretty soon after that it will be September and things will start popping again.

School will be under way and a little nipiness will start permeating the air and everybody will be bustling around with a purpose.

We sincerely hope when that time comes the city of Ranger itself, will be ready to pick up where it left off at the beginning of summer and bring the last one-third of the year to a whirlwind finish.

Ranger had up a full head of steam up to and including the Chamber of Commerce clinic and then summer began to crowd around everything and everybody and the town slowed down as most towns do.

But the momentum can be picked up again and it must be. Ranger has had a splendid year, and the best part of it is yet to come.

West Texas' share of the proposed federal highway program will total almost 400 million dollars, an article in the July issue of West Texas Today states.

The magazine, in an article reflecting on the effect of the new highway system on West Texas and its economy, quotes State highway engineer D. C. Greer as saying that "1,359 miles, 47 per cent, of the proposed Interstate System for Texas will be in West Texas."

The magazine, monthly publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, states that Greer estimates West Texas' share to be about \$377,964,000 or 25 per cent of the total allotment for the State's interstate highways. Texas will receive about \$1.6 billion during the next 13 to 15 years from the Federal government for the program.

The article also explains the current highway program of the Texas Highway Department. "Our highway program, including Interstate, for the present fiscal year calls for 3,068 miles of construction throughout the state at a cost of \$381,000,000. Of this programed construction, 43 per cent, 2,229 miles, is in the West Texas area," Greer says in the article. He adds that the total cost for this West Texas construction will be about \$128 million.

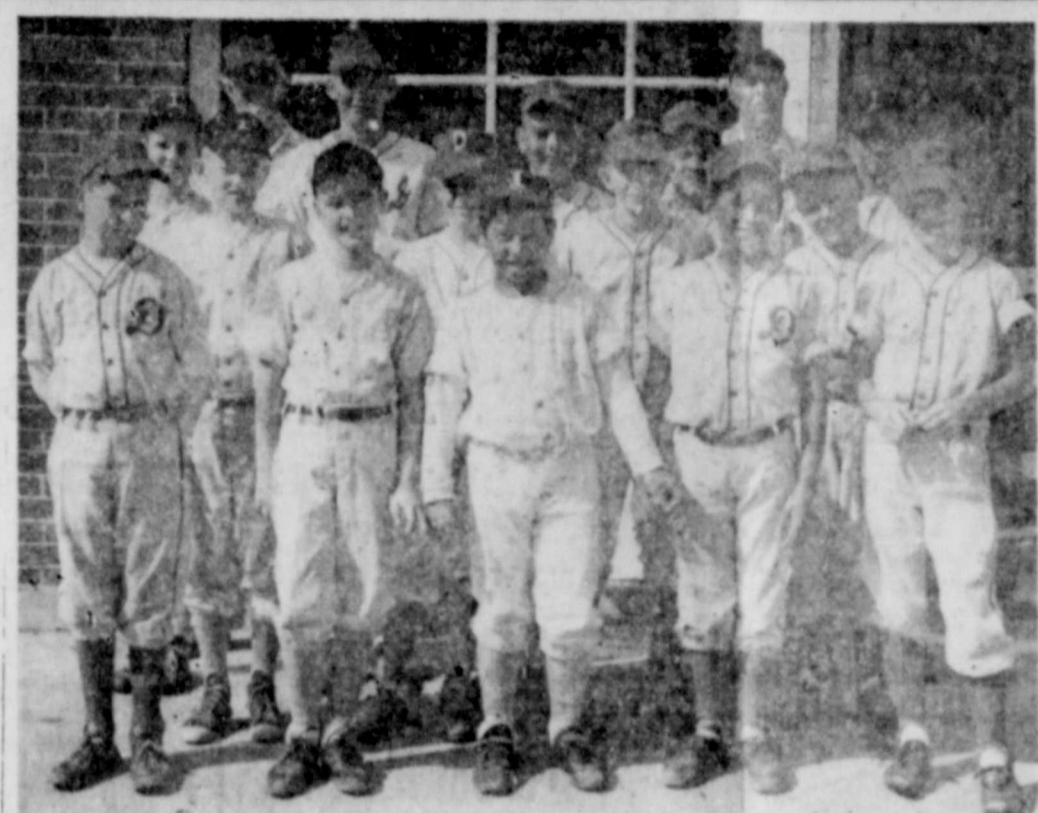
The article also quotes Greer concerning future multilane or expressway construction for West Texas which is now on the Highway Department's program books. In addition to similar construction now underway, Greer states that 181 miles of multilane construction in West Texas is planned.

A complete list of all multilane construction programed for West Texas — that part of the state served by the WTCC and west of a line running generally from Gainesville through Arlington, Waco, Johnson City, and Kerrville to Del Rio — is carried in the article.

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If the Indians beat the Yankees tonight, and if the Giants win their game from the Dodgers to-

night, then the Giants can get a tie for the pennant by defeating the Yankees in their make-up game.

If the Giants lose either one of their next two games, and the Indians beat the Yankees tonight, then the Indians will be undisputed ruler of the roost in first place.

If the Indians should lose to the Yankees, and if the Giants should win from both the Yankees and the Dodgers, then the Giants would be in first place.

Any way you figure it, it's the Yankees are the boys to beat because they hold the key to the present situation.

Although the area tournament starts Monday night at Eastland in which the Ranger All-Stars take on the Eastland All-Stars in the opening game, the Giant-Yankee make-up game cannot be played here until the middle of next week, at least, on account of pitching rules and regulations.

James Townzen, manager of the Yankees, said he had talked with Willard Seymour, manager of the Giants, and both of them had decided their pitching situation would not allow the game to be played this week. Little League regulations set forth just how many pitchers a team can have, and how many innings each man can pitch per week, and the managers can't play their regular games and the make-up game, too, and stay within the rules. It will therefore have to be played next week.

Also, the game MUST be played, or the League will lose its franchise, because rules state again that 18 games must be played during the season.

In case the Giants and Indians should happen to wind up in a tie for first place, instead of playing a sudden-death play-off game to decide the winner, some officials think now that they might just let the two teams share the championship as was the case last year. However, this point has not been officially decided.

Little League officials have announced they hope a big delegation of fans from Ranger will prepare to make the trip to Eastland Monday night to root for the All-Stars in their bid for area honors.

Brownwood game winner will get a free advance into the area tourney finals. This Wednesday night the area championship will be determined.

Area champs will then go to the District Tournament in Abilene the following night, Thursday. The area tourney winner will meet the winner of the lower bracket area meet in first round play. In that area tourney area teams from Merit, Wildie, Coleman, Dyess, Air Force Base and Western and Northern Abilene.

Brownwood has two teams represented in the tournament since that city has two Leagues. Each League selected an all-star team composed of the outstanding boys in the League.

James Wright, president of the Eastland Little League, has been named area chairman. He said that in the past there will no charge of any of the games. Contributions will be accepted to pay the expense of the tournament, however.

Ranger Junior College will open its doors for the thirty-second year of service on September 9, 1957, it was announced today by Dr. Price R. Ashton, president.

Prospects now point to the largest enrollment in the history of the institution, Ashton said.

In keeping with the educational trend throughout the state, requirements are being stiffened. Courses in English, American history, government, foreign language, science, and mathematics are now required courses for all students who seek an associate of arts degree.

Dr. Ashton begins his fifth year as president of Ranger Junior College. Valuation of the college plant has increased from \$410,000 to \$712,000 making it now in the neighborhood of a million dollar investment in Ranger. The income of Ranger Junior College four years ago was \$98,000 per year. Today it is \$228,400 per year and promises to continue to increase.

Enrollment for the 1956-57 term of 630 students will likely show a large increase. New dormitories for both men and women and the new cafeteria will provide the added facilities necessary to care for the influx in enrollment.

The Administration Building is at the present time undergoing a complete renovation and redecoration.

The Auditorium has been completely redecorated in two tones of green. New venetian blinds add a decorative note as well as a practical one since the blinds make it possible to darken the auditorium for audio-visual aids.

Classrooms are being repainted in dove gray, fern green and woodgrain blue. The halls and stairways are repainting the green tones of the auditorium.

An attractive and eye-opening administration building will welcome the students in September.

Tickets will be offered for sale in all neighboring towns or may be purchased at the gate. Since the site is available only by car, tickets are offered on the car basis. This can afford an afternoon of fun and pleasure for the entire family.
