Soil Conservation News Shows Activity

Editor's Note: The following news of soil conservation activities in Eastland County was prepared and written by the soil conservation office in the county seat and released this week.

We are making good progress in "restocking" our ranges with grass this summer. Soil soaking rains in April and May gave land owners their best opportunity in years of bringing the better grasses back to their range land.

Our better deep rooted grasses have taken advantage of this moisture for unusually prolific growth. Shallow rooted spring grasses such as Texas grama and annual needle grass have made little more than their normal growth, being over shaded in many places with weeds.

Chas. A. Clark who lives two miles west of Eastland has just completed two large division terraces, which are designed to keep outside water out of his cropland.

Old County History Is Packed With Information

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first in a series of articles taken from the book "History of Eastland County, Texas," which was written by Mrs. George Langston and published in 1904. The Times feels that these articles will be of interest to everyone, especially to the younger generation. There will be several of the articles, which may be clipped and made into valuable scrapbooks.

In 1858, before a white man had ventured to expose himself and family to the dangers of what was then an Indian infested frontier, Eastland County was created by an act of the Seventh Legislature of Texas. By the same act, allahan, Stephens, Concho, Wichita, Coleman, Dawson, Shackelford, McMullen, Frio, Zavalla, Edwards, Haskell, Knox, Hardeman, Dimmit, Baylor, Runnels, Jones, Wilbarger, La Salle, Dabul, Taylor, and Encinal Counties came into existence. The bill was approved Feb. 1, 1858.

Eastland County is ideally located, containing within its limits the divide between the Leon River and Palo Pinto Creek, and the western extremity of the backbone of the Colorado and Brazos Rivers.

The depression between these two divides is cut into by Colony Creek, a tributary of the Leon River. The northern slope of the eastern divide is drained by the two forks of Palo Pinto Creek, while the rest of the County is watered by the Leon, which rises just beyond the County's western limit, and makes it exit about three miles southwest of Desdemona.

The eastern divide is characterized by high hills of numerous shapes, which lie, in the main, east and west. It is gashed with jagged ravines, and abounds in deep canyons, in confused and filled rocks, producing a varied and picturesque scenery.

This broken ridge of high land bends northward above the first impressions of Colony Creek, and dips again southward around Cleo, the tongue of the Brazos looking into the northern slope of the backbone, playing hide and seek with the forgers of the Leon and Colorado on the south. As the great skeleton begins to spread itself westward, it leaves large canyons and gulches.

Trees of many kinds grow in great profusion—cedar and live oak on the hills; post oak and blackjack on the sandy uplands; pecan and walnut, elm and hackberry, cottonwood and willow along the streams, and in the glades mesquite abounds, and in many parts, locust, the shinary.

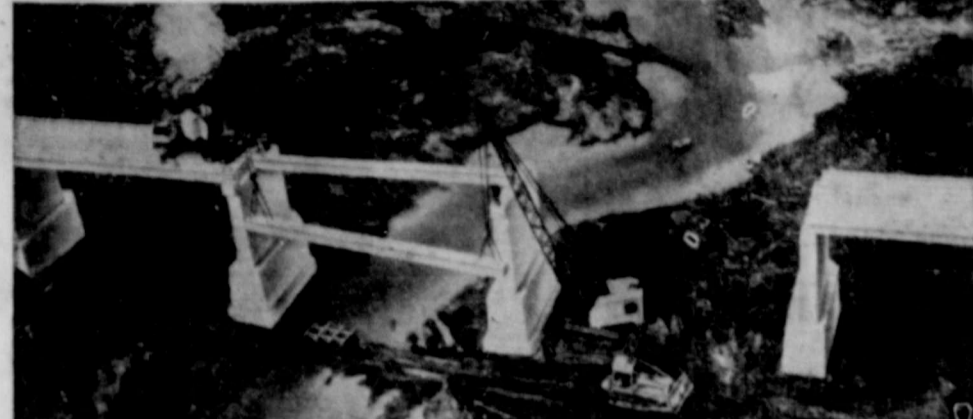

NEW TECHNIQUES IN BRIDGE BUILDING HELP SPEED UP HIGHWAY PROGRAM



Precast concrete spans, reinforced with prestressed steel, are brought from the factory and quickly positioned for a big bridge.

Modern wonders in construction will enable the National Highway Building Program to better accomplish its missions of reducing traffic congestion and providing safer travel.

Precast concrete spans—a cost-saving development—will go into many of the 304,600 bridge structures required in the 13-year road program including the 41,000-mile network of super-highways.

On just one highway in one state (Illinois), there was a saving of \$20,000 on each of 200 bridges by using precast bridge members. The weather-proof structures require a minimum of maintenance and no painting.

Each of the spans in precast bridge sections is reinforced with steel cables and pretensioned. They function as the support between piers and as flooring. American-Marietta Company — one of the nation's foremost suppliers of construction materials — produces them in lengths up to 100 feet.

While contractors' crews are building forms and pouring concrete for piers, workers in American-Marietta's plants are precasting the concrete span sections.

They are trucked to the bridge site for placement as soon as upright supports are ready. Cranes swing them onto the piers, and they are interlocked in required widths.

Derricks are moved forward on the newly placed spans. Where a stream bed is shallow, a crane may be operated from there.

Placing of one full span a day is normal, though some installations are finished within hours.

No longer must men risk their lives by extending scaffolds across the depths and then building forms that have to be torn away later.

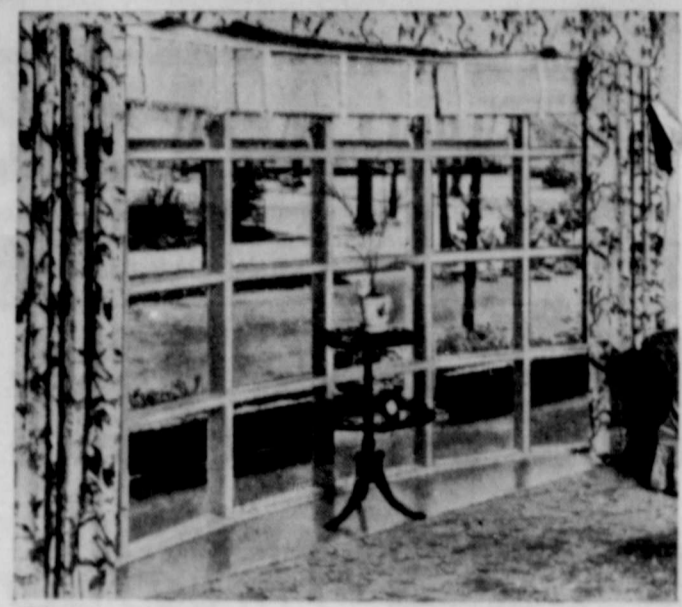
The sanctuary of the Carol Choirs will bring the special music Sunday morning. Their number, "Open Mine Eyes That I May See."

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Production of Broilers Nears Saturation Point AUSTIN, — Although Texas ranked second nationally in 1956 broiler production, it appears the industry may have reached the point of near-saturation in the state, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research says. "Any further increase in production would mean additional declines in prices," Research Associate Izumi Taniguchi writes in Texas Business Review. "This is unlikely because broiler producers would not be able to stand lower prices without suffering losses." Texas broiler production climbed from 26 million chickens in 1949 to about 100 million in 1956. Gross income to broiler producers in Texas in 1956 reached \$62,969,000. However, during the last quarter of 1956, the price of finished broilers in Texas fell to a low of 16.5 cents per pound. "This price appears to be near the minimum that poultry producers will take and, should such a low price continue for any length of time, broiler producers are in for hard times," Taniguchi reports. The oldest broiler producing area in the state is centered around Gonzales. However, that area has lost its leadership to East Texas in recent years. A third important area is centered around Waco. Taniguchi sees the present situation in the Texas broiler industry as "an example of the competitive system in action." "When prices were high and profits good, many new producers entered the broiler business," he points out. "Now with low prices, it is possible that the marginal producers will be forced out of business. The effect will be to stabilize prices."

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
