Tullman A. Smithy, the Portland Cement Company representative who spoke to the Ranger Lions Club today noon, discussed a subject that just might, someday, become a very important subject to Ranger. History Tells of Indian Attack on Stewart House

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston and published in 1904.)

Early in the year of 1860, (Feb. 7), close to the eastern boundary line of the County, Jim Stewart, with Mack Allen and Bethel Strawn, was clearing off underbrush about a quarter of a mile from his home. Near by were Sam and William Allen and William Lowder.

In Mr. Stewart's little one-room cabin, with its lean-to, were his wife and Misses Emmaline and Martha Allen, the latter being a sister to William Allen.

While the two girls carded, Mrs. Stewart presided at the spinning wheel, all discussing, the meanwhile, the colors they would use in their new dresses.

"Mine'll be the prettiest of all, then," followed Mrs. Stewart, for Jim wants me to make it red and green and blue."

"Listen," gasped Mrs. Stewart. "Ye Gods! Such a lot of em!" said Martha, as 20 Indians

Demand for Show Windows May Exceed Available Supply

New Fishing Law Is Effective Sept. 1st

A new Sports Fishing License Law which increases fishing license fees becomes effective September 1, 1957. The additional revenue will enable the Game and Fish Commission to increase its work program by about 25 percent and will generally benefit Texans interested in better fishing.

The new law states, in effect, that it shall be unlawful for any person to fish in any waters of this state without first obtaining a fishing license, according to Ed Cooper, wildlife conservation specialist.

The exceptions to this law, says Cooper, are persons under 17 and over 65 years of age; any person, or member of such persons immediately family when fishing upon property he owns or upon which he resides; and persons fishing with trolling, throw line, or ordinary pole or line having no reel or other winding device when fishing in the county of his residence. No other fishing license shall be required of a person who holds a commercial license issued in this state, adds the specialist.

The new law differs from the old one in ways besides fee charge, points out Cooper. Unlike the old law, the new one is not concerned with the type of bait to be used. Another difference is that the license fee is the same for Texans and out-of-state residents. The new law which requires salt water anglers to be licensed and charges a lower fee to non-residents, paving the way for a reciprocal licensing program with some of our neighboring state, concludes Cooper.

At Annual County-Wide Barbecue Aug. 23

Tex. Farm Bureau Chief East'd Picnic Speaker

Eastland County members of the Texas Farm Bureau were not to be satisfied with any sort of a second-rate speaker for their Annual County-Wide Barbecue and Picnic to be held at City Park in Eastland on Friday night, August 23, so they reached out and got the top banana, J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

This announcement was made this week by program chairman, Mrs. Bill Tucker.

Hammond has been head of the Farm Bureau in Texas for many years and is perhaps one of the best informed men in the nation on problems confronting the farmer. He is expected to discuss many of these problems and what farmers are going to have to do if they are to be solved or improved at any time in the future.

It is known that Farm Bureau members all over the nation are unhappy with the present way the government is handling farm problems and Hammond may touch some of the policies that are hurting the farmer most in these days of high consumer prices and low farm prices.

It has been pointed out by Farm Bureau officials repeatedly that while housewives pay more and more for farm products at the food stores, farmers continue to get less and less for them, and farmers are wondering who's getting the take-off.

Tickets to the barbecue are on sale and may be obtained from any Farm Bureau Director or any Farm Bureau Member, it is said. Adult price is \$1.00 per plate and children under 12 years of age, 55¢ per plate. Children under six years are free. It is also pointed out that tickets may be secured at the picnic grounds for all those unable to obtain one before hand.

The program chairman has announced that a full program is being arranged in addition to the featured speaker. Local talent numbers by local people are being lined up, and Mrs. Tucker says the show will be worth driving miles to see.

Each Farm Bureau Member is urged to attend the picnic and bring his entire family, and also urge his neighbors to come. There are plenty of tables and shade in the Eastland City Park high on top of the hill in the western part of town and can be easily spotted by the big water towers in the park.

Plans for the Country Farm Bureau Queen Contest are nearing completion according to publicity chairman, Mrs. Bill Tucker of Gorman.

The contest will be held at the American Legion Hall in Eastland on Friday night, August 16 at 7:30 P.M.

Response Is Great To Decorate Main St.

Continuing to evidence the spirit of cooperation needed to make a success of Ranger's proposed shopping program for Fall, Ranger merchants are taking full advantage of the opportunity to decorate display windows in the vacant buildings on Main Street, and Rip Galloway, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, said the way things are going now there is going to be a bigger demand for windows than there are windows.

Preference for display space in the windows is to be given to merchants whose places of business are not on Main Street.

It is hoped that the windows can all be decorated and filled with merchandise by the time the first of the Fall Bargain Days comes around on September 6-7. The windows can all be changed over to holiday merchandise later. Holiday windows are supposed to be in all over town not later than Thanksgiving night, at which time the Christmas lights will be turned on.

Galloway has already secured permission to use the windows in most of the stores, with only the out-of-town owners to be heard from. Letters have gone out to them and favorable replies are expected back by at least the end of this week. All of these out-of-town owners granted permission to use the windows last year, it is said.

Decorating the windows not only adds tremendously to the appearance of Main Street, but it gives a big lift to the merchants because many a "window shopper" passes up and down Main Street within a week's time, especially when all the windows are full because the newly decorated showcases are quite a novelty and everybody makes it a point to see them.

Dr. W. P. Watkins, head of the Trade Extension Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, along with other committee members, have warned that the first Bargain Days are only two Saturdays away from this coming Saturday. They have asked that the committee which was appointed to explain Bargain Days to all merchants present at the original meeting to complete its work at the earliest possible date so that the entire town can participate in some way in the first event.

"Bargain Days" have been set for the first Friday and Saturday in each month from September through December, and the success of all the rest of them will depend entirely upon the success of the first one, they point out. "If the first one is a flop the other three will be flops also," one committee member pointed out. "But if they get something worth while at the first event, they'll be back for all the rest of them."

Several hundred extra copies of the Ranger Times will be printed for each of the Bargain Days and delivered to all of the trade territory around Ranger.

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IT'S THE LAW
in Texas

STATE MAY WIN PROPERTY WHEN WILL IS LACKING

Made your will? If not, the State of Texas may wind up as owner of your estate upon your death. Under our statutes, the estates of persons having no heirs who die intestate revert, or "escheat", to the State.

Such provisions have been carried over from the English common law. There, under such circumstances, the estate escheated to the British crown. The theory of the process is that the sovereign

(or State), having been the original owner of all lands before they were parceled out to individuals, is entitled to a return of such lands when the possibilities of legal inheritance have been exhausted. This idea has been expanded to include personal property as well as real estate. It also applies in the case of a person absent for a term of seven years and not known to exist who leaves no heirs and no will.

Presumably, there is hardly a person who does not have some individual or charity that he would prefer to have his estate, rather than have it go to the State by default, so to speak. Yet, surprisingly, estates worth many thousands of dollars do escheat to the various states from time to time.

Now, before you shrug the matter off with the idea that these statutory provisions could not possibly apply to you, better think a minute. Suppose you and your spouse have no heirs besides each other and your children. Many

people do fall into this category. In event of a catastrophe resulting in death for you and your entire immediate family, no legal heirs would remain. Therefore if you had no will, your property would go to the State. In preparing a will, it is possible to provide for such an eventuality.

In this hypothetical case, you would probably want to designate some friend as executor, to take care of all necessary arrangements and then distribute the estate according to your wishes.

On the other hand, if you have plenty of possible heirs, a will could be used to designate which of them shall participate in the division of the estate. And even if you wish your property to be distributed entirely in accordance with our statutes of descent and distribution as explained in previous columns, a will can perform useful functions. Among other uses, a will could provide for an orderly and economical partition of your property, preventing any waste of the assets by heirs impatient for a settlement.

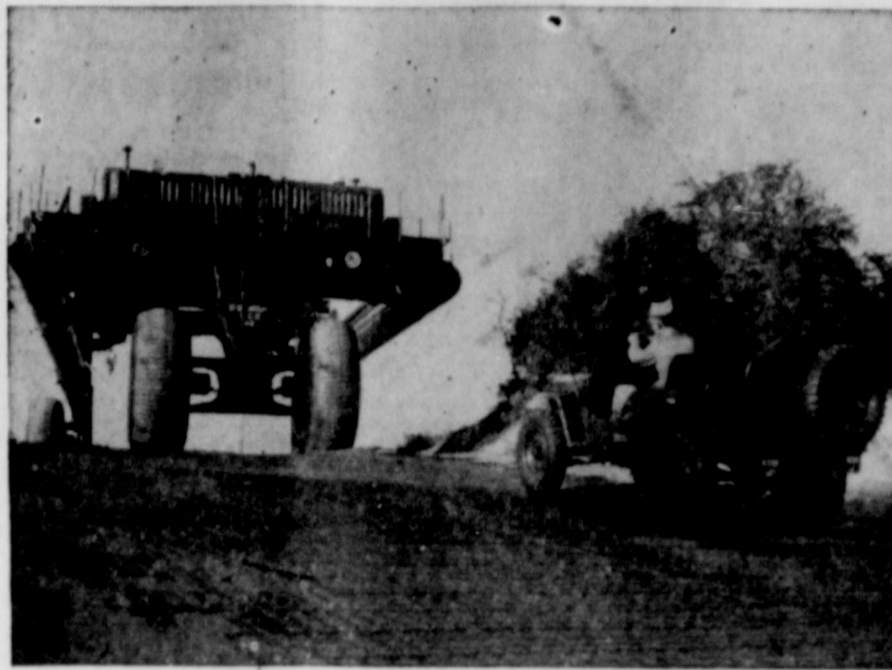
What happens to property which escheats to the State? Following certain required legal formalities and court proceedings, all escheated lands are set apart to the Permanent Free School Fund of the State, and may be leased and sold by the Land Commissioner under certain regulations. Escheated personal property is sold by the local sheriff under a court writ and the money received therefrom paid into the State Treasury.

The town of Spanish Fort in Montague County was established on Village Creek, now ailed up but then a pretty stream. Just across Red River was, of course, Indian Territory, which was infested by numerous outlaws, who frequently came to Spanish Fort. Three outlaws were lynched not far from the town but in Indian Territory.

Spanish Fort itself witnessed many exciting events. A woman whose husband had been killed

moved from the farm into town. Three men were suspected of having killed the farmer. Perhaps the slayers thought that the widow might know too much. One night, her house was fired into; she ran out and was killed. The outrage led to the immediate forming of a posse and three men were tracked into a thicket. The thicket was surrounded, then two brave men—George Howard and Duke Price—crawled into the underbrush, got the drop on the trio and took them prisoner. They were tried; two were hanged and the other received a long prison term.

One of the busiest spots in Spanish Fort was the Cowboy Saloon. On Christmas Eve, about 1882, cowboys shot the front out of the saloon. Hundreds of shells were picked up next morning.

Almost in front of the Cowboy Saloon, a pitched battle took place. Six men (three on each side) met face to face and bullets began flying. When the shooting ended, one group had been wiped out.

But life had its lighter side, too. Broke and thirsty, one cowboy said to another, "Tell you what we'll do. I'll go in the saloon and, after while, you come in and I'll offer to bet the bartender you're wearing socks and, if he won't take me up, then I'll offer to bet that you're not wearing socks."

The other said, "You could lose." "No," said his buddy, "take off your left sock right now. Then if he bets you're wearing socks, take off your left boot and you'll be barefooted. If he bets the other way, take off your right boot and there the sock will be."

And their little plan worked. A gambler in Spanish Fort was telling about a train being held up and he concluded, "It was a good thing I didn't have my six-shooter." Someone asked, "What would-a happened if you had had your gun?" The gambler replied,

"I'd have bet that you were wearing socks."

Mr. Dennis was stricken with cancer last September and never recovered. He was engaged in the ranching and cattle business. He was an active member in the Baptist Church until his last illness.

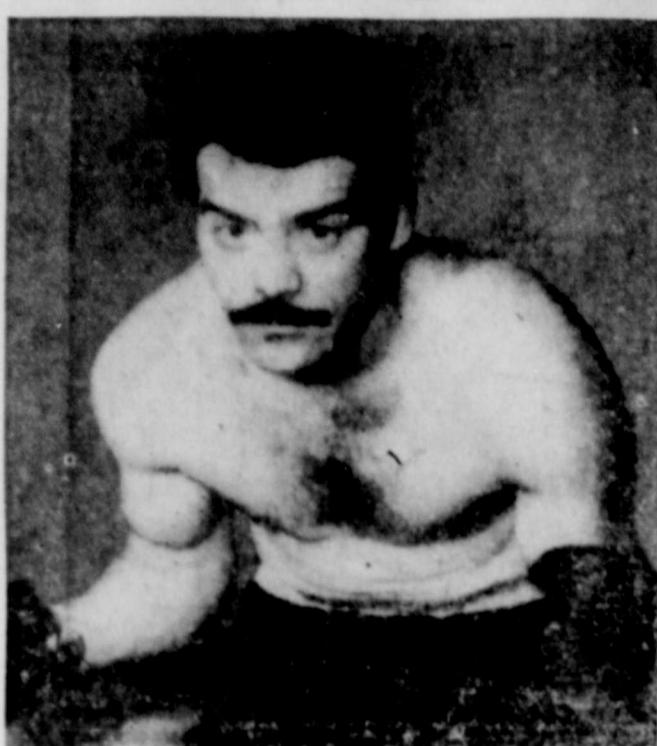
Survivors include his wife, one son, three daughters, two brothers, six sisters and one grandson.

Reports Say Applications for Hunting Antelope Now Ready

AUSTIN, August—Applications for antelope hunt permits in two Texas areas in October. All applications must be in the office of the Texas Game and Fish Commission by August 31, according to the Chief Clerk.

The first hunt will be in the Trans-Pecos area, where either buck or doe may be killed under the permit. This hunt will be divided into two periods, October 1-3, both days inclusive, and October 5-7, both days inclusive.

In the Texas Panhandle the hunts will be October 14-16 inclusive and October 17-19 inclusive. These hunts will be for buck only.

Persons wanting to hunt in either area should write to the Game and Fish Commission in Austin for application blank at once. All applications must be received in Austin by midnight, August 31. A \$5 fee must accompany each application and no permits can be issued except where indication has been made on the official blank.

Drawing for places on the hunts will be held as soon after September 1, as possible, according to the Chief Clerk.

In preparation for the drawing, which will be held if there are more applications than permits, first priority will be given to persons who hold permits last year and relinquished them prior to the hunt so they could be reassigned.

In addition to having an antelope permit the hunter also must have a valid hunting license and meet other requirements of a legal hunter.

The Texas Game and Fish Commission will designate the ranch on which permit holders may hunt. All antelope hunting shall be under direction and supervision of a representative of the Game and Fish Commission.

Shooting of game other than antelope will not be permitted on the same range. Antelope may be stalked but not chased by automobile.

In the Trans-Pecos area hunts will be permitted in Brewster, Jeff Davis, Pecos, Presidio, Culberson and Hudspeth counties on

designated ranches. Land-owners have agreed to charge a fee of not more than \$60 for the privilege of hunting a buck or \$40 for hunting a doe.

In the Panhandle area, October 14-16, the hunting area will be in Hartley County, north of U.S. 84, from the New Mexico state line to Punta de Agua Creek, thence north of the creek to its crossing of the FM road 767, thence north of 767 east to highway 51. On October 17-19 hunting will be permitted in Hartley and Oldham counties between a designated line and the Canadian River. The Panhandle fee is not expected to exceed \$25.00.

The two girls were kept overnight, robbed of their clothing, and turned loose with only one garment each to protect them from the night's chilling frost or the north's keen blast.
