The memory of hurricane Audrey and how it wiped the little town of Cameron, Louisiana, off the map, killing almost 500 people and leaving millions and millions of dollars in dam age in its wake, is still fresh in the minds of all of us.

Many people have said, inclue ing those in authority, that the cause of the tragedy at Camero was the failure of the hurrican warning system to give the people ample notice to flee from its path All who read newspapers or listen to radios know that the hurricane was predicted for late one afternoon when it actually hit the night before, some 18 hours sooner than the people had been led to expect.

Even though the weather bureau denied it had put out inaccurate information, it could not get around the facts because the printed record was right there in all the newspapers for everybody to read-recorded right there in the files of all the newspapers of the nation for all time to come—the hurricane had beenpredicted for the after-noon following the night it actually hit.

The weather bureau finally fe back on the time worn excuse of lack of personnel, lack of equip ment and lack of money.

In the face of this tragedy, which is only one of many bundreds of other hurricane tragedies that have hit this country, the Congress of the United States, or somebody in the Bureau of the Budget, has cut the appropriation for the Hurricane Warning System for this year down to a measley \$100,000.




