Eastland County History Review

Activity During War

(Editor's Note: This is the eighth in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1944.)

In War Times In 1861 news did not travel fast in Eastland County, for it lay on the very border land of civilization, with its three or four settlements.

Recruiting agents went where some degree of success might be had. Their patriotic efforts, and it was not until 1864 that men in this section were called upon to take up arms.

It was not from a desire on the part of the Government to make every man feel the burden of war that the frontiersman was impressed, or even that he might take part in the civil strife caused by the black man, but he was called upon to repel systematically the invasion of the red man. Prior to 1868, Eastland, Shackelford and Callahan Counties were under the jurisdiction of Comanche County. After this date Eastland was attached to Palo Pinto.

At every meeting of the Legislature laws were passed for the protection of the frontier. They were adhered to as closely as the conditions and times would permit, and that was all the law required. About the first of February, 1864, Eastland was organized under the Conscrip Law for military purposes.

Forty men were required to form a company, and at that time I took every man between the ages of 18 and 45 in the counties of Eastland, Shackelford and Callahan to muster the required number.

Think of the rich fields of corn and cotton and grain that thrive in our County today; of the handsome and substantial houses that dot its surface; of the many beautiful churches, school houses, public buildings, and of the whirring machinery; of the 18 to 20 towns with their 300 to 3000 inhabitants; then, in imagination, wipe out all these farms and houses and towns; fill the primeval forests and prairies, without a vestige of a shack of any kind, with the snarling, hungry animals, and the fiendish, treacherous Indians, and you have a picture of the territory traversed by those early guardians of our country.

Flannagan's Ranch, McGough Springs and Jewell marked the western limit of the white man's tread in Eastland in 1864.

Shirley, C. McGough, Joe Henshaw, Gabriel Keith, J. M. Keith, G. B. Ely, Sam Gilbert, James Gilbert, Jasper Gilbert, Taylor Gilbert, Joseph Dudley, William Fisher, J. M. Keith and J. M. York.

As three of these lived in Comanche County—Joseph Dudley, William Fisher, and S. C. Shirley—there were, really only 28 men in Eastland. A few months after the organization of this company, however, all the available citizens of Callahan and Shackelford Counties were added to it, making the required 40, and First Lieutenant Gilbert was made Captain.

J. B. McGough, first lieutenant, and H. H. Kuykendall, second lieutenant.

The Company was divided into three squads, and each man was required to serve 10 days out of 30. The starting place was Nash's Spring, half way between McGough Springs and Jewell, and the incoming scout was always me by the outgoing squad, thus keeping a lookout committee continuously on duty.

Several days after Lee's surrender a detachment of Gilbert's Company arrived at Blair's Fort. There they received the sad news from Lewis Keith, who had just returned from Louisiana and the Company disbanded.

August 21, 1957 Dear Friend In the closing days of the session, one important fact is being overlooked. It is that Congress has succeeded in the economy drive—succeeded to the tune of at least \$5,500,000,000.

The President opened the year by presenting Congress with the largest peace-time budget in history—\$71,500,000,000. The country was staggered. Eyes turned toward Congress to see what would happen.

Part of the budget couldn't be touched. It consisted of good faith obligations of the United States—interest on the public debt; veterans' pensions; fixed charges. But the rest was examined carefully and thoroughly. Now, with all but three of the appropriation bills acted upon, it is apparent that the savings will amount to at least \$5,500,000,000—9 percent of the total outside of the fixed charges. The story can be told quickly and easily by a table:

This is only a partial list. But it represents the larger bills and the savings are substantial. Furthermore, they represent savings without a reduction of needed services. For example, even while reducing the figures for the Labor-HEW bill, Congress increased the funds for research into killing and crippling diseases.

At the time this is written, we are still considering the appropriation for mutual security. The President originally asked for \$4,400,000,000. The people protested.

President Eisenhower agreed to withdraw \$500,000,000 of the request. Congress doubled the savings and the authorization figure now stands at about \$3,900,000,000. Further savings lie in order and will be made.

The House has voted a Mutual Security appropriation of \$2,524,760,000. That is \$1,875,240,000 below the original budget request. The Senate must still consider the appropriation, but it is clear that the final result will be at least \$5,500,000,000 in savings and probably much more.

About two carloads of delegates from Ranger and Eastland will leave here Wednesday afternoon for Austin where they will meet early Thursday morning with the State Highway Commission to discuss the possibility of designating a Farm - Market Road the short strip of roadway running from Lone Cedar Crossing to Lake Leon Dam.

By making the strip a part of the Farm - Market system, the state could hard-surface it and keep it up.

The Ranger - Eastland delegation will sail right in Austin as their appointment with the Commission is at 9:30 Thursday morning. Dr. Jim Whittington of Eastland will be spokesman for the group.

American Legion Convention to be Held In Eastland

Dates for the 18th District American Legion convention to be held in Eastland were announced this week by District Commander Troy S. Bower of Roscoe. The convention is to be staged Sept. 21-22.

The district comprises the same territory that the 17th Congressional District does and hundreds of Legionnaires are expected to be on hand for the convention. Commander Bower said the purpose of the convention is to plan a membership drive.

County commissioners mandated to keep the courthouse basement open on Saturday afternoon so that citizens will have the use of restrooms and lounges in the building.

The Court voted to do so after a suggestion from Commissioner S. L. (Bob) Carter. Tentative plans call for giving our custodian a half day off during the week so that he can work Saturday afternoons.

2-Hour Sessions Twice Daily

39 Bulldogs Start Fall Work-Outs Monday

Thirty-nine Bulldogs, considered a rather light squad as compared to other Ranger High School football squads in years past, reported Monday morning at 8 o'clock for the first workouts of the season, and for a campaign that will take them through ten games, six of them away from home, with the final contest being played Nov. 15 at Bulldog Stadium against Winters.

If the ordinary man-on-the-street thinks it hot, he ought to try it for a couple of hours in a football uniform on a dead run in so shade.

Conches Harold Barrett and Dennon Daves are beginning each session of their training programs with calisthenics, and fifteen minutes of that is considered a hard day's work.

Following the cal session, the squad is divided up for punting and passing drills and this calls for more running and more exercise and more sweating off of excess "lard" that accumulated during the summer holidays.

Punting and passing is followed by group drills and the running of plays during which time old plays are studied, new ones contemplated and fundamentals taught.

The whole drill session is climaxed with about 30 minutes of scrimmage, after which the boys taper off with sprinting exercises.

Drill sessions are being held twice daily, at 8 a. m., and 5 p. m., and last from 2 to 2 1/2 hours each. Coach Barrett said with the weather being as hot as it is, it would not be good to have sessions lasting any longer than that at this time, although they may be lengthened as the weather begins to cool off later on.

The Bulldogs have only this week and next to get ready for their first game with Merkel which is to be played here on Friday night, Sept. 6. But they are not in any worse shape than any of the rest of the clubs as far as practice goes, because none of them are supposed to have started before Monday of this week, and one team has as much practice as another when the first kickoff takes place.

Sign-Up Period For New Acreage Program Set

Aug. 20 through Oct. 4 has been designated as the sign up period for the wheat acreage reserve program for 1958. Emmett Powell, county office manager for the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office in Eastland, announced Saturday.

"In order to participate in the program it will first be necessary to establish a soil bank base for your farm," Powell said. "Your soil bank base is the number of acres of soil bank crops you have planted to harvest the past two years—1956 and 1957 divided by two to get the average for the two years."

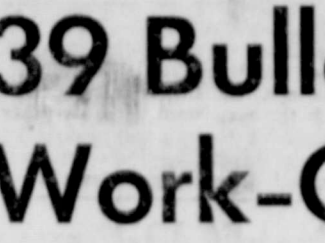
Powell explained that soil bank base crops in Eastland County are generally small grains, grain sorghums, wheat, peanuts and cotton. (Continued on Page Six)

JUDGE M. S. LONG named on state committee

Associate Justice Milburn S. Long of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, Eastland, has been appointed to the State Bar of Texas committee on administration of justice, President Virgil T. Sea Berry of Eastland, announced Saturday.

The committee, the Bar's largest with some 40 members, studies and reports on all questions in the field of jurisdiction and procedure in the courts in the advancement of the administration of justice and the science of jurisprudence.

Joseph A. Chandler of Steppeville, who represents lawyers of the 17th congressional district as the State Bar board of directors was appointed advisor to the committee coordinating bar activities with the Texas civil judicial council and of the rules committee. He will also serve as ex-officio member of the district grievance and grievance prosecuting committees.

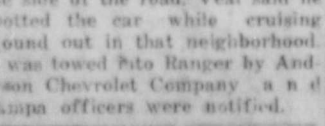

EASTLAND COUNTY HISTORY REVIEW

Indians Won Local Battle

(Editor's Note: This is the ninth in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

Ellison's Spring Fight
On the 8th of August, 1864, J. L. Head, corporal, led out eight men for a 10 days' scout, camping the first night at McGough Springs. On the morning of the 9th the men went west till they struck the Leon, near where the Texas Central Railway now crosses it. There they discovered a

large Indian trail leading southeast, the signs indicating there were at least 35 or 40 Indians, some riding some walking. The men, knowing they were down to steal horses, pushed hard on after them. The trail crossed Nash's Creek about three miles east of Carbon, where they killed a beef for breakfast, then continued south until they reached the present of the W. W. Boone place, one and one-half miles north of Jewell. It was then the Gilbert ranch.

Captain T. E. Keith, of Curtis, furnished the following description of the battles:
"There we overhauled them, seven of us—Harris York's horse having given out, he had pulled for the ranch. We fought them at long range for awhile, until we

Over \$4 Million In Back Wages Found Due

DALLAS—Back wages amounting to more than \$4 million were found due to workers in the five Southwestern states as a result of wage-hour investigations during the fiscal year ending June 30, it was reported here today.

Of this amount, \$2,931,538 already has been paid, according to Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage-Hour division here. Other cases are in litigation and some are held for "further handling."

Violations during the fiscal year just passed were found in 4,577 plants visited, he said. The payments were made to comply with the Fair Labor Standards Act (Federal Wage-Hour Law) which requires a minimum of \$1 an hour and at least time and a half for overtime after 40 hours a week for all non-exempt workers in interstate commerce or in the production of goods for interstate or foreign commerce.

In addition, there were 582 cases of violation of the child-labor provisions of the law, he said. A total of 2,958 employers paid the back wage bill of \$2,931,538 in the five-state Southwestern region consisting of Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas, and New Mexico. The number of workers receiving such back wages was not announced.

Mr. Rogers emphasized that most of the violations were unintentional and arose from a misunderstanding or misapplication of the law's exemptions.

Now available are ready-made skylights, complete with frame, flashing, and fasteners. They are down in cost, more efficient, and easier to install. These new skylights are made of various materials—plastic, glass-fiber, and insulating glass. Most are shatter- and water-resistant, some open and close for ventilation. A new type permits desirable winter sun to enter, but rejects the heat and glare of the summer sun.

With them you can plan on the customary shape of a square house and still get daylight into every room, even rooms on inside walls. By reducing outside wall area, you'll reduce the length of a house. Thus, you get lower building costs.

You can take advantage of the savings in a "service-core" plan where the kitchen, bath, and laundry are centralized for the efficient and economical layout of water connections, vents, and drains. Skylighted core rooms have mechanical ventilators that are more efficient than the usual small windows, the magazine says.

With this service-core plan it is possible to overcome the hindrance of having every room on outside walls, especially the bathroom and laundry; where outside exposure is not important, but privacy is. Exterior walls can be given over entirely to living, sleeping, and working space.

Skylighting makes rooms of wasted space, too. You can skylight a large inside closet or pantry for a half-bath when re-doing or adding to an old house. Or you may find space in some otherwise wasted nook that can be put to use. Skylights can also substitute for costly attic dormers, according to the article.

About the Comet

Ranger, Texas
Aug. 24, '57

The Ranger Times Dear Editor:

Comments concerning comets in reply to your Aug. 18 query about the comet that was observed in the north-western section of the sky just below the bowl of the Big Dipper. This comet was called Comet Mckos 1957-d. The letter indicating that it was the fourth comet of the year. It was discovered by a Czech astronomer Aug. 2 of this year and was plainly visible to the naked eye for several nights last week. This writer having had the privilege of seeing it three successive nights last week. The writer can also recall seeing Halley's Comet on its last visitation in May of 1910. Halley's Comet is probably the most famous of all comets. Halley's Comet has been studied and observed for over 2,000 years. It was named for Edmund Halley, (1656-1742) who computed its orbit by methods which had just been developed by his friend Newton. Halley predicted this comet's return in 1759, 1835, and 1910, and was right. Halley showed that it appeared in 1066, 1468, 1531 and 1607. Astronomers follow its travels on its orbit and by their calculations determine the characteristics of its motions and know that in obedience to the laws of gravitation it will return in 1985.

In 1456 a comet frightened everyone in Europe so much that Christian Churches added a prayer to be saved from "the Devil, the Turk, and the comet."

On the 1910 visitation of Halley's Comet, it first appeared low on the eastern horizon, and on clear nights was plainly visible all night. It gradually worked its way across the sky taking about three weeks to travel the dome, and finally disappeared in the west. In 1910 its tail was 93 million miles long, and was an awe inspiring sight comparing favorably with the Milky Way. Many people were probably just as much concerned and frightened as were the Europeans in 1456.

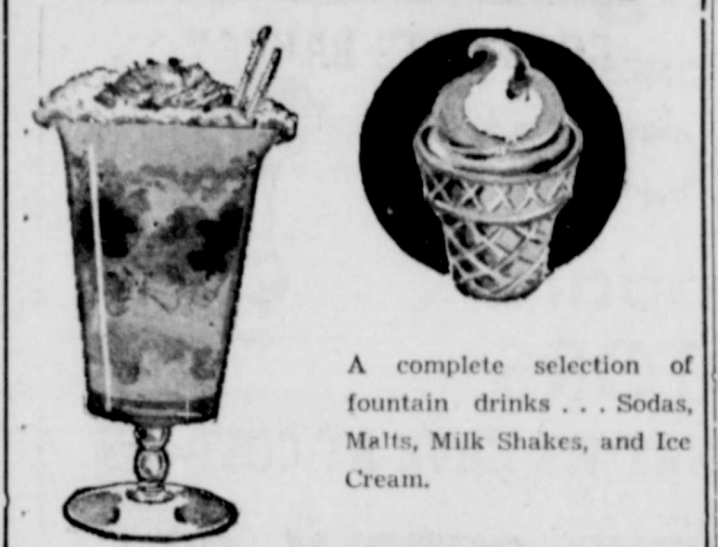

He said there is no limitation on the number of acres which may be placed in the reserve, except your allotment. There is a \$3000 limitation of payment to any one producer, however.

"The designated acreage reserve may be inspected before the agreement is approved, therefore, if your base can be established before the sign-up period begins it will save time for both you and the office staff during the rush of the actual sign-up period," Fowell explained. "Establishing a soil bank base does not obligate you to participate in the Acreage Reserve program, but it is the first step if you do participate in the 1958 Wheat Acreage Reserve," he added.

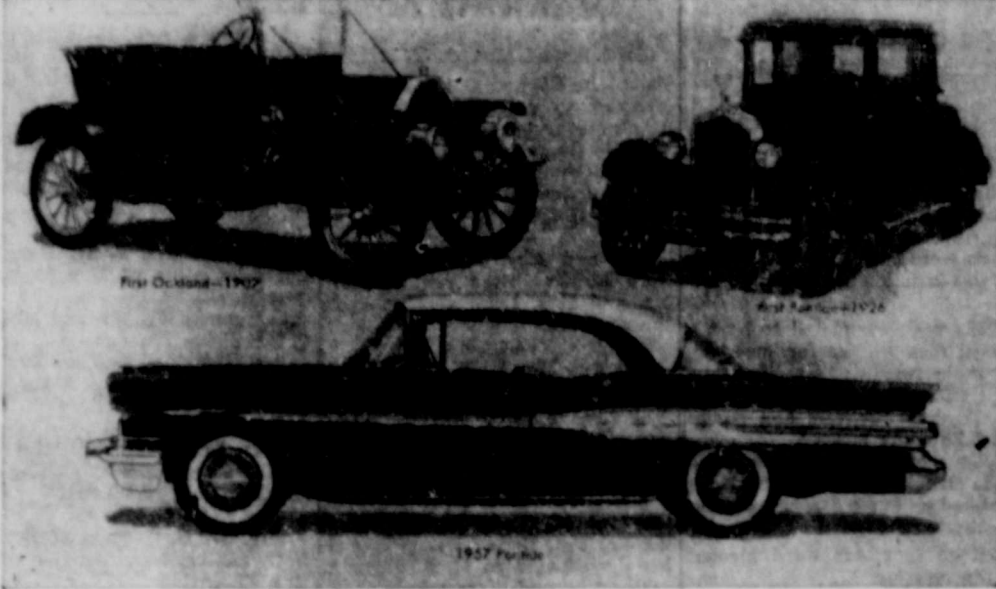
