Milo Crop Expected To Reach 2 1/2 Million Bushels In County

Reports from Castro county's eight elevators Monday revealed that 2,267,906 bushels of milo have been marketed from this year's crop, according to tabulation by Edd C. McLeroy, Castro County Agricultural Agent.

Some of the elevators reported that there would be crop remnants of milo marketed as a few farmers were still deheading bundles that are still in the fields.

A two and a half million bushel crop is expected in the county when deheading is completed and when milo stored on the farms is marketed.

Members of the Baptist Women's Missionary Society will meet in circle meetings Monday at 3:00 p. m. for a Mission program.

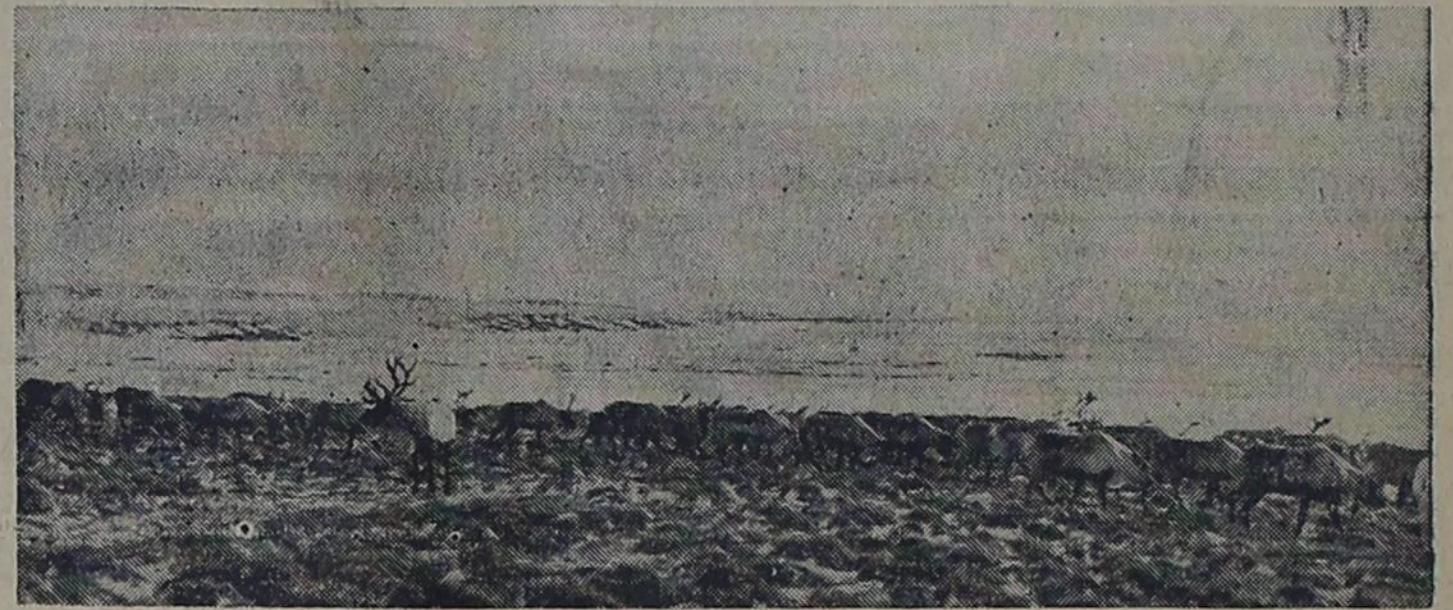

Here Grady Carothers, Texas rancher, has gone to round up reindeer every fall for the past five years, with the help of the Eskimos. He flies the deer back to his Texas ranch. Although the animals roam wild over the snowlands, they are gentled at Carothers' ranch, and eager for sleigh harness when Christmas parade time rolls around.

SANTA IS COMING TO DIMMITT WITH REINDEER AND SLEIGH ON DECEMBER 9

It is true, despite the doubts of the most flighty of children's imaginations, that reindeer fly down south from the North Pole once a year, with qualifications, of course. They fly down in C-46s chartered for the purpose by an enterprising Texan, and they don't actually come from the North Pole—but not far from it. Grady Carothers flies the animals here from north Alaska along the frozen coast of the Arctic Ocean.

And come Christmas season they prance along a 10-state itinerary to prove their noble purpose in life—that of drawing Santa Claus' sleigh. The reindeer will be here on Tuesday, December 9, at 4:00 p. m.

Although Carothers says the animals thrive on Texas weather, they are treated like aristocrats on the ranch. The 18-head herd lives in an air-conditioned barn, and Carothers is planning to build another to take care of the increasing herd.

They are let out to pasture at night, when it's comparatively cool. Texas is hotter for them than it is for us because they are built to withstand temperatures

of five to fifty degrees below zero—and in blizzards downwards of 75 below.

Their skin is thick and tough and their hair is hollow to give added insulation. But when you see a deer parting with his tongue hanging out you needn't feel sorry for the poor creature. A reindeer breathes like a dog, panting and all, and it is normal to him even in colder weather than Texans have ever seen.

The reindeer's diet staple in Alaska is reindeer moss, about the only thing that grows on his native pasture. But since it is too expensive to cart moss down to Texas all year, Carothers has weaned them onto an oatmeal diet, which they apparently enjoy equally well.

The reindeer moss is kept for medicine, although Carothers has found that penicillin will snap them out of pneumonia as quickly as it will a human.

Every fall Carothers treks up to Alaska, where Eskimos help him walk down the animals he wants. The reindeer are kept in 20 herds, all but two owned by Eskimos, and all pastured in barren tundras miles away from a village. The territorial government, which strictly regulates reindeer exports, owns the others, with which it help stock the Eskimo herds.

Health Officer Asks For Increased Operating Funds

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox intends to put a copy of a resolution urging increased operating funds and better working facilities for the State Health Department in the hands of "all interested persons".

The resolution, calling for legislative appropriation of 62 cents per capita for public health, was passed September 22 by the State Board of Health. Current appropriations amount to 20 cents per capita.

Based on a population of 7,750,000, 62 cents per capita would yield \$4,805,000 in operating funds for the money-short department, the resolution points out, providing "sufficient money to hold together the present development and an opportunity for conserva-

tive expansion."

Part of the expansion, according to Dr. Cox, would be a research laboratory.

"The way things are now, we either neglect research work, or ask our friends in other states to conduct work for us, and that is limited", the health officer said.

He said he was "only trying to build for the state a program that will give people the best and the most in public health."

Present laboratory facilities are housed in a twenty-five year old brick building on East Fifth St., adjacent to the million dollar State Health Department building which was built in 1943.

Shelter for experimental animals occupy a large portion of laboratory space. Operating space for several divisions of laboratory activity are crowded together.

The State Board of Health described identification, prevention, and economic control of disease as the "greatest essential need at the present time."

To meet the need, the Board

made available \$400,000 of federal hospital survey and construction funds which the Board administrators, with the understanding the Legislature would contribute an equal amount toward a new laboratory research building.

"It is the considered judgment of the State Board of Health," the resolution reads, "that to request of the Legislature an appropriation of funds in the amount

of \$4,805,000 is without question amply justified."

in Texas

DO YOU KNOW the effect of the Workmen's Compensation Act upon the rights of employees injured in the course of their employment?

One of the leading cases decided by the Supreme Court on this question sets out an excellent discussion of this matter. The Supreme Court in discussing the Workmen's Compensation Act as it affects the rights of employees injured in the course of their employment states, "Its theory, as it concerns them (employees), is that the plan of compensation it provides for their injuries suffered in the course of their employment is more advantageous than a suit for damages. In the latter, the employee is compelled to assume the burden of establishing that his injury was caused by the employer's negligence or the negligence of a servant for which the employer is responsible. His suit fails if it is subject to any of the common law defenses, that is if his own negligence was the proximate cause of the injury, or if the injury was due to a risk he assumed, or the negligence of a fellow servant. By the act a fixed compensation is payable to him upon the mere happening of any injury in the course of the employment, or to his beneficiaries in the event of his death from the injury, without reference to any negligence on the part of the employer or his servants, and without regard to defenses available to the employer at common law."

The law required, that the injured employee should give notice of his injury in duplicate copies, one to be sent to the Industrial Accident Board, and one to his employer, or his employer's Insurance Carrier, within thirty days after the accident in which his injuries arose. Every employee who is injured in the course of his employment, and expects to receive compensation for this injury, should see that a notice of injury is prepared on the proper forms, and forwarded to the Industrial Accident Board and his Employer or his Employer's Insurance Carrier, within the required thirty days. The employee must also file a claim for compensation within six months after the date of the injury on the proper forms.

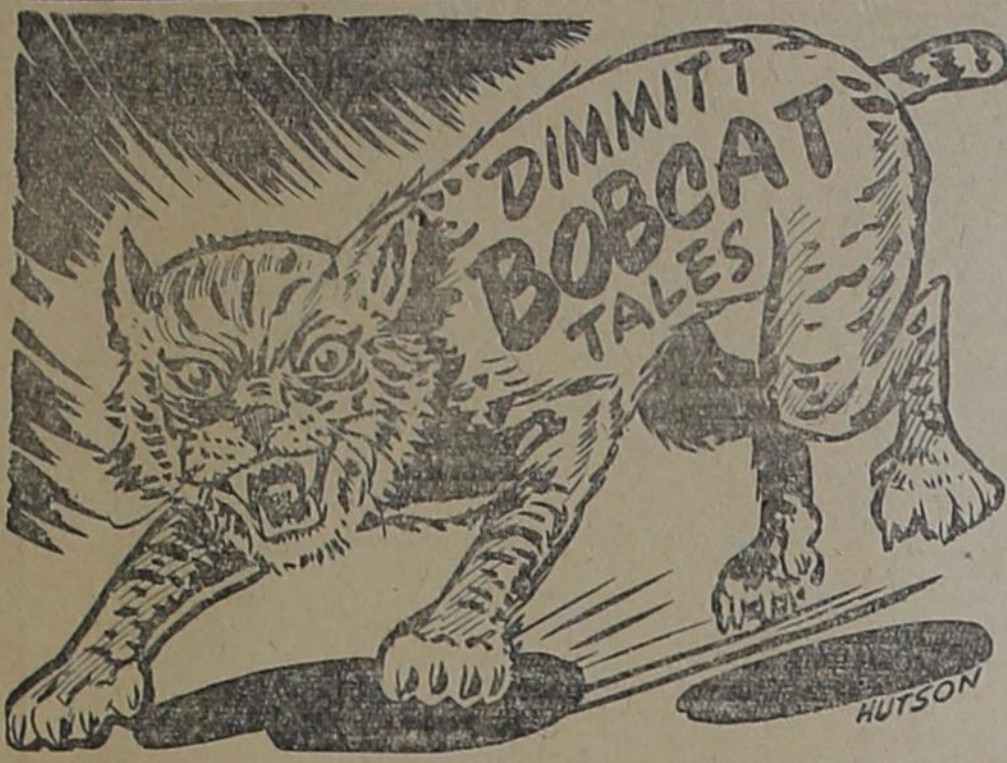
