If there were any doubts remaining in the minds of any Ranger citizen about the genuine desire and honest efforts of the City Commission to do the right thing about solving the financial dilemma of the City, those doubts should be dispelled by the Commissioners' action in abolishing their own pay for the rest of their tenure of office in an effort to save money.

The City Charter stipulates that Commissioners shall be paid \$110 for each meeting, which means that they would get \$440 a month when there are four meetings and \$50 a month when there are five meetings. This isn't a world-shaking amount of money but it is their's, and they earn every penny of it, and they are giving up each month more money than most people pay in taxes all year.

We imagine that members of the City Commission are just like the rest of us in Ranger—when quitting time comes they had much rather be out with their own families somewhere, or watching their own favorite television programs, than to be down at City Hall wrestling with the City's tax rolls, or burning midnight oil trying to find ways and means of keeping the City in business, but the citizens of Ranger handed to them the responsibility of bringing order out of chaos and they are making progress on an almost hopeless situation.

We will venture to say that when the present administration goes out of office the City will be in a clean financial condition and at least have its head high enough out of the water that every body in town will be much happier with the way things are going.

The citizens of Ranger owe the present City Commissioners a standing vote of thanks for what they are trying to do, and the hard work they're putting in on a thankless, unpopular task.

A lot of people from Ranger need to saddle up Friday night and go over to Mineral Wells and watch the Bulldogs take on the Mountaineers. It is sure to be a good ball game, and after seeing how the lads in Maroon and White handled Class A Merkel, and watching them play Class AAA Mineral Wells, it ought to be a fairly easy job to determine just what kind of a ball club the Bulldogs really have.

But here's a warning if you get a chance to watch the game. They'll be out in force and you'll get a ticket as sure as you violate the speed limit.

Last time Ranger went to Mineral Wells one of the lads traveling down Highway 80 was handed a speeding ticket. He decided to dodge the patrol boys on the road. (Continued On Page Eight)

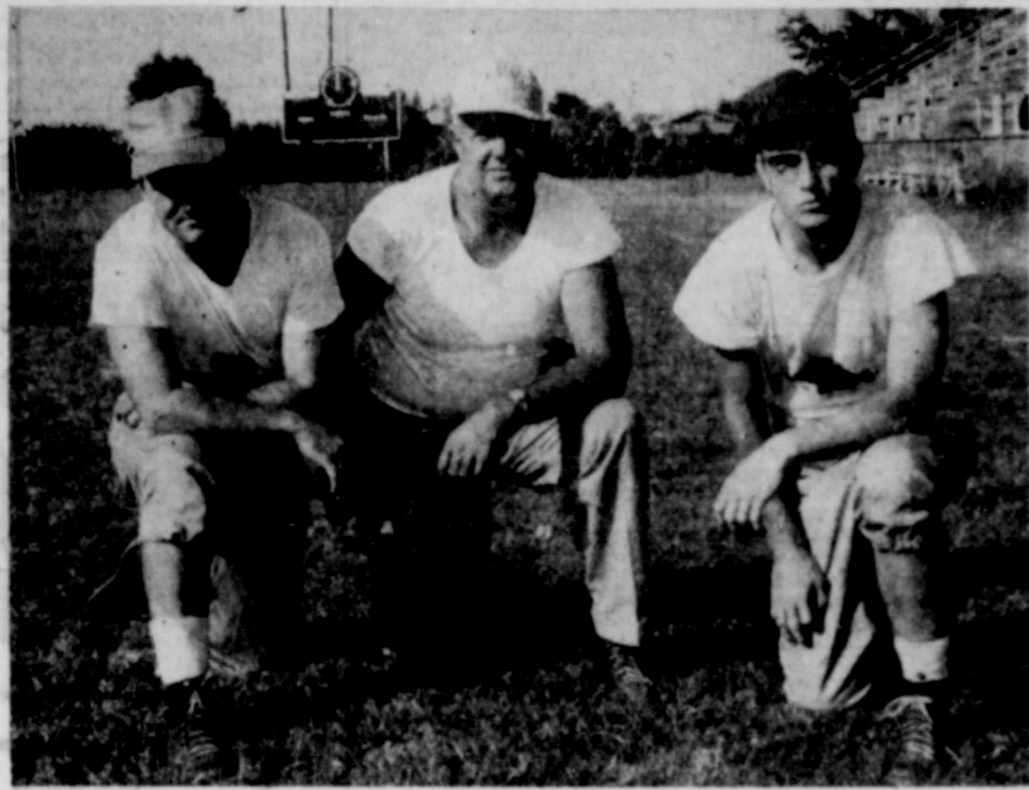
Asian Flu May Hit 1 In 5...

College Pep Rally to Kick Off Rangers Opener With Paris

An All-College pep rally to be held in front of the Gholson Hotel at 7:30 Friday evening will kick off the Ranger College Rangers opening game of the season with Paris Junior College to be played over there Saturday night.

For the first time in a long time Ranger College coaches are showing signs of enthusiasm about their football prospects, but they don't know about the game Saturday night because Paris is rated among the top ten of all Junior Colleges football-wise.

Coches Tom Heiland and Roy Barrett will leave Ranger early Saturday morning with 33 players, including 17 linemen and 13 backs. All of them will be sporting brand new uniforms this year, the suits being purple with huge white numerals.

After two weeks of workouts, both coaches feel they have been most fortunate with the small number of injuries, although there have been several that have hurt pretty bad. Leon Walker, a half-back from Holliday, is out for several days with a knee injury and cut lip. This lad is a speed merchant who made All-District, All-Area and All-State last year while his team was rolling to a District Championship.

Ranger's Jerry (Red Dog) Cantrell, end, is out of action for at least three weeks with a parted collar bone. The coaches say he will be missed a lot because they had been depending on him very much at one of the end positions.

Carl Sims, a 217-pound tackle from McGregor, has been on the injury list with a bad ankle, but Coach Barrett said he would be ready to go Saturday night.

Lewis Covens from Rusk, a scouter halfback, has a cut upper lip but he hasn't missed any workouts and coach Heiland said he would be ready to go Saturday night.

Both coaches feel the team is in good shape and ready to play ball because their morale is high and they are in splendid physical condition.

SURPLUS FOOD APPLICATIONS READY AT CHAMBER COMMERCE

R. V. Galloway, manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, said today that all people eligible to draw surplus food twice a month under the new program being put into effect in Eastland County, should come by his office now and get application blanks which must be filled out and sent in to county headquarters.

Persons making less than \$60 monthly are eligible. Two or three people making less than \$120 are eligible. Four or five making less than \$140 are eligible. All pensioners, blind, and dependent children are eligible. Accepting foods does not effect any one's pension.

Butter, cheese, nonfat dry milk, lard, shortening, dry beans, rice, cornmeal, flour and other surplus foods will be available twice monthly beginning soon.

EASTLAND COUNTY HISTORY REVIEW

More Pioneers Mentioned

(Editor's Note: This is the 16th in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

Five Generations

The accompanying illustration represents five generations. Captain J. J. Keith, born in Alabama in 1822, and Miss Isabel Ely, born in Virginia in 1822, were married in Arkansas, March 8, 1839, and emigrated to Titus County, Texas, in 1844, thus becoming citizens of the Republic of Texas.

While here, on December 10, 1846, their oldest son, T. E., was born. In 1860, while living in Frath County, this family with the O'Neals and others, fortified themselves at Dublin (thus founding that prosperous town) and remained there until April, 1862. They finally located at Mansker Lake, where Mr. Keith engaged in stock-raising. Here their daughter Ellen, Mrs. Deerection of Sabano, who was the first girl baby born in the county. While residing in Frath Mr. Keith raised a company of pioneers and was made their Captain.

This remarkable couple have lived for the last forty years in Frath with their daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth

Cisco Police Lured Away From Robbery

Eastland County Sheriff's office and Cisco city police today were still investigating a wave of burglaries which took place in Cisco early Tuesday morning while Cisco police were out of the downtown area on a false burglary alarm.

More than \$5000 in cash and jewelry was taken as daring burglars hit four business houses in Cisco. Hardest hit was Leverage Jewelry, where about \$5000 in diamonds, diamond rings and watches were stolen.

Sheriff J. B. Williams said the burglars entered through the front door of all of the places. Besides the jewelry store Paul's Recreation Hall, Thompson's Garage and Gurney Motor Co. were entered. Burglars took \$100 in cash from a cigarette machine, \$10 from a cold drink box and \$5 from the cash register at the recreation hall, but nothing was missing from the other two business houses.

Sheriff Williams said Cisco police got a telephone call just before the actual burglaries took place, saying a place was being entered into on Avenue D, several blocks from the downtown section of Cisco. Officers converged on the area, and while they left the downtown area unguarded, the burglars entered the business houses, one of which is just around the corner from the police station.

Senator Lyndon Johnson has been described as one of the most persuasive men Washington has ever known. If you think the description exaggerated, here is an incident.

In 1948, Johnson was running for the Senate. It was the last day of the campaign. The race was close—(actually, the margin proved to be only 87 votes).

I was in the office of a San Antonio businessman who was very conservative. A friend of his had "extorted" a promise that he would meet Johnson at 4 o'clock in his hotel suit that afternoon.

"I'm not going to vote for him," my acquaintance said, "but I'm stuck—I'll have to go or Jack—(the man who had phoned)—will be sore."

Then he said, "If you will be in the hotel lobby, I'll see you right after the visit with Johnson. I won't take long. Then we can talk about that subject you want to write about." Afterward, he told me about the interview with Johnson.

"I never met a man who was more pleasant, more alert, more dynamic, more eloquent—and, as I listed, I found he was expressing my views to perfection. I promised to vote for him and to get my friends to do so."

I knew something had happened because when the man got out of the elevator, he had an expression as though he had been hypnotized. He looked right at me without the slightest sign of recognition and walked on out.

Two hours later, he telephoned to apologize and explain.

Since that time, I have never questioned any statement as to Senator Johnson's ability to gain friends and influence people.

Ring Lardner once wrote about another author, Irvin S. Cobb: "Mr. Cobb is never as happy as when he is among his books—of which he has a complete set."

Theodore Roosevelt once spoke with pity for "those cold and timid souls who have known neither victory nor defeat."

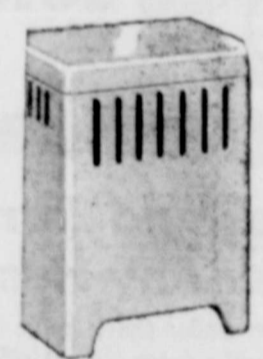

To be truthful about it, we hope the Highway Patrol is out on all roads. They are there for only one purpose, and that is to prevent people from getting hurt.

The question has been raised as to whether the President has the power to federalize the National Guard, as in the case with Arkansas, in order to call it away from that school building. The Dallas Morning News, in an editorial, doesn't think so. Quoting the United States Code, Title 32, Chapter 5, Section 511, which deals with the President's calling out the National Guard, the News states it can be done only in one, or all, of the following cases:

1. Invasion
2. Danger of Invasion
3. Rebellion
4. Lack of other forces to enforce the laws of the United States.

In the case of No. 1, there is certainly no invasion from Arkansas. In the case of No. 2 there

is no danger or threat of invasion. In the case of No. 3 Governor Faubus says there is no rebellion against the authority of the United States. As a matter of fact there is no law of the Union prescribing integration in the State of Arkansas or anywhere else. That is to say, Congress has never enacted such a statute.

The naked edict of the Supreme Court reversing what was the supreme law of the land until the Court discovered Gunnar Myrdal, leaves a big question open as to how permanent or certain is the Supreme Court's edict.

And as for No. 4, the President doesn't lack any other forces because he still has the Army and Navy and Marine Corps and Coast

Guard and the Air Corps. So if he doesn't federalize the National Guard in this case, don't put it down to goodness of his heart—he MAY not have a clear authority.

Ensiling methods have a lot of effect on the quality of the silage, says A. M. Meekins, extension dairy husbandman. The immediate exclusion of air is important in controlling heating and encouraging proper fermentation.
