Exotic Design In Gardenias



Perhaps one of the most difficult flowers for the layman, from Perhaps one of the most difficult flowers for the layman, from an arrangement point of view, is the gardenia, says Alyn Wayne, official stylist for the Florists' Telegraph Delivery Association. People usually float them in a shallow crystal bowl because they simply don't know what else to do with them. Ask your florist to demonstrate, then with a little practice, you will see how easy it is to run a wire through the base of the flower, leaving enough for a long stem and thou were with tane. Now that you have made a stem, you are free to arrange them in many graceful designs, adding a few decorative leaves to give shape, and cover the wires. Remember to keep your fingers away from the petals as much as possible—Alyn Wayne advises working on cotton—and that gardenias get their moisture through the petals, not through the stems, so spray them occasionally and keep them away from direct heat.
