What's cookin'?

With the integration question scheduled to pick up sharply in Texas between now and the first of the year, since Dallas has been ordered by a Federal Court to integrate its huge 106,000-pupil school system by Christmas, or else, we dug up that recently passed House Bill 65 and read it again.

House Bill 65 is the one that provides for local option elections in Texas to determine whether a school system will or will not integrate.

House Bill 65 is now as much a law in Texas as any law that exists in the state, the U. S. Supreme Court to the contrary notwithstanding.

It seems to us that before Dallas can move in any direction, even if it is willing to try to comply with the Supreme Court order, that it must first hold this election.

House Bill 65 specifically prohibits any board of trustees of any school authority from abolishing its dual school system (desegregating or integrating) prior to an election on the question. A prerequisite to such an election is a petition filed by at least 20 per cent of the qualified electors residing in the school district.

The election must be conducted in a manner similar to elections for trustees. It can be called on the same date as a school trustee election if the petition is filed within 90 days of the trustee election, otherwise the election must be called within 60 days after the petition is filed. Subsequent elections on the same question cannot be called again within two years of the last election.

The bill provides that if a school district should desegregate without first being authorized to do so by an election of the qualified voters residing therein, then the district becomes ineligible for accreditation and ineligible to receive any State School Support funds.

The same penalty is placed upon a school district already integrated which fails to re-segregate its schools after an election is held calling for such action. School authorities failing to comply with the law are subject to individual fines up to \$1000.

It has never been tested anywhere in the courts yet, but the minute it is the Federal Courts are going to declare it unconstitutional.

So, where does that leave everybody?

Eastland Wins Fight To Keep Courthouse

(Editor's Note: This is the 21st in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

Fight for County Seat

Keenly alive to the interest of town, a committee of citizens went to Waco and offered to the company projecting the Texas Central Railway line through the County the sum of \$25,000 to build through Eastland. This offer was not accepted and the junction the Texas Pacific was made at Cisco, 10 miles west of Eastland.

Cisco was a precocious youngster, and wanted to be the County Town. An election was held August 2, 1881, which resulted as follows: Eastland, 355; Cisco 324. The question settled, the Commissioners' Court let a contract for the building of courthouse at a cost of \$57,000. This three story building of native stone was put up in 1883-84. The original contract price made with Lance and McEashen, contractors, was \$34,928, but the commissioner's Court had to take charge of it when half completed.

The County, aided materially by citizens of the town, erected prior to this a stone jail on the public square at a cost of \$5,500. The jail was built by Messrs. Mar-

Homer Gay's 84-Year-Old Father Killed By Falling Tree In East Texas

John W. Gay, 84, father of Homer Gay of Ranger, was killed last week at his farm home near Jacksonville in East Texas supposedly by a falling tree, his son revealed here this morning.

It is said that Mr. Gay left his home last Tuesday morning for the purpose of cutting some wood, and when he did not return, one of his sons, Lewis Gay, and a grandson, Delmar Jock, went to look for him. He was found dead under a freshly cut tree. Justice of the Peace A. J. Brazill of Jacksonville, termed the death accidental.

Mr. Gay had been a life-time resident of that section of the country and the son of an early-day East Texas pioneer family. He was a Baptist and a Mason and had been named Worshipful Master of his lodge six different times.

Funeral services were held last Thursday with burial in Union Grove Cemetery with Masonic honors.

Rangers Lose Slug-Fest to Cameron Ags 32-0 In Deep Mud

In a game that neither side ever expected to play on a wet, muddy field, the Cameron Aggies of Lawton, Okla., opened the Pioneer Conference season by drubbing the Ranger College Rangers 32-0 at Bulldog Stadium Saturday night.

The big aggregation from Cameron, which boasts a student body no big as some of the smaller universities, proved to be too much for the Rangers as they unleashed a passing attack which, in spite of the mud, produced two touchdowns and set up a third.

Two Touchdown Passes

Aggie quarterback Jackie Martin got off one 29-yard heave to end Gil Gfell for a touchdown early in the second quarter, and another Martin pass to end Bob Roberts accounted for 44 yards and another six points later in the same quarter.

In the third quarter Halfback W. D. Bankston took off on a quick opener through the middle and sped 87 yards for the third Aggie touchdown and Martin kicked the extra point.

In the fourth quarter halfback Tommy Johnson ripped seven yards off right tackle for another touchdown. Later in the same period another pass, this time a 19-yarder from halfback Bob Davis to end Chuck Barnes, put the ball on the one-yard line and from there substitute quarterback Allen Grubb sneaked across for the score, with Bankston converting.

Rangemans Perform

The colorful Ranger College Rangemans put on their first performance of the year and in spite of the mud they managed to look like a million dollars and staged a smart and snappy drill that brought on the cheers.

A fairly large crowd of football fans were on hand at the beginning of the game, even though it was raining then, but a lot of them were forced to seek shelter at the half on account of the weather.

The Ranger's next game is with Navarro next Saturday night and will be played over there. Following comes games with Cisco on Oct. 5 and San Angelo on Oct. 12, both games to be played away from home. The next home game is with H-SU "B" Team on Oct. 18.

54,900 Hot Dogs To Feed Kids On Rural Youth Day

Dallas businessmen have invited more than 100,000 Texas farm boys and girls to a king-size picnic on Rural Youth Day at the opening of the 1957 State Fair of Texas, Saturday, Oct. 5.

The gathering of 4-H Club members, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers is the largest annual assemblage of its kind in the world.

The youngsters will begin converging on Dallas from all parts of the state long before daylight. They will come in every conceivable type of vehicle, from pickup trucks and school buses to private cars and mammoth mobile homes that have been converted into traveling classrooms by 4-H Clubs and Future Farmer Chapters.

The Fair will be ready for them. The mammoth feed at noon will require 54,900 hot dogs, 55,000 buns, 132 gallons of mustard, 67,500 cups, 80,000 napkins, 47,184 packages of potato chips, 620 gallons of orange syrup and more than 14 tons of ice.

The orange drink will be mixed in 140 50-gallon barrels by a company of firemen using fire hoses. For dessert, the youngsters will munch 42,600 candy bars.

Just about everyone will get into the act. Over 300 Boy Scouts will serve the oranges to the youngsters. And 112 ladies of the Owenwood Women's Society of Christian Service will serve the food.

Lone Star Gives New Recipes for Cooking Fish

Join the "National Fish Parade" by serving fish in any one or in several of the many ways it may be easily prepared. The summer's heavy production of fresh and frozen fishery products is in the markets ready for the cooking.
Delicate in flavor and texture, fish is high in nutritive values and is economical. Most fresh and frozen varieties come in fillets, slices cut lengthwise from the backbone, and in steaks, crosswise sections. These cuts need no further preparation before cooking. They are especially good for broiling, frying and baking.
Fish has little connective tissue—there is no such thing as tough fish, requiring long, slow cooking to tenderize. Cook it until it flakes easily with a fork. Further cooking makes it dry and chewy.
Because fish is tender and delicate with little connective tissue, it should be handled as little as possible. It needs no turning in broiling or baking and should be turned only once in frying.
Broiled fish is one of the easiest main dishes to prepare. For six servings use 2 pounds fish fillets or steaks. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and place on a cold lightly greased broiler pan, skin side up.
Brush with melted butter or margarine and broil 3 inches from full gas flame 10 to 15 minutes, depending on thickness, or until fish flakes easily with a fork. If desired, baste once during broiling with melted butter or margarine. It takes about 1-4 cup fat, mellow, for 2 pounds fish. For added flavor, add a tablespoon or two of lemon juice to the melted fat.
Fish Stick Burgers will offer something new in the burger family. Place frozen fish sticks in a single layer in a greased shallow baking pan, allowing two sticks for each burger. Bake in hot gas oven 400 degrees F. 15 to 20 minutes or until piping hot and crisp. While sticks are baking, place foil-wrapped hot dog rolls in the oven to heat. For each burger, place two fish sticks in a heated roll. Top with tartar sauce and serve at once. Potato chips on the side combine with the burgers for a new version of fish 'n' chips.
Tartar sauce is a must with fish for many people. Stir up a batch in a hurry by combining 1-2 cup mayonnaise, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley and 1 tablespoon chopped green olives.

Exotic Design In Gardenias



Perhaps one of the most difficult flowers for the layman, from an arrangement point of view, is the gardenia, says Alyn Wayne, official stylist for the Florists' Telegraph Delivery Association. People usually float them in a shallow crystal bowl because they simply don't know what else to do with them. Ask your florist to demonstrate, then with a little practice, you will see how easy it is to run a wire through the base of the flower, leaving enough for a long stem, and then wrap with tape. Now that you have made a stem, you are free to arrange them in many graceful designs, adding a few decorative leaves to give shape, and cover the wires. Remember to keep your fingers away from the petals as much as possible—Alyn Wayne advises working on cotton—and that gardenias get their moisture through the petals, not through the stems, so spray them occasionally and keep them away from direct heat.

Watch It! Asian Flu Starts With High Fever

As Asian Flu continues to spread over Texas more than any other state at the present time, public health authorities have issued a warning statement that the disease starts off with a high fever that reaches 103 and 104 degrees, and the health service has given a few hints on what to do if you think you have the symptoms.

First, go to bed quick and call a doctor. Second, be sure that you don't go around anybody, and don't let anybody come around you. After that, you are supposed to stay in bed until the doctor tells you to get up. Keep warm, drink plenty of liquid and eat lightly.

The health service has stressed that there is nothing dangerous to the disease, but it can put a lot of

people in the bed, knock a lot of people out of work, and cause a lot of schools to close down.

Within the past week there were 600 cases reported at Texas A & M College, 500 cases at San Marcos College and 400 cases at TCU. It is said that several public schools in the state were on the verge of closing down but were saved by the last week-end Saturday and Sunday recess.

Many ball games over the state were cancelled this past week-end on account of the flu. Doctors advise being vaccinated against the disease the minute vaccine is announced as being available.
