Crossing of Railroads Gave Birth to Red Cap

(Editor's Note: This is the 27th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

In 1879, when there were not more than half a dozen families in the locality, Rev. C. G. Stevens established a postoffice at a pass-way in the hills, one mile west of town, and called it Red Gap. A floorless log school house, with one small window was built, and Mrs. Collette Green taught school. One half mile of Red Gap Post-office, W. T. Caldwell had a store in which he kept dry goods and groceries.

Rainfall In Area Is Beneficial, Farmers All Say

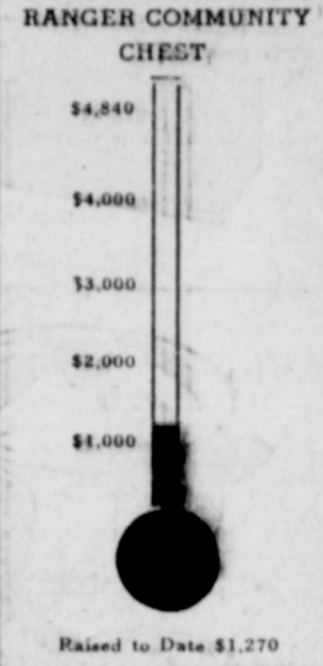
Eastland County farmers were pleased with rainfall which fell this week.

In 1880 the Texas and Pacific Railway pushed its line on westward through Eastland County but Red Gap continued in existence. It was expected, however, that when the Texas Central reached the Texas and Pacific a town would be located at the crossing of the roads. Each day, as the iron rails led nearer and nearer to this point of crossing, saw new tents stretched, new covered wagons taking their stand, and new faces in the rapidly growing town which was called Red Gap. With the Texas Central within one mile of the junction, and the Texas and Pacific only a short distance west, many laborers increased the population to 600. Accommodating themselves to the only expression where it was supposed the new town would be located, which was a wagon road running east and west, the people had "quarted" on either side of this throughfare. In this white town were two or more stores, a number of restaurants, doctors' offices, and Mrs. Ray's Hotel, which stood about the middle of Broadway, between the Daniels and Broadway homes. Dr. Vance, who arrived in Cisco April 1, 1881, officiated in the hotel group of tents.

 president and their own money and set and collect their own dues. The dues are very nominal, well within reach of any boy or girl, and if such a thing should happen to a child not having a dollar to his dues, nobody ever heard of one being denied the facilities of Teen Town.
 Youngsters Handle Own Money
 Dues collected by the children

are spent by the children. They have their own bank account and take care of it. They spend their money for ping pong balls, phonograph records, decorations for parties, and other odds and ends that they might need from time to time.
 Money for the actual operation of Teen Town comes from the Community Chest.
 This year Teen Town increased its actual physical value by several thousand dollars due to work

done by the Mothers Club and the donation of such material and labor and money by the citizens of Ranger in the building of the new annex.
 Dr. Price Ashton of Ranger College gave the building for the annex, it being a structure that was once used as an athletic field house. The building was not much more than a shell, but it was a valuable gift just the same as something to start on. It was moved to Teen Town and placed

against the regular building forming a "T", and the old building was completely remodeled.
 Valued At Several Thousand
 The Mothers Club sold Teen Town Booster Cards for \$1.00 in order to raise the cash needed for completion of the building, much labor was donated, materials were either donated or sold at cost, and the completed project is valued at several thousand dollars. It made Ranger's youth center one of the finest in West Texas.

 been 10 miles away. That statement couldn't have been any farther from the truth.
 The Ranger coaches did question the last series of four downs because there was some irregularity, they thought, which caused them to question that one of the downs was actually a down. They were entirely within their rights in asking about the matter.

In criticizing the Ranger coaches for checking up on this point, the Telegram sarcastically remarked that it would be glad to arrange for the coaches to see films of the last four plays, but unfortunately, the coaches didn't think they had to ask the Telegram about this so they just went right over the paper's head and talked to the Eastland coaches and settled the whole thing hours and hours before the Telegram ever found out about it or quit raving about it. The Telegram was raving Tuesday about arranging for a film showing, when the coaches of both Schools had settled the whole thing Monday, or, quite possibly, before then, even. By allowing the piece in the paper to stand without an effort to bring it up to date, it only served to point out further that the sole purpose of the article was to malign the coaches as far as possible.

The Telegram, perhaps, got its false impression about tears being on Page One of the Times from the statement we made that "never was a team" so roundly licked as were the Mavericks to walk off the field with the big end of the score." Or, at least, the paper made over the statement enough to give that impression. Of course, anyone can see that tears are just raining out of the sentence, but at any rate, we were only repeating the Telegram's own words in its own story in the Abilene Reporter-News that if they were allowed to count statistics the Mavericks would have won in a walk, since they doubled the Mavericks in first downs, doubled them in yards rushing and tripped them in yards passing. Those were the very words in a story datelined from Eastland and we assumed from them that the Mavericks had been pretty roundly outplayed.

And while the Telegram was scratching around for something it could half quote or not quote in order to give the impression of a bunch of reproaches living in Ranger, it couldn't see one of our early paragraphs which said, "Nothing counts but the final results on the scoreboard and they went for the Mavericks, and Coach Carrol Shelton and Jon Tate, together with the entire Maverick football squad, are to be congratulated for their win."

In falsely reporting that the Ranger coaches and football fans were going around over the country shouting that they were robbed, we sincerely hope the Telegram does not detract from a great Maverick victory, because those we talked to in Ranger thought the Mavs did pretty well in beating an exceptionally good Ranger team fair and square and on their own. Without any help from the officials.

As for the editor of the Telegram reporting only parts of our own story for his hometown consumption, that's perfectly all right with us. Only we'd like to ask him one thing: how much money did HE win on the Mavericks?
