## Cash Offering For Hernandez Family Is Almost \$200

This piece is of vital concern to all the old folks, and to all people who have old folks in their families. It is therefore of much interest to everybody, and we thought we had better get it in the paper now before something else like the Sputnik, or Queen Elizabeth or Virgil Moore comes along to crowd it out.

November 5 is election day, and that is only two weeks away counting Saturday, Sunday, Halloween and everything else. On November 5 you are going to have to vote on that disgraceful, insulting constitutional amendment in which the legislature proposed to raise Old Age Pensioners TWO DOLLARS A MONTH! That's a t, friends, amounts to TWENTY-FOUR DOLLARS A YEAR!

This is the same Legislature, remember, that voted to increase the pay of its own members from \$3,000 every two years to \$15,000 every two years, making an over-all salary hike of \$12,000 per member. And on top of this, they voted to have the taxpayers pay their expenses, too, while they sit in Austin legislating. They just had to do this, some of them said, to keep them honest, and to keep some of the members from taking outside money and becoming crooked. But in the meantime, they wanted the old folks to have this \$2 a month.

But you are not going to have to vote on the amendment raising the Legislators' pay to \$15,000 until NEXT YEAR. That doesn't come up until Nov. 5, 1958. You can worry about that, then!

What you are concerned with now is the amendment to be voted on next November 5, 1957, which will increase the Old Age Pension this measly \$2 a month. While it is a disgrace to stick anything like that out to the Old People, you had better go on down and vote for it, because if the amendment doesn't get a lot of votes, enough to carry, there are just a lot of folks in this state who automatically vote against anything, habitually, who will go to the polls and kill it.

While we would like to see all the Old People in this state get enough Old Age Pension to actually live on and be comfortable with in their old age, we might as well go ahead and (Continued on Page Four)

## Cisco Schools To Jump Taxes 20c For 1958-59 Year

Residents of the Cisco Independent School District will be asked to raise the tax rate 20 cents per \$100, from \$1.30 to \$1.50, in an election to be arranged soon, according to a story in the Cisco Press.

In announcing the decision of the school board, Supt. Arlin Hint said this year is the second in a row that the school system has operated with a budget deficiency of over \$10,000. It will be necessary to approve the tax rates before next September, it is said.

The gifts, ranging from \$1.00 to \$22, came from Ranger citizens and from people all around Ranger. Gifts came from Strawn, Gorman, Olden, Eastland and almost every other nearby community following the appeal made for help for the family in last Thursday's Times.

A considerable amount of groceries was also donated for the family, and lots of clothes. In fact, father Boesmans said, the family had plenty of clothes right now, and needed groceries more than anything else. The money will help to pay for rent and utilities and other expenses until birth certificates on the eight children can be obtained. Most of the children were born in different places, and birth certificates on all of them must be obtained (Continued on Page Four)

The Bulldogs were originally picked by the experts to finish last in District 7AA, but it is a pretty good guess that by now the crystal gazers have picked a new slot for the lads in Maroon and White.

The experts had picked the five District 7AA teams to finish thusly: 1. Coleman 2. Ballinger 3. Winters 4. Cisco 5. Ranger

Winters is still looking for win No. One; Cisco has won two and lost five; Ballinger has won five and lost two; Ranger has won four and lost two; and Coleman has whipped everything they've run up against, and whipped 'em something awful.

On that proverbial paper which will get you in trouble every time, Ranger certainly ought to whale the tar out of Winters, and the Bulldogs have an excellent chance to beat the Loboes if they don't go over there with the game already won like they did at, say, (Grrrr) Eastland. Of all the extra points the Bulldogs have kicked this year, they had to miss that ONE in the County Seat!

Ranger and Cisco have played two common foes, Eastland and DeLeon. Cisco beat Eastland 21-18 at the opening game of the season for both clubs. Ranger smothered DeLeon 33-0 while DeLeon beat Cisco 14-0. And, of course, in case the word hasn't got around to everyone yet, Eastland "smothered" Ranger 14-13 in a game the Mavericks lost in every other way worse than A&M lost Saturday to TCU.

## Eastland Placed In Dist. 7AA Football With Ranger For '58

Like Ranger did two years ago, it is now Eastland's turn to break down and shed crocodile tears because the Mavericks are now in Class AA Football if the tentative schedule released by the Inter-scholastic League for publication on or after October 20 stands up.

The Mavericks have been placed in District 7AA, along with Ballinger, Cisco, Coleman, Ranger and Winters for the 1958-59 season.

In a covering letter which accompanied the new assignments for every school in the state from Class AAAA on down, Dr. Rhea H. Williams, League athletic director said, "This is the second year the League has used the two-year assignment basis which was worked out in 1955 by an Inter-scholastic League committee. The tentative list, however, will not be final until next September."

"Conference classification is determined by the average membership (commonly referred to as enrollment) of the last four grades in high school, taken from the superintendents' annual reports to the Texas Education Agency," Williams went on to explain. "In previous years only one year's membership was considered for conference assignment, but next year's assignments are based on an average of the average membership for the 1955-56 and the 1956-57 school years."

The conference brackets for next year are: Conference AAAA, 900 and above; conference AAA, 800-900; conference AA, 700-800; conference A, 600-700; conference B, 500 and under. Schools with a membership of less than 100 may play six-man football if desired.

Present brackets are: conference AAAA, 845 and up; AAA, 370-845; AA, 200-370; A, 120-200; and conference B, 119 and under.

What changed Eastland's category is not known unless they have increased considerably in enrollment, as the new brackets are the same as the old brackets as far as AA football is concerned.

At any rate, the new tentative list places the Mavericks in District 7AA, present District, which is 10A, will include Albany, Agency," Williams went on to explain.

## Chest Drive Up Only \$80; May Never Get \$2,000 Remaining

Since the last report was made on the Community Chest Drive, which showed the amount of money collected and pledged through last Friday night, the Drive has advanced only \$30 more toward the budget of \$4,840.

At that rate, the Drive is going over like a lead balloon and may never reach the goal for the 1957-58 budget, which is the lowest in history.

As of to date, a total of \$2,754 has been raised, an advance of \$80 over the amount last reported which was \$2,674. The amount left to be raised is \$2,086.

There is possibly a good reason for the small collection of \$80, however, since workers did not have an opportunity to make any calls Saturday, and Sunday was Sunday. The collection of \$80 over and above that previously reported, was the amount received up to the close of business Monday.

Lester Croxley, chairman of the Drive this year, said today that very appeal made previously on behalf of the drive, should be given serious consideration by all persons involved if the budget is to be met.

Those appeals included a plea to individuals to take it upon themselves to give whether they were called on or not. 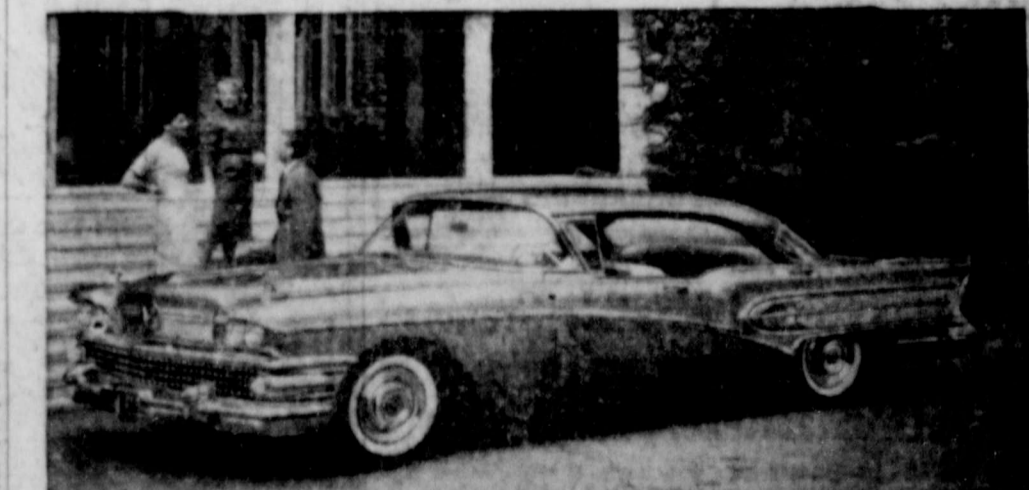

### Lone Star Gives New Recipes For Cooking Apples

One of the nicest things about fall is the abundant supply of fresh apples. True, apples are available the year around, but early September starts the harvest of the new crop and it goes on until around the middle of December. Picked at the peak of goodness, hardy, full-flavored apples with cheeks plump and skins aglow, are ready for out-of-hand eating or for cooking in a variety of ways.

Tangy apples, baked in solitary splendor are hard to beat, but they take well to stuffing. Choose firm medium-sized apples for baking. Rome Beauty, Jonathan, Winesap, Grimes Golden and Baldwin varieties are especially good for baking. Wash and core apples all the way through and pare around stem to remove about 1 inch of skin. Slice apples in a deep baking dish. If desired, fill centers. Pour over apples water or syrup, cover and bake in moderate gas oven (375 degrees F.) 40 minutes or until tender. For 4 apples use 2-3 cup water or 2-3 cup syrup made by combining 1-3 cup water and 1-3 cup light corn syrup.

Make a raisin stuffing by combining 1-4 cup seedless raisins and 1-4 cup finely chopped extra apple. Add 1/2 tablespoon red cinnamon candies to the syrup. Makes enough stuffing for 4 apples.

To stuff 4 apples with cranberry nut stuffing, combine 1-2 cup finely chopped fresh cranberries and 2 tablespoons brown sugar. Drop 4 cloves and 1 stick of cinnamon into the syrup.

One-half cup moist mincemeat and 1-4 cup chopped pecans combine to make mincemeat nut stuffing for 4 apples. Unless a very sweet dish is desired, add water instead of syrup for the baking.

Recipe of the Week  
Spiced Apple Halves: Wash, core and cut in halves lengthwise, 3 baking apples. Place in shallow baking dish cut side up. Cover with 1-2 cup brown sugar and 1-2 cup catsup. Dot with 2 tablespoons butter or margarine. Cover bottom of baking dish with water. Bake in moderate gas oven (350 degrees F.) 20 minutes. Turn apples cut side down and continue baking until tender, about 10 minutes. Serve warm with meat or poultry. Makes 6 servings.

(Continued from Page One) vote to take this \$2 a month which is about enough to pay for one doctor's prescription. To explain this amendment briefly, it originally started out as House Joint Resolution No. 2, which was designed to provide increased payments for the aged, blind and needy children.

Total authorized State expenditures for these purposes would be raised from \$42 million to \$47 million per year.

Under present laws, the Federal Government will match any money put up by the state to provide a maximum Old Age Pension of \$60. Up to now, Texas has been putting up only enough money for the maximum pension to come to \$58 when the state money was matched by the Federal Government.

Under this new amendment, if adopted, the state will put up \$30 which, when matched by the Federal Government, will increase the maximum from \$58 to \$60, or \$2 per month.

As of now, there is no individual limit on amounts paid to needy children, their cases being worked out separately and on the basis of need.

But go ahead and vote FOR the amendment by all means. Take what you can get while you can get it. You can worry about that \$12,000 raise for the Legislators next year, because you don't have to vote on it now.

AND INCIDENTALLY, there will be another amendment on the November 5 ballot, too, popularly known as the "Water

Amendment." Go on and vote for that, also, because it is the beginning of the water development program in Texas. The program is self-supporting and will not increase taxes, and it is very necessary that the amendment pass. It should be supported by all Texans in every section of the state. Vote "Yes" on both amendments, and be sure to vote!

There will also be a third amendment on the ballot, this one to authorize several important changes in the State Employees Retirement System. Since the amendment seeks to straighten out some of the bad features of the present retirement laws and make them better, it should also pass, and it deserves your support.
