## Esco Walter Is Appointed By Governor

Esco Walter, Abilene attorney, has been named associate justice of the Eleventh District Court of Civil Appeals by Gov. Price Daniel. High School team in 1927. He attended Baylor University with Gov. Daniel and graduated from the Baylor law school in 1932. "I am grateful to Gov. Price Daniel for appointing me to this important judicial position, and I humbly accept such appointment," Walter said. "From 1940 to 1950 Walter served as 104th district attorney. He resigned to enter practice of private law. He has been a partner in the Abilene law firm of McMahon, Smart, Walter, Spain and Wilson. Judge Walter said his plans to move to Eastland are not yet complete. His youngest daughter is still in school in Abilene and he said he may commute until school mid-term. Walter's appointment is until the next general election, in the fall of 1958. He said he would definitely be a candidate at that time for the unexpired four year term. "As a member of the court I shall endeavor to carry out the principles set out in Rule 1 of the Texas Rules of Civil Procedure which reads as follows: 'The proper objectives of rules of civil procedure are to obtain a just, fair, equitable and impartial adjudication of the rights of litigants under established principles of substantive law. 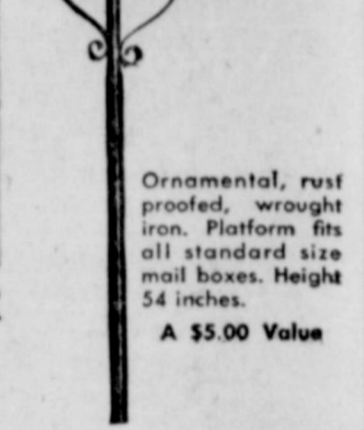
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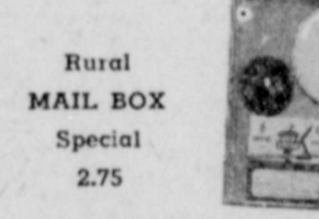

The Scranton 4-H Club had their first club meeting last week, at which time they elected officers and discussed what would be suitable 4-H projects. The new officers are—Harold Reese, President, Jimmy Johnson, Vice President, David Stuart, Sec. Treas., Jerry Morgan, Reporter, and Franklin James, Council Representative.

Jack Callaway, Rising Star, is doing a very good job of feeding and training the Hereford steer that he won at the Houston Beef Calf Scramble last March. His calf weighs about 565 pounds now and is gaining over three pounds per day. He plans to show it at Abilene in February and then take it on to Houston to compete with the other scramble calves. Jack is feeding out another calf for the county show next spring. Jack has been a 4-H Club member for nine years and has fed calves for shows all that time.

The Electric Tea Demonstration contest has attracted the interest of over 60 4-H Club boys and girls of Eastland County. In the contest there will be two members per team, consisting of two boys, a boy and a girl or two girls. To go to Tarleton College to compete there the team members must be thirteen years old by Jan. 1st.

Franklin James, Scranton 4-H Club member, is very pleased with the Sears gift he received from the Sears Pig Program in May of last year. His gilt farrowed nine pigs last March and raised eight and presently has a litter of eight pigs.

Sixty 4-H boys and girls have indicated that they are going to show fat lambs next spring at the county Livestock Show. Twenty-six boys are planning to feed out and show fat barrows and gilts at the show. Lamb feeding has been on the increase for several years. Even town boys can feed out lambs.

#### HALLOWEEN PARTY CAKE

- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups seeded raisins
- 2 cups canned apple sauce
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1 1/2 teaspoon cloves
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 4-oz. jar (1/2 cup) mixed candied fruits
- Orange Frosting

Combine sugar, raisins, apple sauce, water, shortening, cloves, nutmeg and cinnamon; bring to boil. Cool. Sift together flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Add apple sauce mixture and candied fruits; mix thoroughly. Pour into 9" greased tube pan. Bake in slow oven, 300° F., 2 1/2 hours. Cool and frost with orange frosting and decorate with sugared jellied licorice sticks and candy chicken corn.

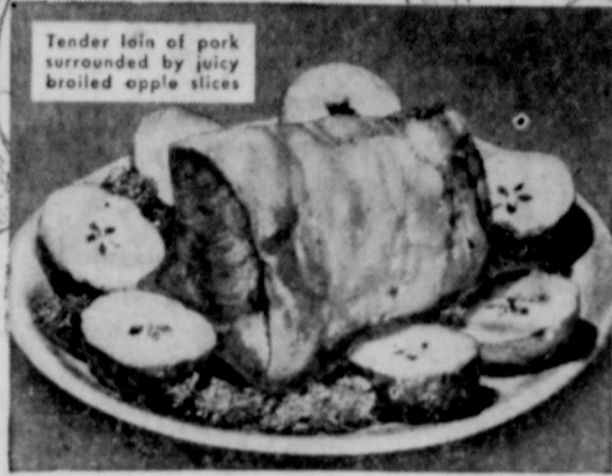

Post Office Film Available Here, Postmaster Says

The Post Office is finally going modern, Postmaster Mrs. Ella White of Ranger says and she has the film to prove it.

"Nineteenth century facilities," Mrs. White says. "Postmaster General Summerfield, in attempting to revolutionize the outmoded techniques of mail handling in the postal establishment, had to start from scratch. He had to ask the electronics industry to develop machines that hadn't even been invented as yet. This film is a remarkable presentation of the progress being made in the United States mail service."

He added that even if automation is not installed in the Ranger post office the program will greatly accelerate out of town mail in this area because mail will move far more swiftly through the large gateway post office of the country.

Rinse Takes Static From Synthetic Fabrics

MOST homemakers are in love with man-made fabrics.

These drip-dry timesavers make housekeeping easier, quicker and much more efficient. They cut down greatly on the load of family ironing each week and make it possible for a soiled garment to be clean and in service again within a couple of hours.

But most homemakers are also familiar with the problem of slits that cling, shirts and sweaters that crackle and spark when they come in contact with metal in the form of typewriters, desks and cars.

To solve this problem, one manufacturer has developed a new product in liquid form which is simply added to the last tub of rinse water. According to the maker, this new product makes all man-made fabrics static-free.

The reason for this is that most of the newer synthetics shed water quickly (which is why they drip-dry so fast). Therefore, there's no moisture left after they're washed. And there's no "path" of water to carry away the charge of "electricity." The charge remains in the dry fabric and causes that annoying cling.

The new fabric softener coats the surface of the fibers and is retained by them so that even when clothes are dried in an automatic dryer they are static-free.

It can be used for drapes, slip covers and car covers as well as for clothing.
