We wish to offer our apologies for the shortage of news in today's Times. We thought we were going to be able to escape the flu bug, but no such luck. It hit us right during the middle of the Ranger-Coleman game Friday night and while we should have been enjoying the one big moment of the year like everybody else we were shaking and rattling like an aspen leaf in a whirlwind. When the game was over we managed to make it down to beneath the grandstand and for about 20 or 30 minutes we were never any more nauseated in our life. Finally we managed to make it to the car and became nauseated again. A man passed by and said "what you need, buddy, is another drink." What we needed mostly was an old-fashioned six-shooter and we think we would have let him have it. "Drinking stuff" is one thing we don't fool with.

We managed to drag down to the office Saturday morning long enough to write a miserable account of the game and made a genuine failure of it. If ever there was a time when the Ranger Bulldogs deserved all the praise they could get, it was after their brilliant victory over the Coleman Bluecats.

But even at that it would have been impossible for anybody to add to their accomplishment with mere words. Beyond any question of a doubt they delivered a stunning blow to high school football and especially to the prognosticators. Coleman, remember, had been picked as No. 4 in the entire State of Texas, and nobody was supposed to beat them until along about next Christmas in the very last of the finals.

The wonderful thing about the Bulldog victory is that it was so clean-cut and decisive. And never was there a ball club that played a cleaner game. They went after their victory with a confidence that we have seldom seen in a football team to be so outraged. They had confidence in their own individual selves and they had confidence in their teammates and their coaches. They went to work with a vengeance and a n d didn't let up all night.

The pressure was amazing. Not for a moment did any man on the team slack up. Having once jolted the fire out of Coleman with their first touchdown the Bulldogs never gave the Bluecats time to collect themselves after that.

The Bulldog line played like seven bunch of boys possessed with hell fire. The vaunted Coleman offense that had run everything else in District 7-AA into the dirt all year long never could get moving. It is easy to see how a fine coach could play like the Bulldogs for a few downs, but it is hard to see how they could keep it up down after down after down until the last ball was snapped.

Just for your information, they are going to win some more ball games, too, when these District play-offs start.

The Union Building is the center of the regularly scheduled Thursday-night activity.

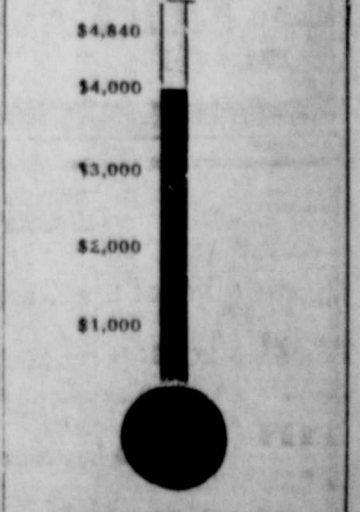

County Once Known As Sandy Belt of Texas

(Editor's Note: This is the 40th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

The X-Ray Albert Tyson is the founder and proprietor of the X-ray. If one wants truths frankly told; if when one is hit, one prefers the blow to come straight from the shoulders one would do well to read Mr. Tyson's paper. The illustration on the opposite page represents Mr. J. M. Tyson—the editor's father—gathering apples from a six year old Early Harvest apple tree. He moved to Eastland in 1878, and has a thirty acre apple orchard two miles north of Rising Star. At the Farmer's Institute held in Eastland City Nov. 1903, he was awarded a prize on the apples he exhibited.

The Rising Star Record came into existence April 4, 1903. George T. Barnes and C. A. and Sidney W. Smith are the proprietors of the Record Printing Company. W. A. Bucey and Brother Fifteen years ago W. P. Bucey opened a stock of furniture and did well, but soon discovered that to be able to accommodate the patronage he had he must keep farming implements. The business proved successful that Mr. Bucey's oldest son, William A., be-

Brazil Nuts Make Special Stuffing



Brazil nuts chopped with all their creamy richness contribute a provocative flavor and texture to poultry dressings. This dressing will get as much interest and praise as the turkey.

If you're baking one of the smaller turkeys this holiday season, you may want to serve part of the dressing as a side dish. The turkey cavity will probably not hold an adequate supply for all guests. This extra portion can be baked in aluminum foil the last hour the turkey is in the oven. Put the envelope of dressing in the corner of the roasting pan with the turkey.

Particularly excellent of flavor is a Brazil nut, raisin and bread crumb stuffing. The nuts and raisins give moisture to the bread crumbs, and this fruit-nut addition doubly steps up the flavor of the bread base.

Brazil Nut Raisin Stuffing

1/2 cup butter or margarine 2 cups raisins
 1/2 cup finely chopped onion 1/2 cup chopped parsley
 3 quarts soft bread crumbs 1 tablespoon salt
 2 cups finely chopped Brazil nuts 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 2 cups finely diced celery 3/4 cup water or stock
 1 8-10 pound turkey

Melt butter, add onion and cook until onion is tender, but not brown. Add bread crumbs, Brazil nuts, celery, raisins, parsley and seasonings. Cook about 5 minutes over medium heat, stirring constantly. Add water or stock, toss lightly. Stuff turkey with part of the stuffing. Put remaining stuffing in center of square of aluminum foil. Fold and press sides tightly together. Roast turkey. Place aluminum-wrapped stuffing in oven during last hour of roasting. YIELD: 10 cups.

Cucumbers, long green with shiny, can relinquish their reputation for coolness to the big shiny Florida limes now reaching our markets in the nick of summertime! Big as lemons are our American-grown limes and useful in the same ways. They are "ripe when green and green when ripe" and make the best cold drinks you've had in ages.

They used to call them "Persians" or "Tablitan", these big green, glossy limes but now, with the state taking over the growing of them in quantity, they're known as "Florida Seedless" and must pass rigid tests for maturity and juice-content before they can be shipped to market. Expect them to be emerald as Ireland in color—that's the way they are supposed to be. And expect them to cool you off, as they do in these recipes:

Lime Sparkle

- 1 1/2 cups Florida lime juice
- Ice
- 1 quart sparkling water
- 1/2 cup sugar

Combine lime juice and sugar; shake or stir well with ice until very cold and frosty. Add sparkling water; mix well. Serve with lime wedges. Serves 6.

Lime Frost

- 1/2 cup Florida lime juice
- 2 egg whites
- 4 cups cold water
- 1/4 cup sugar

Combine lime juice and water; chill. Beat egg whites stiff; gradually add sugar beating constantly. Slowly add lime juice mixture, stirring constantly. Pour into tall glasses over shaved ice. Serve immediately. Serves 4.

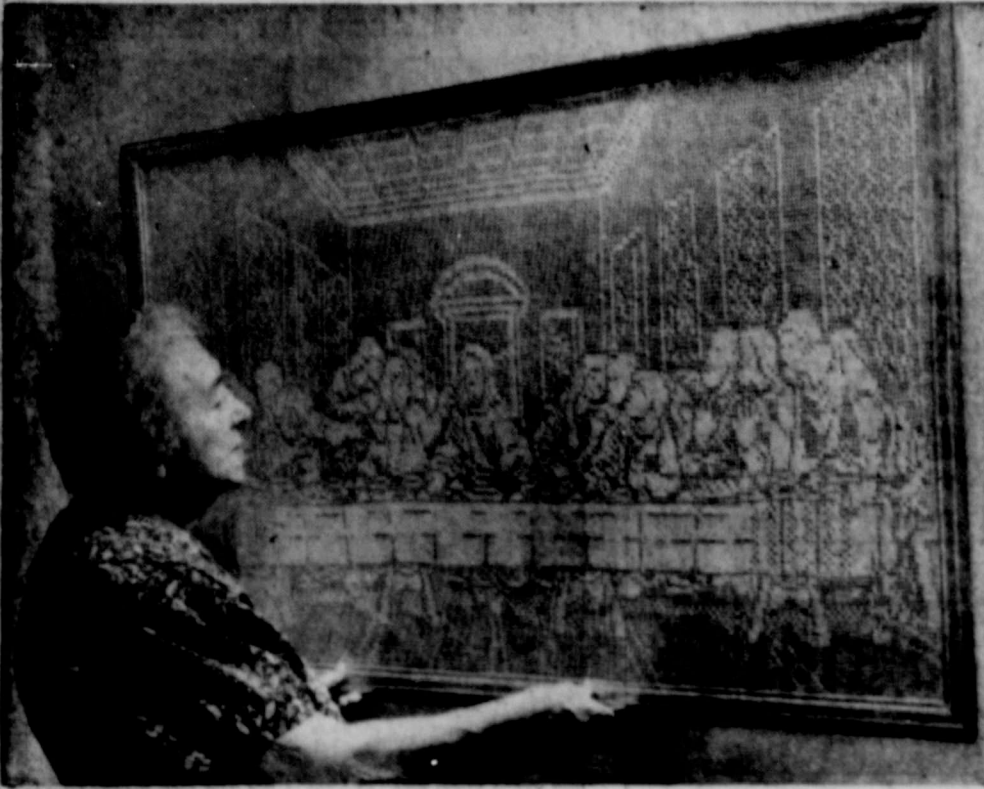

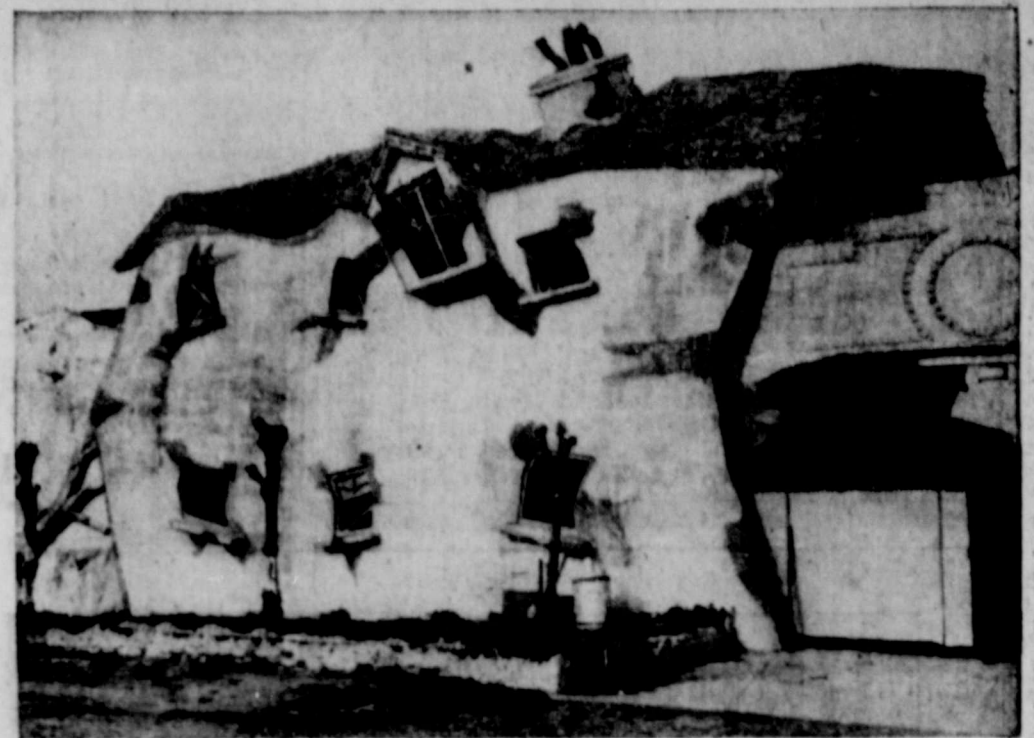
