County FB Delegates Hear President Talk

Fifteen hundred delegates to the State County Farm Bureau convention in Fort Worth—including six from Eastland County—today heard the president of the State FB declare that farmers and ranchers must demand some form of economic protection as "buy in a captive market of industry" and has to pay "any price collective bargaining can obtain."

J. Walter Hammond told delegates to the organization's 24th annual convention that the "segments of nation's economy are interdependent."

"If one segment lags too much, all must bear the consequences," he stated. "All depressions in our history have been farm-led and farm-fed. When the buying power of agriculture falls behind, workers must be let out of industry. This results in even less buying power and more workers lose their jobs. Thus we have the downward spiral that can only lead to a depression."

Hammond told the 1,500 Farm Bureau members convened at the Hotel Adolphus that "we cannot allow agriculture to trigger an economic set-back from which we might never recover."

Eastland County delegates at the meeting, which will continue through Wednesday, are John Love, Ben Freeman, Don Kincaid, Wayne Thurman, Ray Norris and Mitchell Campbell.

The state farm leader pointed out that "since industry and labor enjoy their tariffs and their wage and hour laws, it is only fair that we have some sort of economic protection for agriculture."

He stated that continued price support legislation must be the core of any farm program - a floor to prevent disastrous price slumps.

"After all, we must buy in the captive market of industry and we must pay any price collective bargaining can obtain," he said.

Hammond told the voting delegates from some 175 organized counties that they had the responsibility of selecting a sound farm program. In reviewing several of the plans currently being suggested to various groups, Hammond cautioned against doing away with all government programs.

"It is not fair for agriculture to operate in a pure free enterprise economy while industry and labor enjoy special privileges. This would be turning the lambs loose for the wolves to slaughter. On the other hand, we must keep in mind that the law of supply and demand is a basic law, and we must always adhere to its principles."

As for the proposals to bolster farm income by compensatory or direct production payments, the Farm Bureau leader urged a careful analysis of possible results. Under such a plan, the government would pay producers the difference between the free market price and a level of parity (most proposals say 90 per cent) set by the government.

"These compensatory payments would be direct subsidies, and we could expect that the government would exercise a very rigid control over agriculture because of

that," he pointed out.

"Another danger in such a program is that there is always a tendency to limit the amount of payment that any one operator could receive. The net result would be the leveling off of incomes for all farmers and ranchers."

Hammond told the convention delegates that such a program has another built-in fault. "It takes money to pay for it, money that has to be appropriated by Congress," he stated. Can you or I afford to have our incomes dependent upon the whims of Congress?"

He said that he believed that "most folks advocating direct production payments are sincere in their desire to help agriculture. But, we must analyze and program from the standpoint of what it will do to agriculture in the long run."
