Scout Leaders Attend Banquet In County Seat

Scout leaders of the Northeast District of the Comanche Trail Council met Tuesday night at the White Elephant restaurant in Eastland for their annual meeting and banquet.

A progress report showed that there are now 53 Scout units in the Council with 1017 boys participating. Plans call for having a total of 54 units with 1085 members by Dec. 31.

Rev. E. E. Mulner reported on individual advancement during the year, revealing that a large number of advancements in rank had resulted from work of leaders during the year. He reported that 110 wolf badges had been awarded, 106 bear badges were given, 53 lion badges were awarded, 85 second class badges were earned and 58 first class badges were presented.

In addition, one Eagle badge was earned. It went to J. D. Laws of Cisco.

The largest city-wide Court of Honor held in the District was at Breckenridge, where 450 attended. City-wide Courts of Honor were also held in Eastland, Ranger, Cisco and Stephenville.

M. G. Cartwright, Scoutmaster for the Lions Club Troop 193, Eastland, was honored for the work he did in organizing troop 104 and Pack 104. Homer Smith and Rev. K. Smith received ribbons for him.

Colored slides were shown following a business session. Clinton Arthur of Stephenville, who attended the National Jamboree at Valley Forge and the World Jamboree in England, showed the films.

W. A. Breland, assistant director of personnel for Lone Star Gas Co., was guest speaker. Breland has been active in Scout work for 25 years, and he spoke about the privileges of working with boys.

Special guests were recognized and leaders voted on nominees for office for the coming year. Results will be announced soon.

Ranger Created After Battle With Indians

(Editor's Note: This is the 44th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston 1904.)

T. J. Morris, Merchant
On January 14, 1893, with a small stock of "Racket Goods," Mr. Morris began business in Carbon. Two years later he erected and moved into a building in the center of the town, where he is still located.

Few men have had more marked success than Mr. Morris. From the small beginning, made a little more than one decade ago, his business has grown until now he handles everything in a general merchandise line. Besides dry goods and groceries, hardware and every conceivable kind of farming implement, he handles furniture and undertaker's goods. Mr. Morris' energy and ingenuity does not stop here.

He is interested in the two girls of Maple Press and Foyler at Carbon and Hank's Store. His latest venture is stocking his fine ranch

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because here is what has to be done without another minute's delay if a new franchise for 1958 is to be granted.

Officers for 1958 must be elected and their names must be affixed to the application for the new franchise, and it must be mailed immediately. It is 30 days late now.

The 31 members of the club from the Eastland District were seated as a group below the speakers platform, however, and Thomas

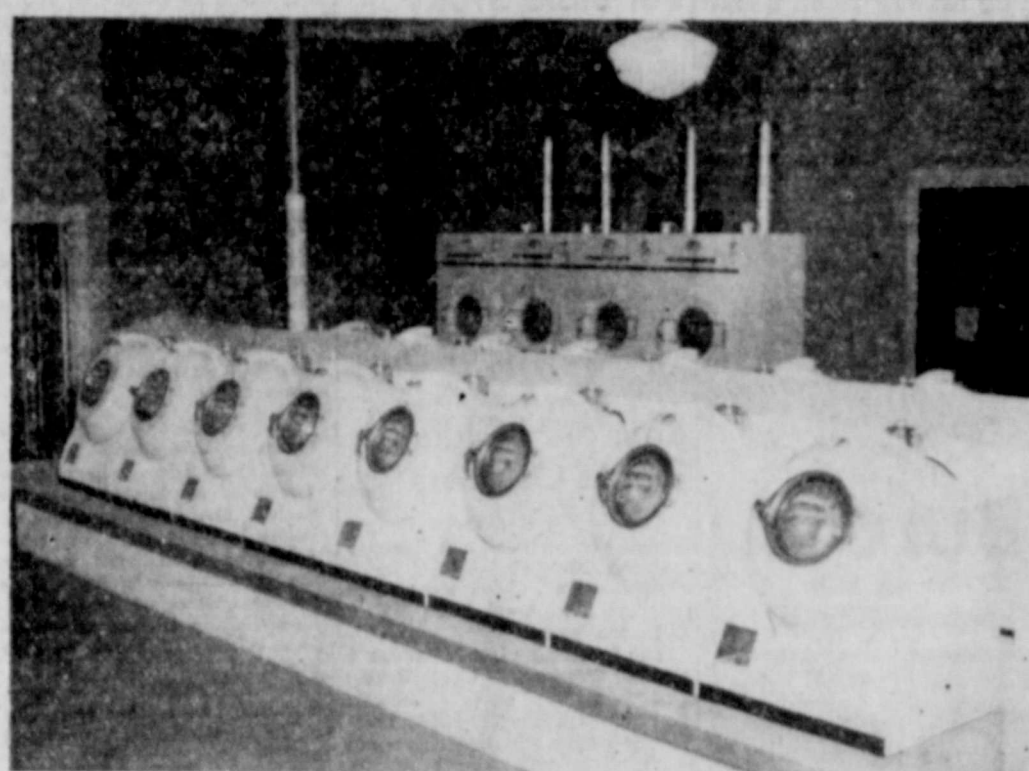
Two More Pecan Entries Received For Pecan Show

New Ranger Laundromat Ready to Operate Saturday

The dream of many hundreds of Ranger housewives will become a reality here Saturday morning, Nov. 23, when the new Ranger Coin-Operated Laundromat opens for business in the big, roomy building at 321 West Main Street.

Westinghouse Laundromats of this type have been sweeping the country for the past year because they offer the ultimate in convenience and economy for housewives who do their own laundry, and they have proved to be life-savers for busy mothers.

With an abundance of hot water available, the machines are completely automatic, carrying a load of clothes through all the cycles from a thorough washing to a final rinsing and ringing out, and are operated by inserting a coin. Actual tests of tens of thousands of cases have shown that savings on the weekly wash run from 35 to 50 per cent.

Start Clothes, Then Shop
The great convenience of the Laundromats lies in the fact that a woman can load her clothes into a machine, insert her coin, and go on about other shopping duties in town, and pick up her clothes when she goes home.

If she wishes to use the dryers also, it is a matter of only a few

The building has been repainted and refinished throughout, with a heavy coat of grey deck paint on the floors, and the surroundings are as comfortable and as clean and neat as they can be.

Change-making machines are hung at several places on the walls so that customers can quickly secure the necessary coins with which to operate the machines. There are also coin-operated soap dispensers that dish out the exact amount of soap recommended for their use.

Fees Are Small
The washing machines can be operated for 20 cents per load, and the dryers are 10 cents for ten minutes. It has also been announced that all customers on opening day, Saturday, may wash their first load free. Also 100 boxes of Laundry Maid soap will be given away on opening day Saturday. Even if you do not have a washing Saturday, you are invited to drop in for an inspection of the new Laundromat.

For the first few days, attendants will be on hand to explain how to use the machines, but after that all the laundromat users will be on their own, and since the place is open 24 hours a day, they can all go down and do their washing at 3 o'clock in the morning if they wish.

The new Laundromat is locally owned and will be kept in trouble-free operation at all times.

Ranger Outweighed
According to the starting line-ups published herewith, the Ranger Bulldogs are going to be on the short end of the scales as far as weight goes.

Records for the season show that undefeated, untied Hamilton has won all its ball games by huge, one-sided scores, and they have proved themselves to be a high-scoring ball club. Since they are almost impossible to hold, on account of their weight, it takes a lot of scores to beat them.

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I GIVE YOU TEXAS

The first time I ever saw Dan Moody, he came to Eastland to assist in the prosecution of a man accused of murder. At that time he was the prosecuting attorney of Williamson County and soon afterward he was elected Attorney General.

The trial resulted in a hung jury. The case was transferred to another county and the defendant was freed. (I don't know whether Moody took part in the later trial or not.)

Years later, I sat down beside him at the counter in the Stephen F. Austin Hotel coffee shop in Austin and he related an incident of his first campaign for governor.

He said, in substance: "I made about the same speech everywhere, after making the local references, and I had given it so many times that it was almost automatic. As I was speaking in one town my eyes were roving over the audience when I saw a face that I had seen before. I began to wonder who he was and then it came to me; he was the man I had prosecuted in East-

land. It further occurred to me that he might try to make some trouble. You will recall he was a husky man with cold eyes and he was looking at me intently.

"All this time, I was going on with my speech.

"When it was over, a good many in the audience lined up to shake hands and I suddenly found myself face to face with him.

"As he shook my hand, he said in a tone that everyone around could hear, 'You tried to send me to the electric chair but you are a good man and I'm for you.'

"I shook his hand extra heartily."

found themselves in a beautiful, level valley of richest soil and luxuriant grasses, but did not loiter, as they pushed hard on after the Indians, overtaking them at what is known as "One Hundred Mile Mountain." Here a battle was fought and the victorious Ranger stuck tent in the luxurious valley, where the Watson Ranch is now situated. The exact date of this battle could not be learned, but it is thought that Captain Whitehead, who lost his life in the Cyclone at Cisco, was in command of the Rangers.

Twenty-five years ago the valley was dotted with tents. One year later A. J. Sims and a Mr. Griffin formed a partnership and carried a stock of general merchandise in a tent store. Mr. Griffin did a thriving hotel business, also in a tent, prior to forming this partnership. There were tent schools and tent churches. Tom Cowley, brother of one of Ranger's most popular teachers, was the first boy born in the town. A little girl made her advent one day before Tom's arrival. In the Ranger valley some 200 or 300 people lived in tents until the railroad came, then houses went up as if by magic. Ranger was built a couple of miles west of where the tent town had its existence. The oldest settler living in Ranger today is John Bryant, who came in 1881.

Ranger has three good church buildings, Methodist, Baptist and Cumberland Presbyterian, with leagues and young people's societies; a high school, which is correlated with the State University, a phone system and water works, bank five doctors and the usual number of stores, eating houses, etc.

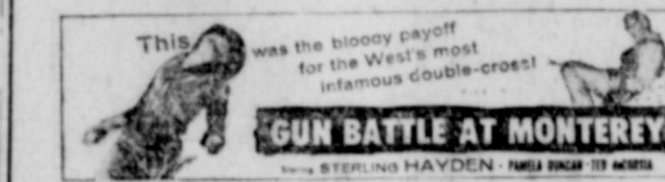

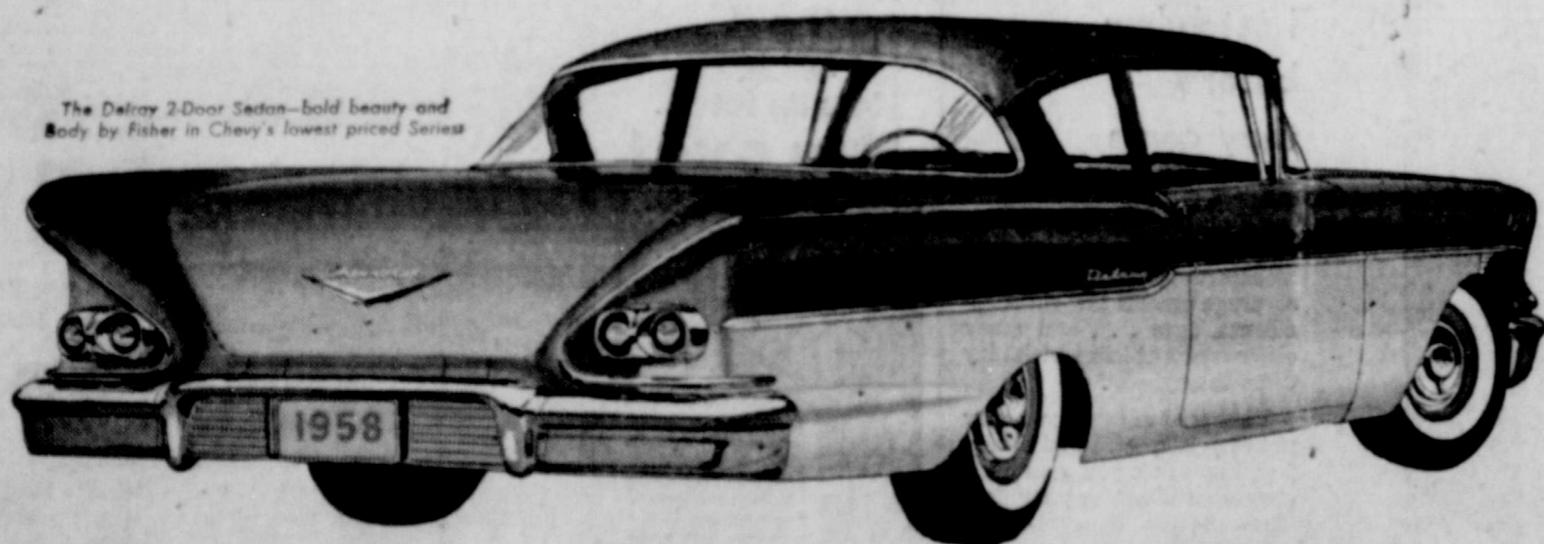

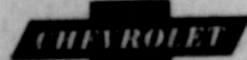
