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





The rate of deaths from cancer in Texas is still well below the rat for the United States as a whole This state registered 112 deaths from cancer for each 100,000 population, while the rate for the rest of the nation was 146 deaths per 100,000 population.

The disparity between the Texas-U. S. cancer death rate is probably due to the fact that Texas has a younger population. Cancer is a disease that usually strikes people past 50 years of age. Of the 10,000 cancer deaths last year,

8213 of them were among person past the half-century mark. Increases in the number of persons dying of heart disease is be coming bitterly significant. Fo instance, almost 1800 more per sons died from this cause during

1956 than died in 1955 . Most of the increase is in the age group 55 and over. And therein lies the irony; normal life spar has been lengthened to an age
