## Large Corn Stalk Borer

$\qquad$ F. E. Miller, of the Miller Land Company, reports that the arge corn stalk borer has done considerable damage to corn in chis section; and he states that one field of thirty acres has been mpletely ruined by the pest.

and the stalk is stunted, growand the stalk is stunted, grow A only two or three feet tall A worm having the appearance of the grub worm, in size
and color, except that it is covand color, except that it is corered with small black specks. It enters the stalk from one to two
inches above the ground and eats its way un the stalk, which results in the destruction of the entire field. After discovering the cause of the corn being ruined by the large corn stalk borer Mr. Miller, wrote to R. R. Reppert, Entomologist, College Station, Texas, for information as to the controle of the pest, and Mr. Reppert's letter, which gives the scientific control is here with reprinted.
