





MOVIE CAMERA AS HELP TO JUSTICE

Detroit Court Brings Solomon Up to Date.

Detroit, Mich. - King Solomon's methods revamped for the movies, were adopted by Circuit Judge Vincent M. Brennan as a means of aiding him in deciding to which of two women he should award a three-yearold girl. Instead of threatening to dismember the child with a sword, Judge Brennan announced he would award the child to neither Mrs. Julia Przbyla, natural mother of baby Irene, nor Mrs. Irene Goosen, her foster mother, formerly Mrs. Przybyla's sister-in-law. Instead, he told the women, the child would be placed in an mstitution.

At the very instant he made this statement a moving picture operator stationed behind the judge's chain trained his camera on the two women.

Judge Brennan said he would employ psychologists to aid him in studying the film, and he would award the child to the claimant whose features showed the greatest grief.

As the movie lights were flashed on, Mrs. Goosen burst into tears and, bend ing over, clasped the child in her arms. Mrs. Przbyla made no demon stration.

Idea of Submarine

Warfare Is Ancient Experimentally, of course, the idea of the submarine goes back into a very remote past. Aristotle speaks of some kind of submarine vessel used in the siege of Tyre more than 2,000 years ago, and there are occasional mentions of the idea through history. In the Sixteenth century one comes to the bishop of Upsala's claim to have invented a boat for scuttling ships from below, and in 1626 Charles I gave a Dutch inventor an order for "boats to go under water," though they do not seem to have been used against the French. There were the rudimentary and unsuccessful "turtles" of Bushnell in the Eighteenth century But an ill fate pursued the early inventors. Fulton's submarine was rejected by France, England and America in turn, and he set himself at the News Office. to the more usual work of designing boat engines. Johnson's submersible which was to have rescued Napoleon from St. Helena came to nothing. Bauer, who was taken up by the prince consort, drowned the crew of his submarine .- Manchester Guardian.

Fishes' Radio Beacon

The simplest and most constant sound in nature, the washing of the sea, serves as a radio beacon to warn whales, porpoises and many fishes to keep away from the shore and below the surface in rough weather, according to Dr. Austin H. Clark of the United States National merly naturalist on the scientific ship Albatross. Being high-pitched, the hissing sound of breaking waves has a marked directive quality-that is, it is easy to locate its point of origin. Being unceasing, it is distressing and repellent, and all the more sensitive sea creatures try to keep away from it. Whales, porpoises and dolphins and many fishes always keep well off shore, Doctor Clark stated, and they are apparently guided by these repellent sounds, while on a windy night various other types of life which normally come up to the surface stay well beneath it.

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

If somebody takes fifty as the age at which a man can tell whether he is a success or a failure, he can be confronted with a long list of those who achieved fame after that age. Cervantes was fifty-eight when he published the first part of "Don Quixote," the work that immortalized his name. Buffon was some years older when about one-half of his "Natural History" was completed, and at seventy he wrote "The Epochs of Nature," in which he calls old age a superstition. "Animals," he says, "do not know it; it is only by our arithmetic that we judge otherwise." But Buffon lived to eighty-one.

Effects of Emotions

The voice of animals and of human beings shows similar changes of quality under similar variations of emotion. This facts shows that similar internal changes are taking place, since the voice is merely the inward and material movement rendered outward and audible by the existence of complete vocal apparatus in action. The only animals which can rightly be called "dumb friends" are the humble members of the animal kingdom without vocal cords. But though insects are voiceless yet they communicate their emotional changes by result of our old friend muscular sound-vibrations resulting from rapid body movements.

Hate's Ill Effects

Hate, which clenches the fist of man, clenches equally the poison-sac of the snake and the sac of coloring matter which darkens the water as the sac of musk befouls and poisons the air. Starling Not Wanted

The undesirable qualities of the starling appear to arise from its choice of nesting sites in buildings, which it defaces, and fts proneness to drive native birds from the vicinity of houses. In the Old world the starling is harmful. Its habits, so far as its choice of food is concerned, have improved a bit in the New world, but taking it all in all the bird is an undesirable alien .-Chicago Evening Post.
