The tentative sketch of the proposed grade school building showed an ell shaped structure 355x61 feet, comprising 18 classrooms, a music room that could be converted into two classrooms, and ample office, and closet space, and other facilities. The proposed gymnasium, attached to the grade school building, is 101 ft. 6 in.x104 feet, with a seating capacity of approximately 900. A 12 ft corridor runs the length of the grade school

The architects estimate of \$11.00 per square foot of floor space included furniture and fixtures and architects fees. An estimated \$375,000 to \$400,000 bond issue will be necessary to care for
