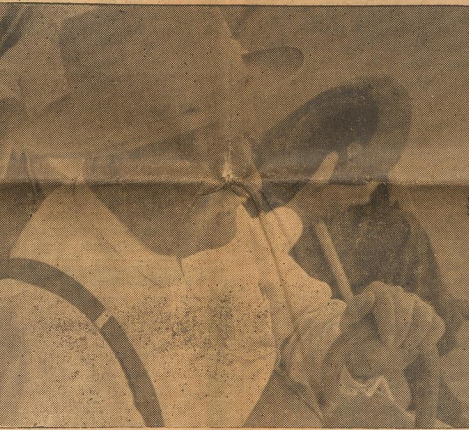
Harry's Supermarket, one of several stores to open soon in Dimmitt's new shopping center across the street north of the post office, will be open for business by the end of next week.

Community Spirit Fostered by Fifty Years of Annual Bethel Suppers

Last Friday night August 3, by the light of only a sliver of August moon, families of the Bethel Community gathered at the community building for the annual chicken fry.

Time was when the chicken fry would have been postponed until the August moon became full and bright to provide light for the occasion since there was no electricity.

Annual community-wide get-togethers in one form or another have been common at Bethel for fifty years or more according to some of the residents whose parents were first settlers there.

A community chicken fry at Bethel is one phase of country living at its very best. At six in the evening the women arrive at the community center with one or two huge, iron washpots. Fires are built under them and shortening heaped into them and very shortly piles of golden brown chicken appear. A sumptuous meal of fried chicken, salads, fresh corn, pickles, potato chips, cakes, cookies, iced tea and coffee are served from long tables in the yard. The occasion is sponsored by the Community Club and the Home Demonstration Club.

Much neighborly conversation is exchanged among both the men and women of the community. Some of it among the older ones is reminiscent of an earlier day when the plains were just beginning to be farmed. Their time has spanned the era of mule and horse drawn farm implements to the era later grew into the chicken fries.

Nazareth Boy Almost Drowns in Rescue Try

Mr. Wagner said Lawrence and his sister went under, but that both he and Bonnie were pulled out by Albert Posey, Stamford, who was in another group.

Guests from throughout Texas and the United States are expected to attend the Third Annual Flame Cultivation Tours at the High Plains Research Foundation on Friday afternoon, August 10. William J. Wawson, Executive Secretary of the Texas Butane Dealers Association, of Austin, said this week. Fred Garrison, member of the Board of Directors of the Association is chairman of the committee who will welcome, register, and guide the visitors on the tours. Literature on research results will be available at the registration tent. Lee Dent, manager of the Hale Center Chamber of Commerce will dispatch the trailers drawn by tractors for the tours throughout the afternoon. Men experienced in flame cultivation will explain the research results at each of the stops on the tour.

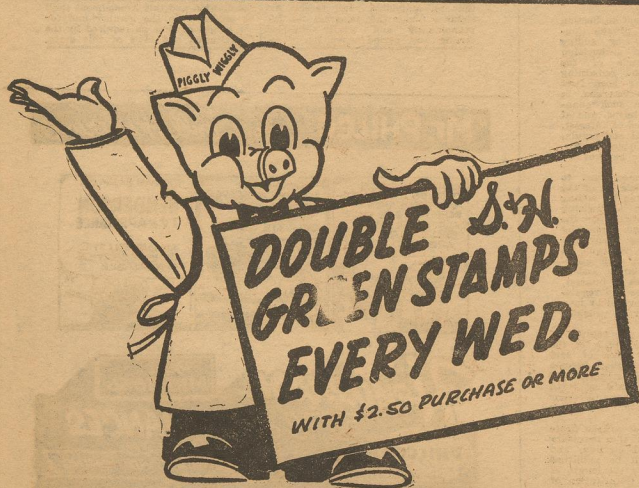

Conversation among the women runs from food freezing techniques to grandchildren and child rearing, a community float and exhibits for the county fair, to latest fashions. Doves of children dash about. The little girls have run the bows out of their sashes and the little boys are dusty from tackling each other in the prairie loam.

Bethel is composed of second and third generation farmers, many of whom are graduates of agricultural colleges. There is a strong feeling of community pride

which is probably the reason they still have chicken fries. Because of their interest in maintaining the Bethel community and preserving all the richness of this rural heritage for their children, the community leaders entered the 1961-62 Texas Community Improvement Program and were first place winners in their district. The community center, which is the only landmark which designates to a passer by the location of Bethel, is part of the reason they won their award. It is a neat stucco building which has a large assembly room, a nursery and well equipped kitchen with a brick barbecue pit in the yard. 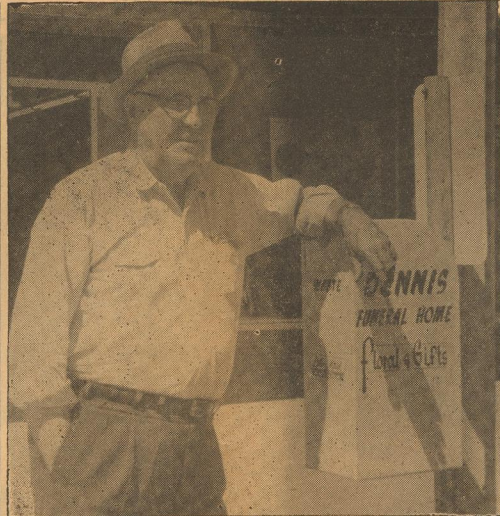

About Your HEALTH

AUSTIN — Various educated guesses as to the number of "undiscovered" diabetics in the United States place the figure somewhere between one and two million. Undoubtedly a fair proportion of them are Texans.

Diabetes is a general systemic disease in which the body loses its ability to burn and store sugar normally. All starches in foods are converted in the stomach and in-

testines into sugar. As sugar they are absorbed into the blood and pass through the liver and into general circulation to all parts of the body.

Normally the gland called the pancreas produces a secretion called insulin which is also poured into the blood. In the presence of insulin, the sugar of the blood is burned, especially by muscular activity. Any excess of sugar in the presence of a normal amount of insulin is temporarily stored, mostly in the liver, and released as needed into the blood.

This is the normal pattern. But in a person suffering with diabetes the pancreas fails to produce sufficient insulin. And when starches are eaten and absorbed as sugar, the body is unable to control the sugar normally by storing it in the liver or to burn it efficiently in muscle exercise. Result: the sugar content of the blood increases to abnormal levels.

Because the diabetic is unable to burn the sugar efficiently for energy, he becomes weak and tired. His body needs nourishment and he therefore develops great hunger. But because he cannot utilize the starches, he uses up his own tissues and continues to lose weight.

When the blood sugar gets too high, the kidneys, in an effort to lower it, removes some of the sugar by excreting it in urine. This, in turn, makes the body dry and creates a thirst.

Proof of the hereditary nature of diabetes is the fact that surveys of diabetic children show that 60 percent of their families have other members with diabetes.

Overeating and lack of muscular exercise are conditions which tend to promote obesity which in turn creates a tendency toward diabetes. It has been shown that 20 fat persons develop the disease for every thin one who does. The obvious moral is do not overeat, do not remain overweight, and get plenty of muscular exercise.

You can judge your own tendency toward diabetes in the light of what has been said: Are you overweight? Do you over eat? Is there diabetes in your family? Also, do you have any of the symptoms: great hunger, loss of strength, loss of weight, persistent thirst, or excessive urination? If so, you're a likely candidate for a urinalysis or blood sugar test by your family physician.
