Littlefield

(Lamb County Leader.)

The next Littlefield Trades Day will be held Monday, July 1st, which is just a few days ahead of American National Independence day, coming on July 4th, and it is planned to combine the idea of Trades Day and a national independence celebration on that occasion, according to decision of Chamber of Commerce officials.

The baseball game played here Tuesday afternoon between the Southside team and Littlefield Cats was the most interesting of the season to date. Littlefield won by a score of 7 to 3.

At a special meeting of the city commission held Thursday night a new contract for gas service in Littlefield was signed with the West Texas Gas Co. of Amarillo, and it was understood that the laying of gas lines in this city will start not later than September 1.

A chapter of the Royal Arch Masons was organized here last week by Grand High Priest Jack Brown, with 20 charter members. J. S. Hilliard was chosen high priest and J. T. Street, secretary.

At a meeting of the board of directors, Littlefield Independent School District, held Monday night, it was ordered that some of the territory lying east of Littlefield should be released so as to form a new school district in the Spade community settlement, the action being taken following presentation of a petition largely signed by citizens of that section.

Littlefield is soon to have its own cold storage and refrigeration system, according to W. H. Heinen, who has placed an order for a "Baker" system of refrigeration.

The city commission at a special meeting last Thursday issued an order that all sidewalks on each side of Main street from the state highway to the city park should be put in immediately.

At the annual meeting of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce held Tuesday night, J. E. Brannen was

elected president and E. S. Rowe, vice-president, being unanimously chosen by the membership.

The finishing touches are this week being given to the reconstruction and refinishing of the Littlefield Hotel, which will in the future be able to afford accommodations to the traveling public equal to the best to be found anywhere in this section.

WHERE TEXAS GROWS EASTEST

(Fort Worth Star-Telegram.)

Confirmation of what was rather generally surmised previously—that the center of Texas population growth is now in the Panhandle-Plains region—is supplied by the statistics on public high school enrollment contained in the report of the state superintendent of education. This report for the biennium period of 1926-28, shows that in 70 northwestern counties enrollment increased 36 per cent in the two years, while for the remainder of the state the increase was but 6 per cent.

The figures are: For the 70 northwestern counties: 1924-26, 46,468; 1926-28, 58,824. For the remainder 184 counties: 1924-26, 140,395; 1926-28, 148,949.

High schools of the 70 Panhandle-Plains counties now care for 12,356 more students than two years ago, while the increase for the entire remainder of the state was but 3,554. Since there is a direct and constant relationship between high school enrollment and the number of families in a given area, the showing of the figures is that during the past two years these Panhandle and Plains counties have added three families to their population for every two added elsewhere in the state.

WHAT FARMERS WANT FOR RELIEF.

In recent months both the co-operatives and the general farm organizations of the United States have gone on record as to what they want the government to do for agriculture. The American Farm Bureau Federation, the Grange and the Farmers' Union united on four things which in their opinion must be met by legislation to properly qualify as farm relief.

Those four things are: (1) The tariff should be made effective on all farm crops so that surpluses will not be permitted to depress the domestic price level; (2) methods for the control and disposition of agricultural surpluses should be adequately provided for; (3) there should be automatic provisions to check overproduction of farm crops; (4) the legislation should provide for farmer-ownership and control of the marketing organizations.

Representatives of about 40 of the larger cooperatives who met in Washington recently to organize themselves into a national body for the common good also made four recommendations to congress.

(1) Protective tariffs on such agricultural commodities as would be benefited thereby; (2) no more reclamation of irrigation projects until the production of land already in cultivation is on a profitable basis; (3) a thorough-going revision of the federal rural credit machinery so that it will adequately provide for production credit, marketing credit and credit to enable co-operatives to expand their ownership and operation of physical properties; (4) that surpluses must be controlled at the source of production and that no plan for surplus control of any commodity can be permanently effective or even avoid disastrous consequences unless definite methods are found to control overproduction.

NOT FARM RELIEF BUT FARM AID.

Congressman Haugen may be extra optimistic, but his message emphasizes two things that I think farmers should remember in connection with this farm relief legislation. The first thing is that it is not "farm relief" legislation at all. It is "farm aid" legislation, designed to help farmers who are willing to help themselves.

The second important thing is that this farm aid can be given to farmers only through cooperative marketing associations and that if there are no cooperatives there will not be any aid.

Assuming that Congressman Haugen is right, it looks to me as though those farmers who are not now members of cooperative marketing associations ought to begin thinking about getting into one. In other words they ought to be getting themselves into a position where government legislation can actually aid them.

FARM LEGISLATION AND "FUTURES."

Well the marketing act has at last passed both houses of congress and has been signed by President Hoover. It is just about what the Republican party promised to do, and about as near what the farm organizations wanted as was possible to agree on. Now comes the task of getting the money and learning how to use it so as to aid the farmer.

Of course the farmers are not looking to become prosperous in the next few days, but there should be some letting up of speculators selling futures against farm crops before they are even planted, at prices below cost of production. There are newspaper reports which say that the President is seriously considering our friend Carl Williams of Oklahoma as one member of the farm board. The writer does not know who else will be placed on the board, but having known Mr. Williams for several years, personally and by reputation for about eight years, it is well known that Mr. Williams is a true friend to the boys on the farm, and he is especially a believer in cooperative marketing.

If the other members of the board are anywhere near as capable as Mr. Williams, and as friendly to the farmers, we will have "farm aid for farmers."

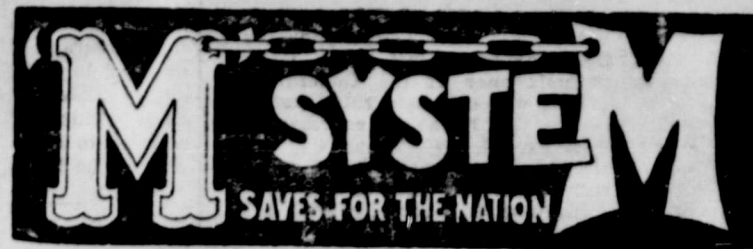

Robinson Trial May Be Ordered Dismissed

AUSTIN, June 17.—Proponents of the charges against J. T. Robinson, Commissioner of the General Land Office, will complete their testimony before the house of representatives Tuesday. C. W. Truheart, assistant Attorney general until recently, will be the last witness.

Robinson has been accused of incompetency of office, the charge having been based on his mishandling of the fund contributed by purchasers of public lands to pay expenses of reappraisal under the 1925 legislative act, acceptance of gifts and gratuities, and resisting efforts of the Governor, Attorney general and University of Texas board of regents to postpone sale of oil and gas leases in university lands.

The hearing of testimony was begun last Thursday. Many of the questions and answers of the transcript of testimony before the joint investigating committee during the regular session was read to the house, sitting as a committee of the whole.

It was reported Monday that following Truheart's testimony there will be a motion to dismiss the charges, much the same as a move for an instructed verdict in criminal court cases. In the event the motion is defeated, the respondent likely will produce a large number of witnesses.

Stabilization Firm Is Sought For Wheat

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Representatives of practically every wheat growing district in the United States in conference here have fairly well outlined the organization of a wheat stabilization corporation to take advantage of the new farm relief appropriation.

The conference began last week and will continue this week, but despite difficulties and disagreements which have been encountered, it now looks as though a nationwide organization would spring into existence, borrow \$100,000,000 from the Federal Farm Loan Board created by the new law as soon as the body comes into existence, and tackle the job of carrying over the 1928 wheat crop surplus, now estimated to run at about \$9,000,000 bushels.

Fresh eggs shipped in cold storage from the United States are appreciated in Chile. They can be had there at 6 cents apiece, compared with the 12 cents asked for Chilean eggs, and United States eggs are better, for cold storage is lacking in Chile, and eggs too, probably.

Paint Top and Bottom

In order to last, shelves should be protected with paint or varnish on the bottom as well as the top and sides. Decay is no respecter of surfaces, and will attack and wear away one side as well as another. Therefore, it is best to paint or varnish the entire shelf as soon as it is put up.
