**A POPULAR VERDICT.**

(Fort Worth Star-Telegram.)

The thoroughgoing manner in which the house sustained the refusal of its revenue and taxation committee to approve the Moody income tax proposal ought to serve notice to politicians that the state of Texas does not care to have its economic, social and political welfare jeopardized by half-baked theorists and unconscionable appeals to prejudice as between various classes of its citizenship. The reputation of popular opinion, expressed by the house verdict is properly visited upon those who sought to align one element against another for reasons that can not be otherwise associated than with personal political gain.

The state of Texas, along with other states which ratified the federal constitutional amendment ceding to the federal power the right to levy income taxes, by that action relinquished that right on its own account. There extends throughout the whole idea of the dual form of government which exists in a federal union the principle that, as relating to taxes, certain fields shall be reserved to one or the other, the state or the federal government. The federal government is barred from levying direct taxes on property and is accorded the privilege of levying a tax on incomes. The states to which is reserved the direct property tax field, by their own act as well as by the theory of our government system, have disbarred themselves from intruding in the income tax and excise tax fields.

The verdict of the house, which came Monday on an effort to overturn the majority unfavorable report of the committee on revenue and taxation on the Moody bill, is conclusive. The state of Texas is not willing to precipitate such a revolution at the behest of a few politicians who have their own reasons, yet obscure, for agitating such a revolution. The lesson ought not to be lost on ambitious politicians in the future.

**Oklahoma Man on New Farm Board**

WASHINGTON, June 28.—James C. Stone of Kentucky, C. B. Pennington of Missouri, and Carl Williams of Oklahoma, were appointed today by President Hoover as members of the federal farm board created by the new administration farm act. The chief executive said he hoped to have the acceptance of the board of four more members by the end of next week and added that his belief that the full board of eight would be able to organize by August 1.

**Williams' Acceptance Certain, Friends Say.**  
 OKLAHOMA CITY, June 28.—Acceptance by Carl Williams, Oklahoma City editor, of appointment to the new Federal Farm Board, was announced today by President Hoover, who said by associates to be certain. Williams was in Chicago today. It was said by co-workers that the Williams had agreed to accept the appointment before it was announced.

**Recognizes Leaders of Farm Co-operatives**

Last week we had the information that President Hoover had selected Carl Williams of Oklahoma as a member of the Federal Farm Board. Mr. Williams is a well-known friend of the farmer co-operative movement. He is known to have been one of the greatest help of co-operatives in starting the cotton growers' movement in the South. He is also president of the Burley Tobacco Growers' Association, has also been a place on the board. Then comes the announcement that W. S. Mumford, secretary of the United States Milk Producers' Association, and Charles C. Lusk, secretary of the California Citrus League, have been offered a place on the board. It will be seen that four of the strongest co-operatives in the United States have been offered places on the board. These men will determine the policy of the board. It will be sure to support the people's farm relief that make available some farm relief that

will add the farmers to help themselves. So it will be seen that if there is any argument as to whether the farm organizations have always returned to their members a profit in dollars and cents, there certainly is no argument to the fact that through their faithfulness and service they have gained the recognition of our government, as being the best friend to the producer. Therefore they stand at the head of the class, of the boys who are likely to be of real service to the boys on the farm.

**INTERESTING SPECIMENS.**

In blasting the cap-rock on the hill south of San Jon the past week, the workmen uncovered a large section of sandstone in which perfect specimens of leaves were imbedded. A rock weighing about 150 pounds was brought in to the Sands-Dorsey drug store that shows perfect specimens of several varieties, most of them being of fauna that has not been indigenous to this section within the memory of man. One clearly defined leaf resembles that of the maple and there are several good allis for fig leaves. The rock in which the leaves were found imbedded is a white sand rock liberally sprinkled with silicate and might be classed as glass sand, since it is from this formation that glass is made. The rock was uncovered a few feet from the top of the ground and those familiar with geology state it dates back 50,000 to 100,000 years at the latest calculation. It may be possible that in the early days fig trees flourished in this section, as the remains of trees indicate they grew to prodigious size and several mammoth and dinosaurs have been unearthed in this vicinity. Most of the finds of a prehistoric age are near the cap-rock. It is even possible one of the fig leaves found imbedded in the rock came from the apron of some Mother Eve of the race.—Tucuman, (N. M.) American.
