#### Four Million to File Income Tax Returns me.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.-About

Uncle Sam looks for more than 4.000,000 reports from people in these classes: All single persons with a net income of \$1,500 or more for the year, or a gross income of \$5,000 or more; all married couples who had net incomes of \$3,500 or more, or gross incomes of \$5,000 or more.

All these must fill out special All these must fill out special forms with collectors of internal revenue for districts in which they

On the first \$4,000 in excess of tax of one-half of one per cent normal tax. On the next \$4,000 there is a two per cent normal tax, with four per cent normal tax on the balance of net income. For net income exceeding \$10,000 there is a surtax.

All income from any source is classed as "gross income." "Net income" refers to gross income less deductions as specified by law.

A single person who is "head of a family" is allowed the same personal exemption granted a married person. Any taxpayer

> First estimates of the probable cotton acreage have been received of the more important counties as well as from a number in which cotton is not the most important agricultural factor. Some of these seem to point to a general reduction in cotton acreage amounting to between 10 and 15 per cent Other reports indicate that, due to the hard and prolonged freezing weather, which killed much of the small grain, the acreage in cotton will be fully equal to that of 1929. Others, because of the freeze and of other causes, show a probability of increases in cotton acreage running in individual counties as

ORDINANCE NO. 2L

An Ordinance Entitled An Ordinance Regulating Gas Piping Appliances, Fixtures and Apparatus in All Buildings and Structures of Gas Consumers in the City of Sudan, Texas, and the Installation, Construction, Reconstruction, Adjustment and

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY

Section 1. That the City Plumbing Inspector and his assistants be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to supervise all gas piping, appliances, fixtures and apparatus whether now or hereafter existing, placed in or in any manner connected in any building or tent, or structure any character, whether used for business or residence pur-poses, in the City of Sudan, and the installation, construction, re-construction, adjustment and repair thereof and to see that all the rules, and regulations of said City of Sudan with respect thereto are properly complied with and to inspect all such gas piping, appliances, fixtures and apparatus and the installation, construction, reconstruction, adjustmentor re-pair thereof whenever and so often as they deem it desirable or necessary, and to do so in order to prevent fires, accidents or injuries to persons or property, and the said City Plumbing Inspector and his assistants be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to cause all such gas piping, appliances, fixtures and apparatus and the installation, construction, reconstruction, adjustment and repair thereof to be such as not to cause fire or accident or injury to life or property and any and all such gas piping, fixtures and apparatus now existing as well as the installation, construction, reconstruction, adjustment and re-pair thereof shall be subject to the foregoing inspection and su-

And it is further ordained that no gas appliance, fixture or apparatus, either for heating, illuminating or hot water heating, be installed until type of said gas appliance, apparatus or fixture has been approved by the City Plumbing Inspector or his assist-

Section 2. That the said City Plumbing Inspector and his assistants shall be subject to order and direction of the Mayor and City
Commission of the City of Sudan,
and they are hereby vested with
full authority to enter any building or premises or structure, subways, or other places, either public or private, at any time in the discharge of their duties, and to ass upon and decide upon questions arising under the provisions of this ordinance or any ordinance hereafter passed or any rules and regulations already adopted or hereafter adopted by the Mayor and City Commission relative to any such gas piping, appliances fixtures or apparatus or the installation, construction, reconstruction, adjustment and repair thereof or relative to the materials used therein, whether the same be the original construction and

erection or in any alterations or repairs thereof.

Section 3. No person, firm or corporation shall enter upon the installation, construction, reconstruction or repair of such gas piping appliances, fixtures or apparatus or any change thereof, (nor shall any such person, firm or corporation undertake for any other person, firm or corporation, the adjustment thereof) until the said individual, firm or corporation shall have secured a licens as hereinafter provided and shall have executed and delivered to the City of Sudan a good and sufficient bond in the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred (\$2500.00) Dollars having thereon two or more sureties approved by the Mayor and City Commission of the City of Sudan, one of which said sureties shall be a surety company duly authorized to do business in the State of Texas, conditioned for the faithful performance of all such work entered upon or con-tracted for in strict accordance and compliance with the terms, requirements and provisions of this ordinance and such further and future ordinances of the City of Sudan as may be here-after passed. #### ORDINANCE NO. 20

lating the Use of Sewers by Private Individuals and Corpora-Texas.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY

Section 1. The sanitary system of the City of Sudan consists of main and lateral conduits of salt-glazed, vitrified earthenware with necessary accessor es They are designed to carry off al' liquid house wastes, and are known herein as sanitary sewers The sewers in the streets or allevs passing in front and rear of various lots are called main or late al sewers. The sewers leading from the main or lateral sewers to the property are herein done under the permit.

Section 2. All connections house sewers, drains or plumbing work with the sewer system o the City of Sudan shall be made in accordance with the rules and regulations herein contained.

Section 3. No person, firm or corporation shall lay, alter or repair any house drain, sewer or plumbing work, or make any connections whatever with any sewer or drain belonging to the sanitar sewer system, or do any kind o work connected with the laving o house drain, or house sewers, o plumbing, or make any repairs additions to, or alterations of an drain, sewer or plumbing connect ed or designed to be connected with the sanitary sewer system, unles Sudan as herein provided.

Section 4. Any person desiring connection with the sanitary sewer system, shall file in the office o the City Clerk, a pet.tion giving the name of the individual or firm, and place of business, and asking to be licensed as a plumber, Said petition must be signed b. two responsible citizens of the Cit. of Sudan vouching for the business capacity and reputation o the appl.cant, and said petition shall state that the applicant wi abide by all the rules and regula tions which are, or may be adopt ed, by the City of Sudan. Eac applicant for a license shall exe cute and deposit with the City Clerk with his application a bonc with a responsible, reliable and solvent surety company, to be approved by the City Commission, in the sum of \$2,500.00, conditioned that he will indemnify and save harmless the City of Sudan from all accidents and damages caused by any negligence in protecting his work or inadequate work done by virtue of his l.cense, and that he will also replace and restore sidewalks, pavement or street sur face, or any alley surface, ove. any opening he may have made to as good state and condition as h found it, and keep and maintai. same in good order to th satisfaction of the City for th period of six months thereafter and that he will pay all fines im posed upon him for a violation o these rules and regulations. ### Bring Up Your Chicks In The Way They Should Go

Chicks, Like Children, Require Careful Training if They Are to Grow Un Into Strong, Useful Members of Their Community, A Little Extra Attention During the Early Stages of Development Will Be Rewarded With Extra Profits Later.

Chicks are a good bit like children in a great many ways. With proper training, both will develop into valuable members of their respective branches of society. Much has already been said in this series of articles on the subject of environment. I have stressed the need for clean, comfortable quarters, ventilation, adequate range, sanitation and other phases of that subject. Heretofore, however, I have had no opportunity to mention one very important matter which is the training of young chicks in what a friend of mine has humorously called barnyard etiquette.

I begin training my chicks the moment I transfer them to the brooder room. As soon as possi-ble I begin scattering their grain ration in litter so they will have to scratch for it thus giving healthful exercise. I also watch them carefully and guide them into the heated area of the hover whenever they need such direction. Whenever I find chicks huddled together, I place them under the hover. It may be necessary to do this quite often during the first week.

Crowding is another danger that can be greatly lessened by early training. I prevent huddling in corners by placing chick wire or boards diagonally across them. They must be watched carefully, however, for if they cannot crowd into the corners they will often pile together in football scrimmage style right in the middle of the floor. Watch your chicks at all times, but especially at evening and gently force them apart if they show any tendency toward crowding. There will always be need for watchfulness in this respect until they are actually roosting.

Feather eating or pulling is The object of this article is to another habit that often leads to young feathers from each other and eating them, or to eating one another up, starting usually at the tail. It is due to much the same causes as toe picking and should be overcome in the same way. Remove the injured chicks and apply tar as for toe picking. Do not put them back until they are thoroughly healed.

One very important phase of a chick's early training is teaching them to roost. This can be quite easily done if started before the chicks are too old. By putting them on the roost a time or two at night, they will take to the oosts nicely.

Build temporary roosts 12 to 18 inches from the floor, with an inlevel, the same as for other roosts. f27-4t Build it so that the chicks cannot drop between the roosts and the walls, and cover the under side of it with 1-inch netting.
