About 50 or 60 years from now the records for 1930 will be thrown open to the public for research.

THE GRADE CROSSING.

Last year 385 railroad grade crossings were eliminated on the federal aid system, according to a recent announcement. Since 1917, the records show, 4.676 grade crossings have been weeded out of the system. Elimination of the grade crossings is regarded by the U.S. bureau of public roads as the only positive means of reducing the heavy toll of human life taken annually at points where highways and railways cross. The recent killing of 19 people on a bus at a New Mexic orailway crossing was a sacrifice to the grade crossing. Are we going as fast as we can toward elimination of the grade crossings?
