The past few years have seen oungsters walk away with honors and prizes in many fields; now they are entering the kitchen and showing their elders how cooking should be done.

Jelly-making is an art which has flourished for many, many years, and, up to now, experience has countedat least in the minds of the practition ers-greatly toward success.

But recently girls in their teens, or even below them, have taken up jellymaking and have been breezing along with victories. There is Dorothy Dodd Marlatt, for example, the little nine year-old New Jersey girl who started winning contests when she was five.

Beats Prize Winner

And there is Marie Kemp, the thirteen-year-old Wisconsin girl who, although she had made jelly only three times before, challenged Mrs. F. J Beilharz, a State Fair prize-winner, to a friendly "speed contest" and won by more than half an hour.

Both Dorothy and Marie use the short-boil method, which includes the use of bottled fruit pectin, thus assur

Marie Kemp's time is a mark to shoot at. Below is the recipe she used when she finished her jelly so many minutes ahead of Mrs. Beilharz, and another one for making grape jam by the same

4 cups (2 lba.) juice 7% cups (3% lba.) sugar bottle (1/2 cup) fruit pec

Measure sugar and juice into large source-pan and mix. Bring to a boi. —er hottest fire and at once add fruit pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full roding boil and boil hard ½ minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jelly at once. Makes about 11 eight-ounce glasses.

41/2 cups (21/4 lbs.) prepared fruit 16 bottle (1/4 cup) fruit pectia

Slip skins from about J pounds fully ripe lapes. Simmer pulp, covered, 5 minutes. Remove seeds by sieving. Chop or gried skins and add to pulp. Add ½ cup water and if desired, grated rind of 1 orange. Stir until mixture boils. Simmer, covered, 30 minutes. (Wild grapes, Malagas and other tight-skinned grapes may be atemmed, crushed whole, simmered with ½ cup water 30 minutes, sieved, and then measured. With tight-skinned grapes add juice of 1 lemon to water. Use 4 cups prepared fruit.)


