Austin, March 2-Governor Miriam A. Ferguson today issued a proclamation proclaiming a financial moratorium in proper notices have been posted. Texas for five days and ordering all banks to remain closed until and including March 7.

The governor decided on this action as a means of preventing any disturbed situation resulting from financial difficulties experienced by banks in other states recently.

At a meeting (tonight) of the officers and directors of the First National Bank of Sudan it was decided to declare a Holiday for the bank as ordered by the Governor. Accordingly The bank will remain closed as is customary on legal holidays.

"This move", reads the statement "on the part of Governor Ferguson does not in any way impair the financial stability of any bank in the state. At the expiration of the designated period of five days the bank of Sudan will be open for business. Customers should not become unduly excited over the situation.

> cond and third class postmasters do not expire at the same time. They are appointed for a four year term and cannot be removed except on trial after filing of charges of alleged misconduct or inefficiency.

Take Civil Service Exam

To fill a vacancy, appointments are made from the three highest in the civil service examination conducted by the civil service commission. When a vacancy occurs the postoffice department notifies the commis sion and the examination is held. Only qualified residents of a community are eligible to take examinations.

The new president is expected to fill vacancies as soon as the civil service available list






