This report shows all gins total run in the county to date. Last season up to this time of the report, March 31, 1933, the county had ginned a total of 79,470 or, a difference from last years crop and this years, of 17,694. This decrease of cotton for the county was due to hail and drouth principally. Lubbock led the South Plains this year with about 92,000

Bailey county ginned for the season 12,473 bales, compared with 21,919 bales for 1931-32

This report shows all gins total run in the county to date. Last season up to this time of the report, March 31. 1933, the county had ginned a total of 79,470 or, a difference from last years crop and this years, of 17,694. This decrease of cotton for the county was due to hail and drouth principally. Lubbock led the South Plains this year with about 92,000 bales.

Bailey county ginned for the season 12,473 bales, compared with 21,919 bales for 1931-32
